The Joint Committee of the several bodies of Commissioners appointed for the purposes of Part I. of the National Insurance Act, 1911, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE that, pursuant to the provisions of the National Health Insurance (Special Orders Acceleration) Order (No. 2) 1912, they have made a Provisional Special Order under subsection (2) of Section 1 of the said Act for including amongst the persons employed within the meaning of Part I. of the said Act persons employed in Scotland as shepherds on an agricultural holding, by the occupier thereof, who are remunerated wholly or in part by stock and in respect of whose employment no wages or other money payment is made.
