The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. It is this day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That the order in Council issued on the 5th of this instant November, for proroguing the Parliament from Tuesday the 27th day of this instant November, to Thursday the 3d January next, be discharged; and that the Parliament be prorogued from Tuesday said 27th day of November, to Tuesday the 15th day of January next: and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the united kingdom called Great Britain, is to cause a commission to be preserted in the usual manner for profion to be prepared in the usual manner for pro-roguing the Parliament accordingly.

BY THE KING PROCLAMATION GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the 27th day of this instant November, We, with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said 27th day of this instant November, to Tuesday the 15th day of January 1805: And we have given orders to our Chancellor of that part of our given orders to our Chancellor of that part of our united kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And we do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare our royal will and pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said 15th day of January 1805, be held, and sit, for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knichts. Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Com-Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Com-

missioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at West-

minster, on the said 15th day of January 1805.
