At the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 21st of February 1805.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This day the Most Reverend Father in God Doctor Charles Manners Sutton, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, was, by his Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

WESTMINSTER, FEB. 22, 1805.

This day the Lords being met, and the Commons attending, the Royal Assent, by Commission, was given to

An Act for raising the sum of Three Millions by Loans or Exchequer Bills for the service of Great Britain, for the year One thousand eight hundred and five.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act made in the forty-third year of his present Majesty, for consolidating certain of the provisions contained in any act or acts relating to the duties under the management of the commissioners for the affair of taxes, and for amending the same so far as relates to the power of acting as Commissioners in certain districts.

An act to continue, until six weeks after the commencement of the next Session of Parliament, an act made in the last Session of Parliament, for continuing an act to empower the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, to apprehend and detain such persons as he or they shall suspect for conspiring against his Majesty's person and government.

An act to indemnify such persons in the united kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the times limited for those purposes respectively, until the twenty-fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and five, and to permit such persons in Great Britain as have omitted to make and file affidavits of the execution of indentures of Clerks to attorneys and solicitors, to make and file the same on or before the first day of Michaelmas term, one thousand eight hundred and five.

An act to indemnify all persons employed in the

disposal of coals in the coal-market in the city of London, who have incurred penalties under certain provisions of an act, made in the forty-third year of his present Majesty, for establishing a free market in the city of London for the sale of coals, and for preventing frauds and impositions in the vend and delivery of all coals brought into the port of London, within certain places therein mentioned. And three private acts.

DOWNING-STREET, FEB. 22, 1805.

The King has been pleased to appoint Edward Thornton, Esq. to be his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Circle of Lower Saxony, and resident with the Hans Towns.

WHITEHALL, FEB. 23, 1805.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Honourable and Reverend Edward Legge, Clerk, Bachelor of Laws, the Deanry of his Majesty's Chapel Royal in the Castle of Windsor, with the Deanry of Wolverhampton, and Registry of the Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter thereunto annexed, the same being void by the translation of Doctor Charles Manners Sutton, Bishop of Norwich, late Dean thereof, to the Archbishopric of Canterbury.

The King has also been pleased to grant to the Honourable and Reverend Jacob Marham, Clerk, Doctor in Divinity, the place and dignity of a Prebendary of his Majesty's free chapel of St. George, in the Castle of Windsor, the same being void by the resignation of the Honourable Edward Legge, Clerk.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Rose, commanding his Majesty's gun-brig the Growler, to W. Marsden, Esq. dated the 15th February 1805, Falmouth.

SIR,

I beg leave to acquaint you, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, with my arrival at this port, with the French national gun-brig No. 193. which I fell in with and captured after a running action of one hour and a half. From what I can understand from the Captain, the

was [one of four of the same class, from Bayon to Brest, commanded by an Enseigne de Vaisseau, had on board fifteen seamen, a Captain in the army and thirty-four soldiers, mounts two long twenty-four-pounders and one eighteen-pounder, and four swivels, sixty-five feet on the keel, is quite new, and draws six feet water.
