REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for situations as Female Learner in the Department of the Postmaster-General in Edinburgh, Dublin, and certain other towns.

These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

- 1. The limits of age for this situation are 15 and 18. If an examination begins in January, February, or March in any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of January in that year. If an examination begins in April, May, or June in any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of April in that year. If an examination begins in July, August, or September in any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of July in that year. If an examination begins in October, November, or December in any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of October in that year.
- 2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—
