#### TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act, by the Board of Trade, and dated 27th April 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act for certain branches of the Machine-made Lace and Net Finishing Trade, as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade, and dated 16th March 1914, have given notice, as required by Section 4 (3) of the above Act, that they have fixed the following Minimum or Lowest Rates of wages:—

- For the finishing of those Hair Nets, Veilings, and Quillings, which are the product of Plain Net Machines, 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per hour clear of all deductions.\*

The above rate applies to workers other than learners. For learners (as defined by the Trade Board) certain lower minimum time rates have been fixed.

- Similar notice has also been given that the Trade Board have fixed General Minimum Piece-Rates for the finishing of Hair Nets (whether they are the product of Plain Net Machines or not), as follows:—

(a) For Threading—	Per gross nets.
Hair Nets up to and including 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, with 38 holes each or less	4d.
Hair Nets from 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches up to and including 18 inches, with 48 holes each or less	5d.
