With reference to the Notice published in the London Gazette of January 26th last, His Regulation Acts, 1887 to 1908.

Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received a telegram from His Majesty's Ambassador at Rome, stating that an official notification from the Italian Government, dated the 6th inst., declares an extension of the blockade of the Ottoman Red Sea littoral, from the 8th inst., from Ras Isa to a point of the coast north of Loheia, situated 15° 40' north latitude and 42° 43' longitude east of Greenwich.

A period of five days, dating from the commencement of the blockade, will be allowed to neutral ships within which to leave places now blockaded. Neutral vessels proceeding to the sanitary station at Kamaran in connection with pilgrims to Mecca will be able to approach the island by a passage from the southern side under the supervision of the blockading squadron.

^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushed or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushed, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushed of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushed of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushed of oats.

The minimum (or lowest) time-rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 3s. a week, and on reaching the age of 14 they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in column 1 above as if they had commenced at 14.

The learners' rates are weekly rates based on a week of 50 hours, and they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours actually spent by the learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less or more than 50.

The Trade Board will consider any objections

to the above rates which may be lodged with them within three months from the fourth day of April 1912. NATIONAL INSURANCE ACT, 1911.

The National Health Insurance Joint Committee have made the following Order under section 78 of the above-named Act:—

Whereas by section 58 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called the Act), it is amongst other things enacted that the Insurance Commissioners shall as soon as may be after the passing of the Act appoint an Advisory Committee for the purpose of giving the Insurance Commissioners advice and assistance in connection with the making and altering of Regulations under Part I. of the Act, consisting amongst other persons of representatives of approved societies:

And whereas by section 78 of the Act it is amongst other things provided that if any

difficulty arises with respect to the constitution of the Advisory Committee the Insurance Commissioners with the consent of the Treasury may by Order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for the establishment of the Advisory Committee, and that any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas by the National Insurance (Joint Committee) Regulations, 1912, it is amongst other things provided that the Joint Committee of the several bodies of Commissioners established under the Act (in this Order called the Joint Committee) shall exercise and perform either alone or jointly with the several bodies of Commissioners as the case may require

such of the powers and duties of such bodies under sections 58 and 78 of the Act as may be necessary to enable the Joint Committee to exercise and perform the several powers and duties of the Joint Committee under the Act and those Regulations:

And whereas by those Regulations it is amongst other things provided that certain of the powers and duties of the several bodies of Commissioners under Part I. of the Act, with respect to the making of Regulations under that part of the Act, shall be exercised and performed by the Joint Committee, and for that purpose it is necessary in accordance with the provisions of section 58 aforesaid that the Joint Committee should establish an Advisory Committee for the purpose of assisting them in connection with the making and altering of those Regulations:

And whereas before the Joint Committee can grant approval to a society for the purposes of the Act it is necessary that regulations prescribing the form of certain of the rules of such a society should be prescribed by the said Commissioners and by reason of the premises a difficulty arises with respect to the constitution of the Advisory Committee:

Now therefore, the Joint Committee, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and by the said Regulations and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the Lords Com-missioners of His Majesty's Treasury, order as

- (1) The requirement of section 58 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, that the Advisory Committee shall amongst other persons comprise representatives of Approved Societies, shall be modified so as to require that the first Committee appointed under section 58 of the Act shall comprise in place of representatives of those societies representatives of such bodies of persons corporate or unincorporate as in the opinion of the Joint Committee are desirous of transacting insurance business under Part I. of the Act and of either themselves applying for approval under that part of the Act or of establishing a separate section for that purpose, and the said section 58 shall have effect accordingly.
- (2) This Order shall come into force upon the date upon which it is made, and shall continue in force and have effect until revoked by any subsequent order made by the Joint Committee for the purpose, provided that any such revocation shall not affect any appointment made under the provisions of this Order.
- (3) This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Advisory Committee) Order 1912.
