Captain Godfrey Spencer Taverner Dawson (3rd Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment), Officer on Guard at Headquarters.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the grant of the Victoria Cross to Lieutenant Walter Lorrain Brodie, 2nd Battalion, The Highland Light Infantry, for conspicuous bravery whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force, as set forth below :—

For conspicuous gallantry near Becelaere on the 11th November, in clearing the enemy out of a portion of our trenches which they had succeeded in occupying. Heading the charge, he bayoneted several of the enemy, and thereby relieved a dangerous situation.

As a result of Lieutenant Brodie's promptitude, 80 of the enemy were killed, and 51 taken prisoners.
