ORDER NO. 5 BY THE SCOTCH EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.

SCHOOL BOARD OF KIRKCALDY AND DYSART.

At Dover House, Whitehall, the twenty-seventh day of October 1910.

By the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education in Scotland.

WHEREAS by subsection (1) of section 22 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908 (8 Edward VII., cap. 63), it is enacted that where it is represented to the Department by a School Board that it would be expedient that the district or part of a district of the said school board should be united with the adjacent district or part of district of another school board, so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one school board, the Department shall consult with the authorities concerned, and may cause a local inquiry to be held, and, if they are of opinion

that the districts should be united, may by order provide for uniting the said districts as aforesaid :

And whereas it has been represented to the Department by the School Board of the Burgh of Kirkcaldy that it would be expedient that the district of the said School Board should be united with the adjacent district of the School Board of the Burgh of Dysart so far as for all purposes to constitute a district under one school board :

And whereas the Department, after consulting with the authorities concerned and causing a local inquiry to be held, are of opinion that the said districts should be united as aforesaid :

And whereas it is expedient that the said districts should be united as aforesaid :

And whereas a proposed Order to that effect was duly published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 26th August 1910, in terms of subsection (2) of section 22 as aforesaid :

And whereas all objections and representations respecting the same have been duly considered :

Now therefore the Department, in virtue of the powers in that behalf conferred upon them by the enactment above recited, do hereby order as follows : *videlicet* ;

1. The district of the School Board of the Burgh of Kirkcaldy shall, from and after the date at which this Order shall commence to have effect, be united with the district of the School Board of the Burgh of Dysart so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one School Board.

2. The existing school boards of the Burgh of Kirkcaldy and the Burgh of Dysart shall cease to exist, and there shall be established in their room for the districts united as aforesaid one school

board to be called "The School Board of Kirkcaldy and Dysart."

3. The said School Board of Kirkcaldy and Dysart (hereinafter referred to as "the School Board") shall consist of the eighteen members who at the date hereof constitute the said existing school boards. The said members shall hold office until the school board election to be held in the year 1911 in terms of section 27, subsection (1) of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908, after which date the number of members of the School Board shall be thirteen.

4. The whole property heritable and moveable, real and personal, including the respective school funds and any funds held in trust, belonging to the existing school boards, and all debts and obligations due to the existing school boards, shall be transferred to and vested in the School Board; and all teachers, janitors, officers, and other employees in the service of the existing school boards shall be transferred to, and become teachers, janitors, officers, and employees in the service of the School Board.

5. The whole debts and liabilities of the existing school boards shall be taken over by, and become debts and liabilities of, the School Board.

6. The whole expenses of the proceedings in connection with this Order shall be defrayed out of the school fund of the School Board.

7. In this Order the expression "the Department" means the Scotch Education Department.

8. This Order shall commence to have effect on the 1st day of December 1910.

CHANCERY OF THE ORDER OF SAINT MICHAEL
AND SAINT GEORGE,
DOWNING STREET, October 24, 1910.

The King has been graciously pleased to give directions for the following promotion in the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George:—

To be an Ordinary Member of the Second Class, or Knights Commanders of the said Most Distinguished Order:—

Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Lionel Gallwey, C.M.G., D.S.O., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Saint Helena.

WHITEHALL, October 25, 1910.

His Majesty The King has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to William Piercey, under the following circumstances:—On the evening of Sunday, June 19th, as an express train from Bournemouth to Waterloo was entering Lyndhurst Road Station, a little boy, about four years old, fell from the up platform on to the line, a few yards in front of the approaching train. William Piercey, a porter,

who was on duty on the platform, hearing the child scream, and seeing him lying on the line, at once sprang on to the permanent way, seized him, and jumped with him in his arms into the six-foot way. Both the little boy and his rescuer were uninjured, though they had a narrow escape from death.

Also to George Cole, who is the Stationmaster at Stockingford Station, on the Midland Railway. On the 12th May last, a little child between two and three years old wandered, unnoticed, on to the level-crossing at the station just as an express train from Birmingham to Leicester was approaching. George Cole's attention was called to the child's danger by the whistle of the engine, and, rushing across the level-crossing, he caught hold of the child's shoulders and swung it out of danger. The train was travelling very fast, and was only about 25 yards away from the child when the Stationmaster saw it, and he showed great promptness and courage in risking his life to save the life of the child.

His Majesty personally decorated William Piercey and George Cole at Marlborough House on the 12th October 1910.

Also to Ram Lal Bauri, one of His Majesty's Indian subjects. Ram Lal Bauri is a shunting porter in the employment of the East Indian Railway Company. On the 14th March 1909, he was sitting upon the brake of the first of eight empty waggons, which were being shunted upon a colliery siding, and, as the waggons went round a curve he noticed three children playing upon the line. He jumped off, ran forward, and picked up two of the children, and was trying to get hold of the third when the waggon reached and killed her. The rescuer was knocked down but escaped injury.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (FOREIGN MEAT) AMENDING REGULATIONS (SCOTLAND), 1909.

WE, THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR SCOTLAND, in pursuance of the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Amending Regulations (Scotland), 1909, hereby give notice that, for the purposes of those Regulations, the Official Certificates and Firebrand Mark of which the details are set forth in the representations or designs comprised in the schedule appended to and forming part of this Notice are, subject to such instructions as are given therein, hereby declared to be admissible, in the case of the State of Queensland from the date of the publication of this Notice, in the manner, to the extent, and subject to the rules and conditions prescribed in this Notice, as evidence that the pig from which any foreign meat is derived has been certified by a competent authority in the place of origin to be free from disease at the time of slaughter, and that the meat has been certified by the like authority to have been dressed or prepared, and packed with the needful observance of all requirements for the prevention of danger arising to public health from the meat as an article of food :

AND FURTHER, with respect to the manner, to the extent, and to the rules and conditions in, to, and subject to which every Official Certificate is admissible as evidence for any such purpose as is hereinbefore described, We hereby prescribe as follows, that is to say :—

(i) An Official Certificate used in relation to foreign meat, or in relation to a box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the meat is derived from a pig.

(ii) An Official Certificate in the form of a label shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the label is securely affixed or attached to any foreign meat, or to any box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat; and where the label so affixed or attached has not, in any other circumstances, or on any other occasion, been used as an Official Certificate.

(iii) In this Notice, any word or expression to which a special meaning is assigned by the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Amending Regulations (Scotland), 1909, has the same meaning as in those Regulations.

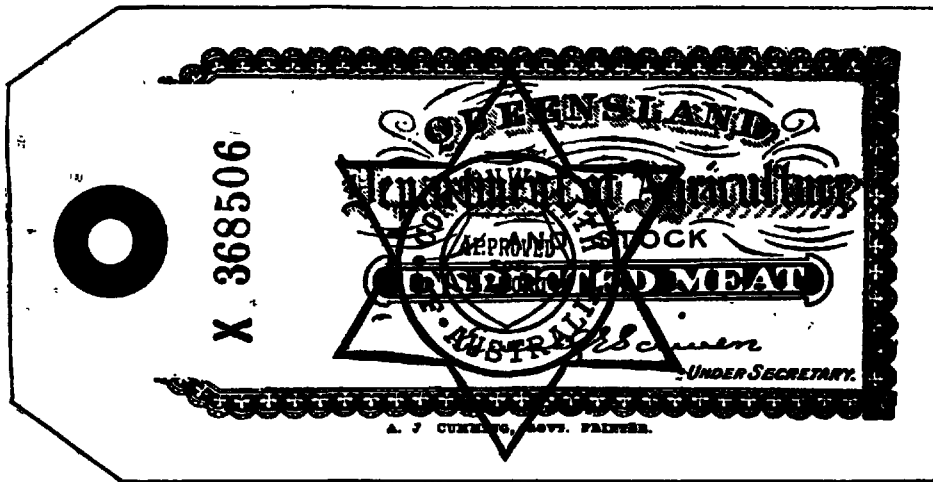

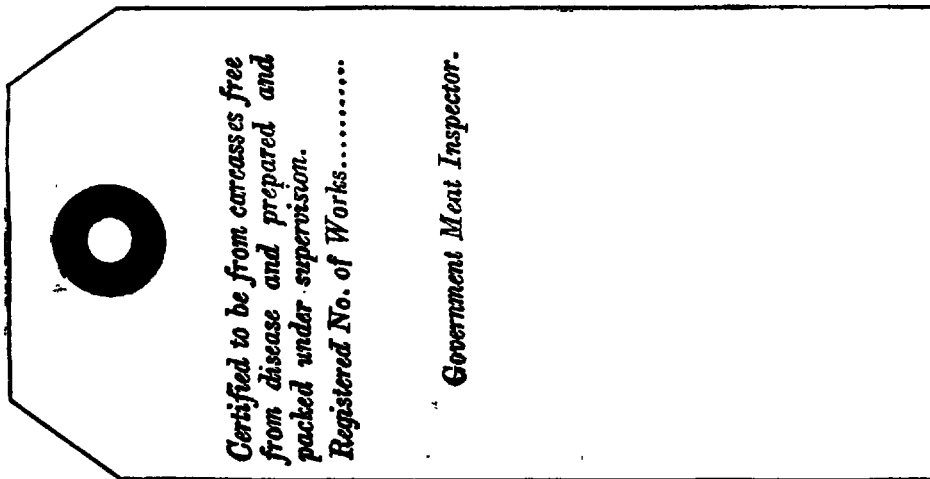

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION,
