The following letters, containing an account of the un-dermentioned captures, have been transmitted to WILLIAM MARSDEN, Esq. Secretary to the Admi-ralty, for the information of the Lords Commisfioners.

His Majesty's ship Loire, at sea, June 25. 1805.

I have much pleasure in announcing to you the capture of the Valiant of Bourdeaux, a frigate privateer, carrying thirty guns, and two hundred and forty men, by his Majesty's ship under my command, in lat. 49 deg. 30 min and long. 16 deg. 20 min. after a very hard chace of twelve hours; when nearly within gun-shot the Melampus and Brilliant hove in fight on the weather-bow, which obliged her to bear up, and threw her into our hands about two hours fooner than she otherhands about two hours tooner than the other-wife would have been. She is reckoned one of the most complete ships ever sitted out at Bour-deaux, and is perfectly calculated to be taken in-to his Majesty's service, sails incomparably falt, carries twenty-four eighteen-pounders on her-main deck, and six sixes (which she threw over-thand in the phoce) on her quarrendeck. The board in the chace) on her quarter-deck. Valiant had been twenty days from Bourdeaux, was victualled and flored for a four months cruize; the only capture she has made is the Lord Charles Spencer Halifax packet.

I beg to acquaint you, that the Spanish schooner La Felix, a letter of marque, pierced for ten guns, but only fix mounted, with a com-plement of forty-two men, commanded by Fran-cisco Lopes, laden with cossee and bees wax, from the Havannah to Vera Cruz, was this day

captured by his Majesty's ship under my command, after a chace of four hours.

She sailed the preceding evening, and was permitted to do forom her very great superiority of sailing, and is the sirst vessel that has quitted that anchorage fince the embargo was laid on.
