PUBLIC HEALTH (PULMONARY TUBER-CULOSIS) REGULATIONS (SCOTLAND). 1912.

To ALL LOCAL AUTHORITIES IN SCOTLAND ;

To All Medical Practitioners ;

To All School Medical Officers; and

To All others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS We, the Local Government Board for Scotland, are empowered by section 78 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, from time to time to make, alter, and revoke Regulations with a view to the treatment of persons affected with any endemic or infectious disease and for preventing the spread of the disease; and to provide for the enforcement and execution of the Regulations:

And whereas Pulmonary Tuberculosis is an endemic and infectious disease :

And whereas it appears to Us to be expedient that for preventing the spread of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, such Regulations as are hereinafter set forth should be made in relation to that disease:

Now therefore We, by this Our Order and in exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, do make the following Regulations, that is to say :--

DEFINITIONS.

Article I. (a)—Expressions used in these Regulations shall (unless such meaning is inconsistent with the context) have the meanings assigned to them in the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897. (b)—The expression "Medical Practitioner" means registered Medical Practitioner.

(c)—The expression "School Medical Officer" means the Medical Officer appointed under the provisions of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908.

COMMENCEMENT OF REGULATIONS.

Article II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of August one thousand nine hundred and twelve, and shall then and thereafter apply and have effect throughout Scotland, and shall be enforced and executed by every Local Authority and their officers.

NOTIFICATION BY MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS.

Article III.—(1) Subject as provided in Article IX. of these Regulations, every Medical Practitioner attending on or called in to visit any person shall, within 48 hours after first becoming aware that such person is suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, complete, sign, and transmit a notification of the case in the form set forth in Schedule A. to these Regulations to the Medical Officer of Health of the district in which the person is residing:

Provided that notification under this subdivision of this Article shall not be required in the case of any person suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis who is receiving treatment as an in-patient in a sanatorium or other hospital or institution in which special provision is made for such treatment.

(2) Every Medical Practitioner who is a School Medical Officer shall, within 48 hours after first becoming aware that any children whom he has examined by virtue of his appointment under the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908, are suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, complete and sign | in the form set forth in Schedule C. to these a notification in the Form set forth in Schedule B. to these Regulations, and shall transmit the notification to the Medical Officer of Health of the district in which the school is situate.

(3) A Medical Practitioner or School Medical Officer shall not be required to notify any case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis which has already. to his knowledge, been notified under these Regulations to the Medical Officer of Health of the district in which the person is residing.

Article IV .- A notification to be transmitted to a Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of these Regulations may be transmitted by being delivered to that Officer or by being delivered at his office or residence, or may be sent by prepaid letter post addressed to him at his office or at his residence.

SUPPLY OF NOTIFICATION FORMS, ETC.

Article V.-For the purposes of these Regulations-

- (i). Every Local Authority shall provide and maintain a sufficient supply of printed copies of the forms set forth in Schedules A. and B. to these Regulations.
- (ii.) Every Local Authority shall as soon as practicable after these Regulations come into operation, and afterwards from time to time when application is made to them, supply printed copies of the form set forth in the Schedule A. to these Regulations to every Medical Practitioner resident within the district of the Local Authority, and printed copies of the form set forth in Schedule B. to these Regulations to the School Medical Officer of every School situate within the district of the Local Authority.

Article VI.—Every Local Authority shall, before the coming into operation of these Regulations, give public notice of the effect thereof, so far as they impose obligations on Medical Practitioners, by advertisement in a local newspaper and by handbills and otherwise in such manner as the Local Authority think sufficient for giving information to such Medical Practitioners. They shall also send a copy of the Regulations to each Medical Practitioner whom, after due inquiry, they ascertain to be residing or practising in their district.

REMUNERATION OF MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS.

Article VII.-The Local Authority of the district within which the patient is residing shall pay to the Medical Practitioner the sum of two shillings and sixpence in respect of each notification sent by him in pursuance of these Regulations.

Provided that no fee shall be payable under this Article to a School Medical Officer in respect of notifications sent in terms of Article III. (2).

DUTIES OF MEDICAL OFFICERS OF HEALTH.

Article VIII.--(1) A Medical Officer of Health who receives from a Medical Practitioner or School Medical Officer a notification relating to a patient whose usual place of residence is not within the district for which he is Medical Officer of Health. shall forthwith transmit, Regulations (Scotland), 1912."

Regulations, particulars of the notification to the Medical Officer of Health for the district in which the usual place of residence of the patient is situate.

(2) Where a Medical Officer of Health has received a notification in error, he shall at once forward the same to the Medical Officer of Health of the district to whom it should have been addressed in the first instance, and shall at the same time inform the notifying Medical Practitioner that he has done so, giving the name and address of the said Medical Officer of Health.

(3) Every Medical Officer of Health shall enter in a Register to be kept by him for that purpose (a) the full particulars contained in every notification received by him under these Regulations (except such notifications as are received in error); and (b) the date when particulars of a notification have been transmitted to a Medical Officer of Health in terms of Sub-division (1) of this Article. The said notifications and Register shall be kept in the custody of the Medical Officer of Health, and shall not be open to inspection by any person other than a person specially authorised by resolution of the Local Authority, any School Medical Officer acting within the district, or an officer of the Local Government Board for Scotland.

(4) Any expenses incurred by a Medical Officer of Health in carrying out the duties imposed upon him by this Article shall be defraved by the Local Authority of the district for which he is Medical Officer of Health.

LIMITATION OF SCOPE OF REGULATIONS.

Article IX.-Nothing in these Regulations shall have effect so as to require a notification to be transmitted to a Medical Officer of Health in respect of any inmate of any building, ship, vessel, boat, tent, van, shed, or similar structure belonging to His Majesty the King.

NON-DISQUALIFICATION OF MEDICAL PRAC-TITIONER, ETC.

Article X.-A payment made to any Medical Practitioner in pursuance of these Regulations shall not disqualify that practitioner for serving as a member of a County Council, District Committee or Town Council, or as a member of a parish council or school board, or in any municipal or parochial office.

Where a Medical Practitioner attending on a patient is himself the Medical Officer of Health of the district he shall be entitled to the fee to which he would be entitled if he were not such Medical Officer of Health.

ORDERS UNDER INFECTIOUS DISEASE (NOTIFI-CATION) ACT, 1889, SUPERSEDED.

Article XI.—These Regulations shall supersede all orders (permanent or temporary) made by Local Authorities extending the provisions of the Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889, Pulmonary Tuberculosis or Pulmonary to Phthisis, and from and after the commencement of these Regulations they shall apply and have effect in the district of every such Local Authority.

Notice.—The Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, provides by section 87 that if any person out, or obstructs the execution of, any regulation made under Part IV. of the Act, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds; and in the case of a continuing offence, to a further penalty not exceeding *fifty pounds* for every day during which the offence continues; and any such penalty shall be recoverable with expenses at the instance of the Lord Advocate on behalf of the Board, or by any Local Authority with the consent of the Board in any competent Court.

(20th June 1912.) RAG FLOCK ACT, 1911. REGULATIONS UNDER SECTION 1 (1). GENERAL.

TO ALL LOCAL AUTHORITIES IN SCOTLAND, and to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Rag Flock Act, 1911 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted *inter alia* as follows :----"(1) It shall not be lawful for any person to "sell or have in his possession for sale "flock manufactured from rags or to use "for the purpose of making any article " of upholstery, cushions, or bedding flock." manufactured from rags or to have in "his possession flock manufactured from "rags intended to be used for any such "purpose, unless the flock conforms to "such standard of cleanliness as may be "prescribed by regulations to be made "by the Local Government Board, and "if any person sells or uses or has in his "possession flock in contravention of "this Act, he shall be liable on summary "conviction to a fine not exceeding, in "the case of a first offence, ten pounds, "or in the case of a second or subsequent "offence fifty pounds."

- "(8) This Act shall apply to Scotland with "the following modifications :---
- "(a) The expression 'Local Government "'Board' means the Local Government "Board for Scotland."

And whereas it is expedient that the Regulations hereinafter set forth be made in relation to flock manufactured from rags :

Now therefore We, the Local Government Board for Scotland, by this Our Order, and in the exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by the Act, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, do make the following Regulations, that is to say :--

Article I.—Flock shall be deemed to conform to the standard of cleanliness for the purposes of sub-section (1) of section 1 of the Act when the amount of soluble chlorine, in the form of chlorides, removed by thorough washing with distilled water at a temperature not exceeding 25 degrees Centigrade from not less than 40 grammes of a well-mixed sample of flock, does not exceed 30 parts of chlorine in 100,000 parts of the flock.

Article II.—These Regulations may be cited as "The Rag Flock Regulations (Scotland) 1912," and shall come into operation on the first day of July one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

NATIONAL INSURANCE ACT, 1911. PART II.

(UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE).

The Board of Trade hereby give notice, pursuant to section 113 (1) of the National Insurance Act, 1911, that they propose to make a special Order excluding the following employments from the occupations which are to be deemed employment in an insured trade for the purposes of Part II. of the Act (Unemployment Insurance), that is to say:—

- 1. The drivers or attendants of any vehicle.
- 2. Stablemen or other workmen employed in tending horses or to clean any vehicle.

- 3. Woodcarvers.
- 4. Workmen employed in the manufacture and fitting of upholstery for the purpose of the construction, alteration, repair, or decoration of buildings, ships, boats, or other craft.
- 5. Workmen employed in the manufacture of fittings of leather or celluloid for cycles or motor cycles.

Copies of the Order proposed to be made may be obtained on application at the Board of Trade, Central Office for Labour Exchanges and Unemployment Insurance, Queen Anne's Chambers, Westminster, S.W., at the Labour Exchanges and at the Local Offices of the Unemployment Fund.

Objections to the draft Order by or on behalf of any persons affected by the Order must be sent to the Board of Trade, Central Office for Labour Exchanges and Unemployment Insurance, Queen Anne's Chambers, Westminster, S.W., within 21 days from the date of this notice.

COPYRIGHT.

REGULATIONS dated the 19th June 1912, made by the Commissioners of Customs and Excise under Section 14 of the Copyright Act, 1911.

The Commissioners of Customs and Excise in pursuance of the powers vested in them by section fourteen of the Copyright Act, 1911, hereby prescribe the following Regulations which are to be observed on and after the first day of July nineteen hundred and twelve :---

1. The Notice in writing to be given to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise (hereafter referred to as the said Commissioners) under section fourteen of the Copyright Act, 1911, by the owner of the copyright in any book or other printed work in which copyright subsists under the said Act or his agent who is desirous that copies thereof printed or reprinted out of the United Kingdom shall not be imported into the United Kingdom shall be in the Form No. 1 in the Schedule hereto or as near thereto as circumstances permit.

2. Any notice in regard to any book or other printed work in which copyright subsisted on the 30th day of June nineteen hundred and twelve, which was given to and accepted by the said Commissioners on or before that day pursuant to section forty-two of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, or section one of the Revenue Act, 1889, shall for a period of twelve months from the first day of July nineteen hundred and twelve, if the copyright so long subsists, be treated as a notice given under section fourteen of the Copyright Act, 1911, unless the notice is withdrawn or superseded or the said Commissioners require a further notice to be given.

3. The notice in writing to be given to the said Commissioners under section fourteen of the Copyright Act, 1911, by the owner of the copyright in any work (other than a book or other printed work) in which copyright subsists

under the said Act or his agent who is desirous that copies thereof made out of the United Kingdom shall not be imported into the United Kingdom may be either a general notice in the Form No. 2 in the Schedule hereto or as near thereto as circumstances permit or a special notice in the Form No. 3 in the same Schedule relating to a particular importation.

4. Every notice given in pursuance of these regulations in the Form No. 1 or No. 2 in the Schedule hereto shall be accompanied by a statutory declaration in the Form No. 4 in the same Schedule.

5. Before any article which appears, or is alleged to be a copy of a work to which a notice applies is detained, or any further proceedings with a view to the forfeiture thereof under the law relating to the Customs are taken, the person who signed the notice whether as owner or agent shall, if required so to do, give to the said Commissioners in writing such further information and evidence, verified if so required by a statutory declaration, as they consider necessary to satisfy them that the article in question is liable to detention and forfeiture.

6. In the case of any detention in consequence of a notice in the Form No. 3 given to the said Commissioners the person who signed the notice whether as owner or agent must if so required deposit with the Collector of Customs and Excise or other Chief Officer of Customs and Excise at the port or place of detention a sum of money sufficient in the opinion of that officer to cover any expense which may be incurred in the examination required by reason of his notice of the goods detained, and if upon the examination of the goods the said Collector or other Chief Officer is satisfied that there is no ground for their detention, they will be delivered.

7. If any goods are placed under detention in consequence of any notice given in pursuance of these Regulations, the said Commissioners may require the person who signed the notice to give an undertaking in writing to reimburse them all expenses and damages incurred in respect of the detention, and of any proceedings for forfeiture subsequently taken if such an undertaking has not already been given, and may also require him within four days after the detention to enter into a bond with two approved sureties in such form and for such amount as the said Commissioners may require.

8. Any deposit of money previously made will be returned on the completion of the bond.

9. In these Regulations :-

"Owner of the copyright" has the same meaning as in section fourteen of the Copyright Act, 1911.

"Book or other printed work" means every part or division of a book, pamphlet, sheet of letterpress, sheet of music, map, plan, chart, or table separately published.
