NOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty the King will hold a Levée at St. James' Palace on Tuesday the 22nd June, at 12 o'clock noon, and that for this Levée Cards of Admission will be required.

The following are the rules to be observed:—

Gentlemen who have been presented and who wish to attend this Levée, are requested to make a written application, as detailed below.

No application can be received from gentlemen wishing to be presented. Their names must be forwarded by the gentleman making the presentation.

ATTENDANCES AND PRESENTATIONS.

All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

Deputy Lieutenants of Counties and all Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Army, Special Reserve, Militia, Territorial Force, Yeomanry, or Volunteers, of whatever rank, except those on the Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards, Whitehall; but Officers of the Household Cavalry or the Brigade of Guards should communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace.

All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and

of the Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall, with the exception of Officers of the local Forces of the Colonies possessing responsible Government, who will apply to the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards, Whitehall, for their cards for attendance or for presentation by the Inspector-General. The application must in all cases be supported by a credential from the Governor or Officer commanding the local Forces of the Colony.

Recorders, Metropolitan Police Magistrates, and other Stipendiary Magistrates, and all Gentlemen connected with the Home Office, are requested to make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Home Secretary.

Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, are requested to make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

Similarly, all Gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office, Civil Staff of the War Office, or any Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation at Levées from the Department under which they serve.

Peers, Bishops, Members of Parliament, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all Gentlemen

other than the above mentioned, will be good enough to communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace, when they will each be furnished with a card of admission for use at the Levée.

Acknowledgment of applications will not be made, but cards of admission will be sent as soon as possible to the addresses given.

MOTOR CARS.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (BURGH OF NAIRN) ORDER, 1909. Dated 11th May 1909.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by section 9, as read with section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the Town Council of the Burgh of Nairn, being the local authority of the said Burgh, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Nairn) Order, 1909," and the regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which, for the purpose of giving effect thereto, the local authority shall, in terms of section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, place notices in conspicuous places on or near such limits or places.
2. A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the schedule to this Order.

LIMITS OR PLACES.

Cawdor Road from the Burgh Boundary along Cawdor Street and High Street to the junction of High Street with Bridge Street.
