### A PROCLAMATION

*For removing doubts as to the Effect of a Royal Proclamation of the 22nd March last appointing Friday, the 23rd June next, a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday in the County of London.*

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS We, by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the 22nd day of March 1911, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Acts recited in the said Proclamation, did command that Thursday, the 22nd day of June next, be observed as a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, and that Friday, the 23rd day of June next, be observed as a second Bank Holiday and Public Holiday in the County of London: And whereas doubts might arise whether the second Holiday appointed in the County of London by the said Proclamation should be observed in the City of London as well as in the rest of the Administrative County of London: Now, therefore, We do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Acts so far as the same are severally applicable, appoint Friday, the 23rd day of June next, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday throughout the area of the Administrative County of London, including the City of London.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace this fourth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and in the First year of Our Reign.
