#### PERTH CORPORATION TRAMWAYS.

(I.) NOTICE OF BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS AS TO PREVENTION OF NUISANCES AND REGULATING TRAVELLING ON TRAMWAY CARRIAGES.

THE Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Perth (hereinafter called "the Corporation"), by virtue of the powers conferred on them by Section 46 of "The Tramways Act, 1870," and the Perth Corporation (Tramways) Order, 1903, and the Perth Corporation Order, 1904, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, do hereby make and enact the following Bye-Laws and Regulations as to the following matters:-

For preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage, or in or against any premises

belonging to them; and

For regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage belonging to them.

belonging to them.

1. The bye-laws and regulations hereinafter set forth shall apply to all tramway cars, tramway carriages, or omnibuses of the Corporation (all hereinafter called "carriages"), and to all places with respect to which the Corporation have power under the aforesaid Act and Orders to make bye-laws and regulations.

2. The expression "tramways" shall include all tramways worked by the Corporation.

3. In these bye-laws the word "conductor" shall mean and include any inspector, driver, conductor, or other officer of the Corporation.

other officer of the Corporation.

4. No person shall enter or alight from a carriage otherwise than by the step of the rear platform.

5. All persons desiring to alight from any carriage at any point shall do so before any person enters into or mounts upon such carriage at any point for the purpose of travelling thereon, and all persons desiring to enter into or mount upon the carriage at such point shall first permit such first-named persons to alight as aforesaid.

6. No person shall smoke or carry a lighted pipe, cigar or cigarette inside any carriage, or smoke outside any carriage in front of the trolley standard. Any person offending against this bye-law shall be liable, in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter mentioned, to be summarily removed from the carriage.

7. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language or conduct himself offensively whilst in or upon any carriage, or spit or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage or tramway station or premises used in connection with the tramways system, or in any way wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

8. No person shall sing or play or perform on any musical instrument, or distribute advertisements, pamphlets, notices, handbills, or tracts of any kind, or beg or collect money, alms, or subscriptions, or sell any article, or play any game, or gamble, or paste notices or handbills, or deposit remnants of food or fruit or other material in or upon any carriage.

9. No person who is in a state of intoxication, or affected with any infectious or contagious disease, or who in the opinion of the conductor or other duly or who in the opinion of the conductor of other duly authorised officer of the Corporation might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall enter or remain in or on any carriage, and may be prevented from entering in or on any carriage, and no such person shall enter or mount in or on any carriag after having been requested not to do so by the conductor; and if found in or on any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage.

10. No clothing, bedding, or other article likely to spread any infectious disease shall be placed by any person on any carriage. Any person whose dress or clothing might in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage or other duly authorised officer as aforesaid soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and if found in or on any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage upon the return of his fare, if previously paid, being offered to him.

11. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage any carriage or the fittings thereof, or the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or upon any carriage, or place his feet upon or lie upon any seat, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

12. No passenger or other person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Corporation; and no person other than a conductor, or other officer of the Corporation, shall change or remove the route or destination boards, or interfere with the brake or ventilators

of any carriage.

13. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or upon any carriage in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal may be offensive or an annoyance to passengers, nor in any other case otherwise than by permission of the conductor. No person shall take a dog or other animal into or upon any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or upon any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed from the carriage by the person in charge of such dog or other animal immediately upon request of the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

14. No person shall travel in or on any carriage with

loaded firearms, or with any dangerous or offensive substance or material or implement.

15. Each passenger shall upon demand pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Cor-poration the fare legally demandable for the journey,

and accept a ticket corresponding thereto.

16. Each passenger shall show his ticket when required so to do to the conductor or other duly authorised

officer of the Corporation, and shall also when required so to do either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the journey.

17. Any ticket, for the time being issued by the Corporation in respect of a fare, shall be available only for the carriage on or for which it is issued, and no passenger shall be entitled to leave any carriage for any purpose whatever at any stage and resume his journey by a different carriage from that on or for which such ticket was issued, except upon payment of a fresh fare from the point at which the passenger entered the second or other carriage.

18. If at any time a carriage becomes disabled or in any way injured, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall upon the request of the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Corporation leave the same. No person shall, except with the leave of the conductor or other duly authorised officer as aforesaid, enter a disabled or injured carriage.

19. No passenger shall wilfully alter or deface his ticket so as to render the number or any material portion thereof illegible, or shall use or attempt to use a ticket on any day for which such ticket is not available, or use a ticket which has already been used on a previous

20. No person, other than an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer with n the true intent and meaning of the said O ders, shall use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or

daily labourers.

- 21. No luggage, which in the opinion of the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Corporaductor or other duly authorised omeer of the Corpora-tion from its size or otherwise is unsuitable for con-veyance in or up on a carriage, shall be taken in or upon such carriage. Any personal luggage, including the tools of artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers, carried by passengers shall be placed in such part of the carriage as the conductor or other duly authorised officer as aforesaid may direct, and shall be carried at the owner's risk. No package or luggage of any description unaccompanied by a passenger shall be conveyed upon any carriage, except on such terms and under such regulations or restrictions as the Corporation may make.
- 22. No passenger or person other than a servant of the Corporation so authorised shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platform of any carriage, or sit on the outside rail on the roof or platform of any carriage, and any person so travelling or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

  23. No person except a passenger or intending passenger shall enter or mount any carriage, and no

person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers (except as herein provided).

24. When any carriage contains in the interior thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation according to the notice thereof attached to such carriage is provided in such interior, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain therein except by the express permission of the conductor first had and obtained. When any carriage contains on the outside thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation according to the notice thereof attached to such carriage is provided on such outside, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain thereon.

25. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount or leave any carriage whilst in motion; and no person shall stand on the steps of any carriage longer than is necessary to enter or leave the carriage.

26. No unauthorised person shall interfere in any way with the electrical equipment or other mechanical apparatus of any carriage. The bye-laws and regulations nerematics set forth shall extend and apply to all streets, roads, and thoroughfares within the Burgh of Perth in which tramways are la'd, which streets, roads, or thoroughfares are hereinafter referred to as "streets."

2. The expression "slow-going traffic" as used in these bye-laws and regulations includes all vehicles proceeding at a walking pace, and shall also include cattle, sheep, and other anin als driven along the streets.

3. The driver of any traffic which at the time may

3. The driver of any traffic which at the time may be going on the c ntre of the street at a slower rate of speed than a transway car proceeding in the same direction, shall, as soon as possible, upon warning being given by the driver of the transway car either by ringing a bell or by blowing a whistle, draw to the side of the street so as to admit of the car getting past, unless the driver can quicken the pace so as to keep

dear of the tramay car.

4. Any vehicle intending to go down a side street, which shall necessitate such vehicle crossing the tram lines, must keep its own side of the street until abreast of the side street down which such vehicle is to be taken or turned, and then cross over the tram lines direct.

5. Any vehicle emerging from a side street on to a street on which tram lines are laid with the intention of crossing such tram lines, shall be brought to a stand until the driver thereof has ascertained that no tramway

car is in the way. 6. When it is necessary that a vehicle should stand on the street, it shall be drawn close to the kerb, and shall be kept there no longer than can be reasonably avoided. Any Police Constable may order the person in charge of a standing vehicle, which has been obstructing the traffic for an undue time, to move it to some place where it will not obstruct the traffic.

7. In the event of any vehicle breaking down on any street or any load falling from a vehicle, the person in charge of the vehicle shall immediately remove the vehicle or load from the street, and if he fail to do so, the Town Council may, through any of their officials in their option, remove such vehicle or load.

8. The driver of any vehicle who intends to turn out of the line of traffic in which he is then driving shall, when practicable, give a signal by holding up his hand

to other drivers who may be following him.

9. Any person offending against, or committing a breach of these bye-laws and regulations, or any part thereof, on conviction shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, provided always that the magistrate before whom any penalty is sought to be recovered may order the whole or part only of the same

to be paid, or may remit the whole.

10. These Bye-Laws and Regulations shall come into force on the First day of March, Nineteen Hundred

and Six Years.
