PRESENT,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1889," it is, among other things, enacted that the Board of Trade shall from time to time cause such new denominations of standards for the measurement of electricity as appear to them to be required for use in trade to be made and duly verified.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 23rd day of August, 1894, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, was pleased to approve the several denominations of standards set forth in the Schedule thereto as new denominations of standards for electrical measurement.

And whereas in the said Schedule the limits of accuracy attainable in the use of the said denominations of standards are stated as follows:—

For the Ohm within one hundredth part of one per cent.

For the Ampere within one tenth part of one per cent.

For the Volt within one tenth part of one per cent.

And whereas, at an International Conference on Electrical Units and Standards held in London in the month of October, 1908, the International Electrical Units corresponding with the said denominations of standards were defined as follows:—

The International Ohm is the resistance offered to an unvarying electric current by a column of mercury at the temperature of melting ice 14·4521 grammes in mass of a

constant cross sectional area and of a length of 106·300 centimetres.

The International Ampere is the unvarying electric current which when passed through a solution of nitrate of silver in water deposits silver at the rate of 0·00111800 of a gramme per second.

The International Volt is the electrical pressure which when steadily applied to a conductor whose resistance is one International Ohm will produce a current of one International Ampere.

And whereas it has been made to appear to the Board of Trade to be desirable that the denominations of standards for the measurement of electricity should agree in value with the said International Electrical Units within the said limits of accuracy attainable.

And whereas the denominations of standards made and duly verified in 1894 and set forth in the Schedule to the said Order in Council have been again verified.

And whereas the Board of Trade are advised that the said denominations of standards agree in value with the said international electrical units within the said limits of accuracy attainable, except that in the case of the Ohm the temperature should be 16·4 c. in place of 15·4 c. as specified in the Schedule to the said Order in Council.

And whereas it has been made to appear to the Board of Trade that the said denominations of standards should be amended so that the aforesaid exception may be remedied.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the said Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to revoke the said Order in Council dated the 23rd day of August, 1894, and is further pleased to approve the several denominations of standards

set out in the Schedule hereto as denominations of standards for the measurement of electricity.

" SCHEDULE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

" I. *Standard of Electrical Resistance.*

" A standard of electrical resistance denominated one Ohm agreeing in value within the limits of accuracy aforesaid with that of the International Ohm and being the resistance between the copper terminals of the instrument marked ' Board of Trade Ohm Standard Verified, 1894 and 1909,' to the passage of an unvarying electrical current when the coil of insulated wire forming part of the aforesaid instrument and connected to the aforesaid terminals is in all parts at a temperature of 16.4 c.

" II. *Standard of Electrical Current.*

" A standard of electrical current denominated one Ampere agreeing in value within the limits of accuracy aforesaid with that of the International Ampere and being the current which is passed in and through the coils of wire forming part of the instrument marked ' Board of Trade Ampere Standard Verified, 1894 and 1909,' when on reversing the current in the fixed coils the change in the forces acting upon the suspended coil in its sighted position is exactly balanced by the force exerted by Gravity in Westminster upon the iridioplatinum weight marked A and forming part of the said instrument.

" III. *Standard of Electrical Pressure.*

" A standard of electrical pressure denominated one Volt agreeing in value within the limits of accuracy aforesaid with that of the International Volt and being one hundredth part of the pressure which when applied between the terminals forming part of the instrument marked ' Board of Trade Volt Standard Verified, 1894 and 1909,' causes that rotation of the suspended portion of the instrument which is exactly measured by the coincidence of the sighting wire with the image of the fiducial mark A before and after application of the pressure and with that of the fiducial mark B during the application of the pressure these images being produced by the suspended mirror and observed by means of the eyepiece.

" In the use of the above standards the limits of accuracy attainable are as follows:—

" For the Ohm, within one hundredth part of one per cent.

" For the Ampere, within one tenth part of one per cent.

" For the Volt, within one tenth part of one per cent.

" The coils and instruments referred to in this Schedule are deposited at the Board of Trade Standardizing Laboratory, 8 Richmond Terrace, Whitehall, London.

MOTOR CARS.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (BURGH OF GALASHIELS) ORDER, 1910. Dated January 14th, 1910.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by section 9, as read with section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the Town Council of the Burgh of Galashiels, being the local authority of the said Burgh, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Galashiels) Order, 1910," and the regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which, for the purpose of giving effect thereto, the local authority shall, in terms of section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, place notices in conspicuous places on or near such limits or places.
2. A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the schedule to this Order.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 13TH JANUARY 1910.)

FIFESHIRE (STRANGLES AND INFLUENZA) ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Power to make Regulations.

1.—(1) The Local Authority of a District mentioned in the Schedule hereto may by Regulation applicable to their District declare that the owner or person in charge of a horse affected with strangles or influenza, or suspected of being so affected, shall not

(i.) expose the horse in a market, fair, sale-yard, or other public or private place where horses are commonly exposed for sale;

(ii.) place the horse in a lair or other place adjacent to or connected with a market, fair, or sale-yard, or where horses are commonly placed before exposure for sale;

(iii.) place or keep the horse on common or unenclosed land, or in a field or place insufficiently fenced, or in a field adjoining other land on which horses are kept or adjoining a highway unless the field is so fenced or situate that animals therein cannot in any manner come in contact with any horse kept on the adjoining land or passing along the highway or grazing on the sides thereof;

(iv.) graze the horse on pasture being on the sides of a highway;

(v.) allow the horse to stray on a highway or thoroughfare or on the sides thereof;

(vi.) place the horse, or cause it to be placed in any stable or building in the occupation of some person other than the owner or person in charge of the horse, unless such occupier has notice of the horse being affected or suspected of being affected;

(vii.) take the horse or cause it to be taken into any public shoeing-forge or smithy; or

(viii.) permit the horse to drink from any public watering trough.

(2) The Regulations may be restricted to strangles or to influenza.

(3) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of
Animals Act, 1894.

2. Horses shall be animals, and strangles and influenza shall be diseases for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):

Section forty-three (Police);

Section forty-four (General Administrative Provisions);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences or procedure.

Exemption of Army Veterinary Service and
Veterinary Colleges.

3. Nothing in this Order applies to any horse kept in stables of military barracks or camps under the care and supervision of the Army Veterinary Service, or in stables of any Veterinary College affiliated to the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the FIFESHIRE (STRANGLES AND INFLUENZA) ORDER OF 1910.
