WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Commission dated the 10th day of November 1911, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, or any two of them, in His Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required :

And whereas by section 659 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which is a section in Part XI. of that Act and which re-enacts similar provisions by the said Act repealed of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854), it is (among other things) enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council fix the establishments to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys,

and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of these establishments, and that an increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed shall not be made without the consent of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by section 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is (among other things) provided that references in Part XI. of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, to the Mercantile Marine Fund shall be construed as references to the General Lighthouse Fund by the now reciting Act constituted :

And whereas His late Majesty, by Order in Council dated the 10th day of May 1905, was pleased to fix the establishment which might be maintained by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses and the amount of the salaries to be paid to the officers of the said establishment :

And whereas it is expedient that the establishment of the said Commissioners should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing :

And whereas the Board of Trade have consented to such variation of the establishment :

Now, therefore, His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, being authorised thereto by His Majesty's said Commission, do hereby, on His Majesty's behalf, by virtue of the power vested in His Majesty by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of any other powers Him thereunto enabling, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, fix as follows, that is to say :—

The number of Lower Grade Clerks on the

establishment of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses and mentioned in the Schedule to the said Order in Council dated the 10th May 1905, shall from the date of this Order be increased to two, and the increments of salary payable to such Lower Grade Clerks shall, in lieu of the increments specified in the said Schedule, be as follows, viz.: £7 10s. per annum until the salary reaches £125 per annum and £10 per annum thereafter until the maximum salary of £250 per annum has been reached; but the annual increase of such salaries shall be only granted on a certificate by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses that the preceding period of the officer's service has been distinguished by zeal, industry, and regularity.

And His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, being so authorised as aforesaid, do hereby, on His Majesty's behalf, by virtue and in exercise of the powers so vested in His Majesty as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, order, and it is hereby ordered, that the salaries payable under the provisions of this Order shall be paid out of the General Lighthouse Fund.

FOREIGN OFFICE, January 23, 1912.

His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from His Majesty's Ambassador at Rome a communication to the following effect:—

The Italian Government has notified the establishment of a blockade, from the 22nd instant, by Italian ships of war, of the Ottoman Red Sea Coast between latitude 15° 11' and latitude 14° 30' from Rasisa, North of Hodeidah, to Rasgoulaifac to the South.

A term, which will be fixed by the Commander of the blockading squadron, will be granted to neutral vessels, during which they may freely leave the blockaded area.

WHITEHALL, January 19, 1912.

His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the First Class to Herbert Dobinson under the following circumstances:—

On the 26th of July 1911 a serious explosion took place at an Explosive Factory belonging to Messrs. Curtis's & Harvey Limited, at Cliffe, in the county of Kent, resulting in the death of three men and serious injury to three others. The explosion took place in one of the nitro-glycerine washing and filtering houses a few minutes after Dobinson had left the building. He was knocked down by the force of the explosion, but heard a fellow workman named J. Wordley call for help. Wordley had been blown by the explosion under a gun-cotton truck,

which had caught fire, and was quite unable to do anything to free himself. Dobinson, without knowing the nature of the burning explosive, returned to the shed, ran in at the imminent risk of being killed by a further explosion, and released Wordley from his perilous position.
