WHITEHALL, MAY 27, 1805.

Dispatches have been received overland at the India-House, from Bombay, dated the 21st of December 1804, inclosing a copy of a letter from Lord Lake to Marquis Wellesley, of the 17th of November, giving an account of the result of his attack upon the cavalry of Jeshwant Rao Holkar, commanded by that chief in person upon that day being the letter which was referred to by Lord Lake in his subsequent letter of the 18th of November, as published in the London Gazette Extraordinary of the 27th of April 1805, and which was noticed in that Gazette as not having then arrived in England.

To his Excellency the Most Noble Marquis Wellesley, Governor-General, &c.

MY LORD—I have the honour to inform your Lordship, that, in pursuance of my intentions, expressed in my dispatch of yesterday's date, I reached this place this morning, with the cavalry, before day-break, after a march of upwards of thirty-four miles.

The enemy occupied a position close under the walls of Furruckabad, and I completely succeeded in surprising them. The consequence has been, that vast numbers of their men and horses have been destroyed, and the whole cattle and baggage taken, which they possessed.

Jeshwant Rao Holkar escaped by an early flight, but his troops, in the greatest confusion, were pursued, and every where cut to pieces by my cavalry. I am happy to add, that we have sustained very little loss, either in men or horses.

I have not time, at the present moment, to express the satisfaction I have derived from the good conduct of all the corps engaged, but I shall have the honour of forwarding to your Lordship my sentiments on this subject as soon as possible.

The same dispatches contain the following paragraphs respecting our Military Operations in Malwa:

"We feel also much pleasure in reporting the successful progress of the division of the army in

Malwa, under the command of Colonel Murray, which, after completing the conquest of Holkar's possessions west of the Chumbiel, reached Muccondra on the 30th of November, and still continued to advance."

"On the 8th inst. (Dec. 1804) General Jones was at Jowra, one march beyond Rutland, and would probably have joined Colonel Murray's army by or before the present date."

Translation of a Proclamation issued by his Swedish Majesty on the 8th of May, 1805.

Gustavus Adolphus, &c.—To the Regency of Pomerania, relative to the right of warehousing British goods.

By an agreement that has taken place between us and his Britannic Majesty, we have granted to the subjects of his Britannic Majesty the right, during the continuance of the war between Great Britain and France, of warehousing at Stralsund all goods and merchandise, unwrought or manufactured, the produce of Great Britain or of its colonies, conveyed in British or in Swedish vessels, such merchandise being subject, if for re-exportation by land or by sea, to a duty not exceeding three quarters per cent. ad valorem; and if for home consumption, to the same duty that is established at the port of Stralsund, as exacted from the most favoured nations.

And this we communicate to you, with our gracious commands that the operation of the same in every way facilitated and promoted.

President of the Royal College of Physicians—Dr Reynolds, Sir Francis Milman, Bart. Dr Hunter, Dr Heberden, Fellows of the said Royal College—Sir Alexander Munro, one of the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs—Dr Harnes, senior Member of the Board for the care of sick and wounded seamen.
