Then, by the Sovereign's command, the Hon. Major-General Ludlow was introduced into the presence between Sir David Dundas and Sir John Colpoys, the two junior Knights Companions prefent, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with the accustomed reverences.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Lord Henley, the second Knight in seniority present, and Major-General Ludlow, kneeling, was knighted therewith:—Then his Royal Highness the Duke of York, the senior

Knight, prefented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and his Majesty put them over the new Knight's right shoulder, who, being thus invested, had the honour to kis his Majesty's

Major-General Moore was afterwards introduced, knighted, and invested with the same ceremonies; and he having likewise kissed his Majesty's hand, the procession returned in the order above mentioned.

Copy of a letter from Commodore Hood, Commander in Chief of his Majefty's ships and vessels at the Leeward Islands, to William Marsden, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship the Centaur, Barbadoes, Sept. 1. 1804.

In fending you to Captain Shipley's account of the boats of his Majesty's ship Centaur, cutting two privateer schooners out of Basseterre, Guadaloupe, it scarcely needs comment on the great gallantry of Lieutenant Sibley, the other officers and men, and they deferve my warmely praife for the cool and perfevering conduct they exhibited under so severe a fire from the enemy's numerous batteries; and the judgment of Captain Shipley, in fending them at a proper moment, aided the foccessful termination of this business without much lofs. His Majesty's Ship Centaur, off Guadaloupe, July 31, 1804.

I have to acquaint you, that last night Lieutenants Sibley, Ourridge, and Pearce, and Mr Lloyd midshipman, with four boats, accompanied by a proportion of petty officers, seamen, and marines, all volunteers from his Majesty's ship under my command, made a successful and gallant attack on the enemy's privateers in Baffeterre Roads, Guadaloupe, bringing out, without an air of wind, a schooner, name unknown, of two guns, and L'Elisabeth, mounting fix guns, pierced for twelve, and having 65 men on-board, most of which were either killed, drown-ed, or swam on shore, under a dreadful sire of

grape and musquetry, from the numerous batteries and troops which lined the beach.

Lieutenant Sibley's spirit and judgment, in conducting the attack, I cannot too much comconducting the attack, I cannot too much commend; and he speaks in the highest terms of the brave officers and men under his orders. L'E. lisabeth is esteemed the fastest failing privateer out of Guadaloupe, and has been uncommonly fortunate this war. Though I am under the necessity of inclosing a list of the killed and wounded in the boats, I must remark, it is smaller than might reasonably have been expected. His Majetty's ship has recaptured the Elisabeth of Liverpool, from the coast of Africa, taken by the pool, from the coaft of Africa, taken by the Decide; and detained, on suspicion, the Grecian ship St Nicholas, with produce, from Guadaloupe.
