Education (Scotland) Act, 1908.

ORDER NO. 20 BY THE SCOTCH EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.

SCHOOL BOARD OF DALKEITH.

At Dover House, Whitehall, the fourteenth day of September 1912.

By the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education in Scotland.

WHEREAS by subsection (1) of section 22 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908 (8 Edward 7, cap. 63), it is enacted that where

it is represented to the Department by a School Board that it would be expedient that the district or part of a district of the said school board should be united with the adjacent district or part of district of another school board, so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one school board, the Department shall consult with the authorities concerned, and may cause a local inquiry to be held, and, if they are of opinion that the districts should be united, may by order provide for uniting the said districts as aforesaid :

And whereas it has been represented to the Department by the School Board of Dalkeith (Town) that it would be expedient that the district of the said School Board should be united with the adjacent district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Landward), so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one school board :

And whereas the Department, after consulting with the authorities concerned and causing a local inquiry to be held, are of opinion that the said districts should be united as aforesaid :

And whereas it is expedient that the said districts should be united as aforesaid :

And whereas a proposed Order to that effect was duly published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 30th July 1912, in terms of subsection (2) of section 22 as aforesaid :

And whereas no objections or representations respecting the same have been received :

Now therefore the Department, in virtue of the powers in that behalf conferred upon them by the enactment above recited, do hereby order as follows, *videlicet* :—

1. The district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Town) shall, from and after the date at which this Order shall commence to have effect, be united with the district of the School Board of

Dalkeith (Landward) so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one School Board.

2. The existing School Boards shall cease to exist, and there shall be established in their room for the districts united as aforesaid one school board to be called "The School Board of Dalkeith."

3. The said School Board of Dalkeith (hereinafter referred to as "the School Board") shall consist of the twelve members who at the date hereof constitute the said existing school boards. The said members shall hold office until the school board election to be held in the year 1914 in terms of the Education (Scotland) Acts, 1872 to 1908, after which date the number of members of the School Board shall be nine.

4. The whole property, heritable and moveable, real and personal, including the respective school funds and any funds held in trust, belonging to the existing school boards, and all debts and obligations due to the existing school boards, shall be transferred to and vested in the School Board in property or in trust as the case may be; and save as hereinafter provided all teachers, janitors, officers, and other employees in the service of the existing school boards shall be transferred to, and become teachers, janitors, officers, and employees in the service of the School Board.

Provided always that the School Board shall not be bound to take over the Clerk to the School Board of Dalkeith (Landward), but such officer shall receive from the School Board a gratuity of thirty-five pounds as compensation for abolition of office.

5. The whole debts and liabilities of the existing school boards shall be taken over by, and become debts and liabilities of, the School Board.

6. With respect to the deficiency in the School Fund of the School Board and the sum required to meet the same, the following provisions shall have effect, *videlicet* :—

(a) The deficiency in the school fund shall be allocated upon the district of the School Board, so that for the financial year from Whitsunday 1912 to Whitsunday 1913 the school rate to be levied in the existing district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Landward) shall exceed the school rate levied in the said district for the financial year from Whitsunday 1911 to Whitsunday 1912 by twopence in the pound, and thereafter in each succeeding financial year shall exceed the school rate levied in the said district in the preceding financial year by twopence in the pound, or, in the event of the difference being less than twopence by such smaller sum per pound as may bring the said rate per pound up to an equality with the school rate per pound levied in the existing district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Town).

(b) When the school rate per pound levied in the existing district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Landward) has been brought up as aforesaid to an equality with the school rate per pound levied in the existing district of the School Board of Dalkeith (Town) and in any event from and after the sixteenth day of May 1917, the deficiency in the School Fund of the School Board of Dalkeith shall thenceforth be met by a uniform rate levied in the district of the said School Board.

(c) For the purposes of this Order the school rate per pound shall be calculated in the manner prescribed by section 25 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908.

7. The whole expenses of the proceedings in connection with this Order shall be defrayed out of the school fund of the School Board.

8. In this Order the expression "the Department" means the Scotch Education Department.

9. Notwithstanding the date hereof, this Order shall be deemed to have taken effect for the purposes of section 6 as at the sixteenth day of May one thousand nine hundred and twelve; and, *quoad ultra*, this Order shall commence to have effect on the thirtieth day of September in the same year.

TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER
SECTION 5 (2).

WHEREAS by section 4 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, it is amongst other things provided as follows:—

(1) Trade Boards shall, subject to the provisions of this section, fix minimum rates of wages for time-work for their trades (in this Act referred to as minimum time-rates), and may also fix general minimum rates of wages for piecework for their trades (in this Act referred to as general minimum piece-rates), and those rates of wages (whether time or piece-rates) may be fixed so as to apply universally to the trade, or so as to apply to any special process in the work of the trade or to any special class of workers in the trade, or to any special area.

If a Trade Board report to the Board of Trade that it is impracticable in any case to fix a minimum time-rate in accordance with this section, the Board of Trade may so far as respects that case relieve the Trade Board of their duty.

(2) Before fixing any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate, the Trade Board shall give notice of the rate which they propose to fix, and consider any objections to the rate which may be lodged with them within three months.

(3) The Trade Board shall give notice of any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by them.

And whereas by section 5 of the said Act it is amongst other things provided—

(1) Until a minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by a Trade Board has been made obligatory by order of the Board of Trade under this section, the operation of the rate shall be limited as in this Act provided.

(2) Upon the expiration of six months from the date on which a Trade Board have given notice of any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by them, the Board of Trade shall make an order (in this Act referred to as an obligatory order) making that minimum rate obligatory in cases in which it is applicable on all persons employing labour and on all persons employed, unless they are of opinion that the circumstances are such as to make it premature or otherwise undesirable to make an obligatory order, and in that case they shall make an order suspending the obligatory operation of the rate (in this Act referred to as an order of suspension).

And whereas the Trade Board established under the said Act by Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 27th April 1910, for that branch of the Box trade in Great Britain which is engaged in making boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip, or similar material, was duly constituted by the Board of Trade on 29th July 1910.

And whereas the said Trade Board gave notice on 1st September 1911 that they propose to fix minimum time-rates of wages for female workers in the said trade.

And whereas after considering the objections lodged with them within three months from 1st September 1911 the said Trade Board gave notice on 11th March 1912 that they had fixed minimum time-rates of wages for female workers in the said trade, and the rates fixed are set out in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas the said rates have been in limited operation since the 11th day of March 1912.

Now therefore the Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers in them vested as before recited, Do by this order make the said minimum time-rates fixed by the said Trade Board and set out in the said Schedule hereto obligatory in cases in which they are applicable on all persons employing labour and on all persons employed in the said trade.

SCHEDULE.

MINIMUM RATES fixed for the Trade of Making Boxes or parts thereof, made wholly or partially of Paper, Cardboard, Chip, or similar material. To come into force on 11th March 1912.

In accordance with Regulations made, under section 18 of the above Act, by the Board of Trade, and dated 27th April 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act for that branch of the Box trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip, or similar material, hereby give notice as required by section 4 (3) of the above Act, that they have fixed the following minimum (or lowest) rates of wages:—

MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

1. The minimum (or lowest) time-rates of wages for female workers in the trade of making boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip, or similar material, shall (subject to the provisions of this notice as to learners) be as follows, clear of all deductions, that is to say:—

(a) For female workers in a factory or workshop not being a domestic workshop, 3d. an hour.

(b) For female homeworkers, including workers in a domestic workshop, 3d. an hour.

(2) The above rates shall apply to all female workers in the respective classes as specified above (excepting all female learners as hereinafter defined) who are during the whole or part of their time employed in the making of boxes or parts thereof as aforesaid or in any branch or process thereof, but shall not apply to any female workers who are merely employed in work incidental or ancillary thereto.

LEARNERS.

(3) (a) In lieu of the above rates, female learners, as hereinafter defined, and no other persons, shall receive the following minimum (or lowest) time-rates of wages, that is to say:—

(b) The minimum (or lowest) time-rate for learners under 14 years of age shall be 4s. a week, and on reaching the age of 14 they shall be entitled to the amounts shewn in column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

(c) The above rates are weekly rates based on a week of 52 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduc-

tion or increase according as the number of hours actually spent in any week by the learner in the factory or workshop is less or more than 52.

(d) A learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full minimum time-rate for a worker, applicable to her under section (1) upon the fulfilment of the following conditions :—

Age of entering upon Employment.	Conditions.
Under 15 years of age	the completion of not less than 4 years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
15 and under 17 years of age ...	the completion of 3 years' employment.
17 and under 20 years of age ...	the completion of 2 years' employment.
20 years of age and over	the completion of 1 year's employment.

A learner returning to the trade after absence shall not serve a longer period as a learner than would be required if she were entering the trade for the first time.

(e) Any female who has been previously employed in any branch of the trade as described in section (1) and has not held a certificate or certified copy certificate and is subsequently taken on as a learner shall be entitled to count the whole period of such previous employment for the purpose of claiming the time-rate at which she is to be paid, and shall have such period of employment entered upon her certificate or certified copy.

(4) A female learner is a worker who is employed as described in section (2) hereof, subject also to the following conditions :—

(a) Has not become entitled to the full minimum rate under section (1).

(b) Is employed in a factory or workshop

not being a room used for dwelling purposes.

(c) Is employed by an employer who provides such learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning the branch or branches of the trade (as carried on by the employer subject to the provisions of this section) in which the learner is for the time being employed,

(d) Has received a certificate or certified copy certificate issued in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board and held subject to compliance with the conditions a, b, and c above specified, or has made an application therefor, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. The Trade Board may, if any of the conditions specified in a, b, or c are not in fact complied with, cancel the original certificate, where-

upon any copy thereof shall become cancelled. Notice of such cancellation shall forthwith be given to the learner and her employer.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

(5) In totalling up any reckonings, in the aggregate arrived at when paying the rates fixed hereunder, every fraction of a farthing shall count as a farthing.

(6) The expressions factory and workshop used herein shall have the meanings given to them by the Factory and Workshop Acts, 1901 and 1907.
