## MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1887.

Whereas it is provided by section sixteen of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1887, that the Commissioners of Customs (hereinafter referred to as the Commissioners) may from time to time make, revoke, and vary regulations, either general or special, respecting the detention and forfeiture of goods, the importation of which is prohibited by that section, and the conditions, if any, to be fulfilled before such detention and forfeiture, and may by such regulations determine the information, notices, and security to be given, and the evidence requisite for any of the purposes of the said section, and the mode of verification of such evidence.

And whereas on the first day of December eighteen hundred and eighty-seven the Commissioners made certain Regulations, and it has become necessary to vary them in respect of the two matters hereinafter referred to.

Now, therefore, the Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers vested in them, do hereby vary the said Regulations as follows:—

1. The amount for which security by bond is to be given under Regulation No. 4 shall be such sum not less than double the value of the goods as the Commissioners may require.

2. The time at which the security may be given up under Regulation No. 7, if forfeiture is not completed and no action or suit has been commenced against the Commissioners or any of their officers in respect of the detention, shall be at the expiration of six months from the date of detention or the trial of the information.

#### CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION,

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Male Sorter in London in the Department of the Postmaster-General.

These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

1. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- (a) That their age on the day of the Examination is not less than 18 nor more than 21. In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served in the Army or Navy, or for two full consecutive years either in a Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners or as Registered Boy Clerks in connection with the Civil Service, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service. In the case of soldiers whose period of military service has been compulsorily extended by the Military Authorities, the period to be deducted may be extended beyond five years, if necessary.
- (b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
- (c) That they are natural-born or naturalised British subjects.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

3. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. English Composition (including Writing and Spelling).
2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).
3. Geography (general).

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate, in the judgment

of the Civil Service Commissioners, a competent amount of general proficiency, will not be regarded as qualified.

4. Candidates must be at least 5 feet 4 inches in height.

5. The following classes of persons are ineligible to compete, viz. :—

- (a) Persons actually serving in the Army or Navy.
- (b) Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of less than five years' service.

6. The following classes of persons are eligible under certain conditions only, that is to say :—

- (c) Persons holding situations in the Civil Service.
- (d) Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of more than five years' service.
- (e) Probationary Engineer Cadets in the Navy, and Apprentices in His Majesty's Dockyards.
- (f) Persons who have been trained in Training Colleges at the public expense.
- (g) Persons who have been trained in the Inland Revenue Branch of the Government Laboratory.

Persons comprised in the classes (c), (d), (e) must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination, before the commencement of the competition.

Persons comprised in class (f) will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

Persons comprised in class (g) will not be qualified for appointment until the consent of the Board of Inland Revenue, given with the like sanction, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

8. A fee of 4s. will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for Female Sorterships in the General Post Office, London.

These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

These situations are filled by Open Competitive Examinations under the following Rules, viz. :—

1. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- (a) That their age on the day of the Competitive Examination is not less than 15 nor more than 18. In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served for two full consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.
- (b) That they are unmarried or widows.
- (c) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
- (d) That they are natural-born or naturalised British subjects.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

3. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

- 1. Reading and Copying MS.
- 2. Writing.
- 3. Spelling.
- 4. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English Weights and Measures, Reduction).
- 5. Geography of the United Kingdom.

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate, in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners, a competent amount of general proficiency, will not be regarded as qualified.

4. No Candidate will be admitted to Examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking signed by her parent and guardian, that she will, if successful, reside either with her parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.

5. Candidates must be at least 5 feet in height.

6. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the Examination before the commencement of the Competition.

7. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

8. A fee of 2s. 6d. will be required from each Candidate attending an Examination.
