NOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty's Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland will hold a Levee at His Majesty's Palace of Holyrood House, at 10.45 A.M., on Tuesday the 23rd day of May, being the first day of Meeting of the General Assembly, on which occasion all those holding His Majesty's Commission or other Gentlemen are required to appear in uniform, court or evening dress.

The Procession will go by the Calton Hill, Princes Street, and the Mound.

Carriages of Noblemen and Gentlemen attending the Levee will follow those of His Grace.

His Grace will attend Divine Service in the High Church on Sunday the 28th of May.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

BURGH OF GREENOCK.

Notice is hereby given that the Provost, Magistrates, and Councilors of the Burgh of Greenock have made application to the Secretary for Scotland praying that Regulations under section 9 (1) of the Motor Car Act should be made, restricting the rate of speed for motor car traffic to ten miles an hour on certain streets within the limits of the Burgh.

Notice is hereby further given that the application, with Schedule and Map showing the streets proposed for restriction, and the points at which restriction begins and ends, may be inspected during office hours at the Office of the Town-Clerk, Municipal Buildings, Greenock, and that objections to the making of such Regulations may be sent in writing to the Secretary for Scotland at the Scottish Office, Whitehall, London, at any time within fourteen days of the date of publication of this advertisement.
