Whereas by an Act passed in the Fourth Year of Our Reign intituled "An Act to make further and better provision for the care of Feeble-minded and other Mentally Defective Persons and to amend the Lunacy Acts" it is amongst other things enacted that there shall be constituted a Board of Control charged with the general superintendence of matters relating to the supervision, protection, and control of

defectives, which Board shall consist of not more than fifteen Commissioners to be appointed by Us, of whom not more than twelve shall be paid Commissioners, and shall hold office during Our Pleasure:

Now know ye, that We, pursuant to the powers vested in Us by the said recited Act, and on the recommendation of Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have appointed, and do by these Presents appoint you, the said Sir William Patrick Byrne, Arthur Rotherham, and Mary Dendy to be, during Our Pleasure, paid Commissioners for the purposes of the said Act.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the first day of November one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, in the fourth year of Our Reign.

WHITEHALL, November 7, 1913.

His Majesty the King has been pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Thomas Thomas, under the following circumstances:—

On the 27th April 1913 walling was in progress in a shaft, over 500 yards deep and 20 feet wide, in the Llewelyn Sinking Pit, belonging to the Britannic Merthyr Coal Company Limited, Gilfach Goch, Glamorganshire. Seven men were working on a stage suspended by ropes, about 10 yards from the bottom of the shaft, when a heavy fall occurred, smashing the stage and precipitating the seven men to the bottom of the shaft. As the winding rope had become entangled in the débris it was impossible to descend the shaft direct from the surface. Thomas, a mechanic employed at the colliery, and others accordingly descended another shaft to a seam where there was an inset from the Llewelyn shaft, about 70 yards from the bottom. Thomas volunteered to go down the shaft, and was let down by a rope with a loop at the end, although small falls were occurring at intervals and there was a risk of a larger fall at any moment. Successfully reaching the bottom, he found three men alive and tied them to the rope and they were drawn up separately, after which he himself was drawn up.

He ran considerable risk to his own life by his plucky conduct in descending to the rescue of his comrades.

WHITEHALL, November 7, 1913.

His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Matthew Withers, under the following circumstances:—

On the 19th August 1913 William Broughton, a dataller at the Annesley Colliery, near Nottingham, was engaged under the directions of Withers, who is a deputy, when a fall of roof took place and buried him. Withers, who was near at hand, heard the noise of the fall, and, being unable to reach the place, went round to the opposite side of the fall and managed to clear away the dirt with his hands until he reached Broughton's head, which he protected by placing a piece of timber across large stones. Another fall of roof then occurred, burying both men and extinguishing the lamp. Withers' arms, fortunately, were free, and, being able to extricate himself, he started again to rescue Broughton. Though help had arrived in the meantime, there was only room for one man to work. Withers persisted in his efforts, in spite of the injuries he had himself received, and did not stop until he had uncovered his fellow-workman sufficiently to admit of his being hauled to a place of safety.

Withers was engaged in the work of rescue for about three-quarters of an hour, during which he ran great risk of being killed or severely injured by falls of roof. Had it not been for his courage and determination, Broughton would probably have lost his life.

INNELLAN PIER (PROVISIONAL ORDER).

(Variation of Order of 1899 and of existing Agreement with the Feuars and Inhabitants of Innellan; tolls rates and charges for use of Pier &c. and alteration thereof and exemptions therefrom; Amendment of Order and Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Board of Trade on or before the 23rd day of December next pursuant to the provisions of the General Pier & Harbour Act 1861 and the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 Amendment Act by Mrs. Mary Lillian Campbell Wyndham Long of Dumoon, wife of Walter Vansittart Campbell Wyndham Long, and residing at Corhampton House, Bishop's Waltham, Hampshire (hereinafter called "the Promoter") for a provisional Order (hereinafter called "the Order") for all or some,

of the following among other purposes, that is to say:

To vary, alter, amend, modify or extend all or any of the provisions of the Innellan Pier Order 1899 (hereinafter called "the Order of 1899") and of the Agreement referred to in section 39 thereof dated the 4th and 5th days of August and the 4th day of September 1869 and registered in the Books of the Lords of Council and Session at Edinburgh on the 22nd day of June 1899 entered into on behalf of Mrs Caroline Mary Hetley Pleydell Bouverie Campbell Wyndham, therein called Mrs Caroline Mary Hetley Pleydell Bouverie Campbell, of the first part, and John Hunter, David MacCubbin, and James Miller, acting for and duly authorised to sign the said Agreement on behalf of the Feuars and Inhabitants of Innellan of the second part, by providing, and to provide that all Feuars on the Promoter's Estate of Dumoon, and all yearly tenants residing in separate dwellings in Innellan and all yearly

joint tenants of any dwellings therein (where the rental payable by each of such joint tenants amounts to or exceeds £20), whose names appear in the Valuation Roll applicable to Innellan, and all persons living permanently in family with any such feuar, tenant or joint tenant respectively, in Innellan, and the servants of such feuars, tenants and joint tenants shall be entitled to use the Pier at Innellan belonging to the Promoter free of charge when landing on or embarking from the Pier by steamer, or to make such other variations of the Order of 1899 and of the said Agreement as the Order may provide or the Board of Trade or Parliament may prescribe, and that, subject as aforesaid, the rates specified in the schedule to the Order of 1899 shall be payable and be paid, and to authorise the Promoter and any person to whom she has leased or may lease the same to demand levy, take and recover tolls, rates, duties, and charges for the use of the said Pier in respect of passengers, vessels, goods, animals, fish, articles, matters and things, and the use of cranes, weighing machines and sheds as heretofore, or such other tolls, rates, duties and charges as the Board of Trade or Parliament may sanction.

To alter existing tolls, rates, duties, and charges, and to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from tolls, rates, duties or charges, and to empower the Promoter to compound and agree with any Company, body or person with respect to the payment of any tolls, rates, duties and charges.

To amend or repeal, in whole or in part, the Order of 1899 and any other Order, or any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the said Pier.

To vary or extinguish all or any rights or privileges which would or might interfere with the objects of the Order and to confer other rights and privileges.

And Notice is hereby further given that on or before the 30th day of November instant a copy of this Notice as published in the Edinburgh Gazette will be deposited for public inspection in the office at Dunoon of the Principal Sheriff Clerk of the County of Argyll, at the Custom House of the Port of Greenock, and in the office of the Board of Trade, Whitehall Gardens, London.

Printed copies of the draft Provisional Order will be deposited on or before the 23rd day of December next for public inspection at the Custom House of the Port of Greenock aforesaid, and at the aforesaid office of the Board of Trade, and on and after that date copies thereof will be supplied by the undersigned at their offices as undermentioned, to all persons applying for the same at the price of one shilling each.

Any objections to the Order which it is intended to urge on the Board of Trade must be received by them on or before the 15th day of January next; and a copy of such objections must at the same time be sent to the undermentioned Solicitors or Parliamentary Agents, and in forwarding the objections to the Board of Trade the Objectors or their Agents should state that this has been done.

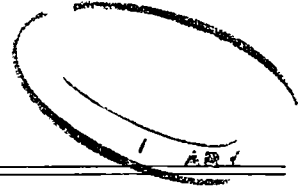
