A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the 4th day of October next; we, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said 4th day of October next, to Tuesday the 27th day of November next: And we have given order to our Chancellor of that part of our united kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and we do further, hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare our royal will and pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said 27th day of November next, be held, and sit, for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said 27th day of November next.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS George Hay, Marquis of Tweedale, was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, we do, by the advice of our Privy Council, issue forth this proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-House, in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the 14th day of November next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great

Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said George Hay, Marquis of Tweedale, deceased; by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent, (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both constituent and proxy being qualified according to Law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes, and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And we strictly charge and command that this proclamation be duly published at the market cross at Edinburgh, and in all the country towns in Scotland, twenty-five days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.
