HOUSING, TOWN PLANNING, &c., ACT, 1909.

THE ROYAL BURGH OF INVERKEITHING.

Burgh of Inverkeithing (hereinafter referred to as "The Council") being the Local Authority within the said Burgh under the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, passed a resolution on the fifteenth day of March 1912, applying to Us, the Local Government Board for Scotland, to authorise the Council to prepare a Town Planning Scheme for the whole of the land within the said Royal Burgh, and for certain portions of land situate within the area administered by the County Council of the County of Fife and the Dunfermline District Committee of the said County Council, all as shown on the "Map No. 2" referred to in the said resolution, on which Map the boundaries of the area proposed to be town-planned are edged with red.

And whereas the resolution of the Council, together with the map marked "Map No. 2" referred to therein, has been transmitted to Us, and We have inquired into the application and into the circumstances connected therewith.

Now therefore We, the Local Government

Board for Scotland, do hereby, under the provisions of subsections (2) and (3) of section 54 of the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, authorise the Council to prepare a Town Planning Scheme with reference to the land (including land already built upon and land not likely to be used for building purposes) to which the aforesaid application relates.

And We do further authorise the Council in the preparation of the scheme as aforesaid to provide therein for the demolition or alteration of any of the buildings on the land included in the area in respect of which a scheme may be prepared as aforesaid, so far as may be necessary for carrying the scheme into effect.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE COMMISSION (SCOTLAND).

Notice is hereby given, in terms of section 113 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, that the Joint Committee established under the Act and the Scottish Insurance Commissioners acting jointly propose to make special Orders under paragraph (i) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act, specifying the employment of the classes mentioned in the subjoined lists as being of such a nature that they are ordinarily adopted as subsidiary employments only, and not as the principal means of livelihood. ^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
