WAR OFFICE, April 28, 1915.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the grant of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Warrant Officer, non-commissioned officer, and men for their conspicuous acts of bravery and devotion to duty whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force :—

No. 9665 Company Serjeant-Major Harry Daniels, 2nd Battalion, The Rifle Brigade (The Prince Consort's Own).

No. 3697 Acting Corporal Cecil Reginald Noble, late 2nd Battalion, The Rifle Brigade (The Prince Consort's Own).

For most conspicuous bravery on 12th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle. When their battalion was impeded in the advance to the attack by wire entanglements, and subjected to a very severe machine-gun fire, these two men voluntarily rushed in front and succeeded in cutting the wires.

They were both wounded at once, and Corporal Noble has since died of his wounds.

No. 6276 Private William Buckingham, 2nd Battalion, The Leicestershire Regiment.

For conspicuous acts of bravery and devotion to duty in rescuing and rendering aid to the wounded whilst exposed to heavy fire, especially at Neuve Chapelle on 10th and 12th March 1915.

No. 6016 Private Jacob Rivers, late 1st Battalion, The Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Regiment.

For most conspicuous bravery at Neuve Chapelle on 12th March 1915, when he, on his own initiative, crept to within a few yards of a very large number of the enemy who were massed on the flank of an advanced company of his Battalion, and hurled bombs on them. His action caused the enemy to retire, and so relieved the situation.

Private Rivers performed a second act of great bravery on the same day, similar to the first-mentioned, again causing the enemy to retire. He was killed on this occasion.

No. 1685 Rifleman Gobar Sing Negi, 2nd Battalion, 39th Garhwal Rifles.

For most conspicuous bravery on 10th March 1915 at Neuve Chapelle.

During our attack on the German position he was one of a bayonet party with bombs who entered their main trench, and was the first man to go round each traverse, driving back the enemy until they were eventually forced to surrender.

He was killed during this engagement.

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His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointment of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order, in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force :—

Captain John Henry Morris Arden, 1st Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment (Reserve of Officers).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability at Neuve Chapelle on 12th March 1915.

When the Battalion on his right was driven from their trenches, he formed his Company under a heavy fire to a flank, counter-attacked the German right with great determination, and thereby enabled the Battalion to re-occupy their trenches.

Captain Reginald Bastard, 2nd Battalion, The Lincolnshire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry at Neuve Chapelle on 10th March 1915. In the attack on the German position he entered their trenches ahead of his Company, having had to force his way through the entanglements.

Major George Tupper Campbell Carter-Campbell, 2nd Battalion, The Cameronians (Scottish Rifles).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability at Neuve Chapelle from 10th to 12th March 1915.

He took over command of the Battalion on 10th March, and, although wounded, maintained with great determination the positions which had been gained.

He had only one surviving Officer to assist him.

Captain Henry Douglas Harington, 2nd Battalion, The Prince of Wales's Own (West Yorkshire Regiment).

For the ability and gallantry displayed on 12th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle.

After the enemy had gained temporary possession of a portion of our trenches he brought a flank fire to bear on them, which saved the situation.

Major Leopold Charles Louis Oldfield, 33rd Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous ability and gallantry at Neuve Chapelle on 10th March 1915, in command of his Battery in action, and for successful service in cutting wire entanglements.

He took one of his guns to within 700 yards of the enemy, and so greatly facilitated the advance of our Infantry.

Major John Francis Sartorius Winnington, 1st Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability from 10th to 12th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle, when he commanded the two leading Companies in several attacks, and subsequently commanded the Battalion.

Showed great foresight in correctly anticipating the desires of the Brigade Commander in regard to the advance of other Troops, at a time when Orders could not be conveyed to them.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers, and Warrant Officer, in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force:—

Lieutenant E. B. Conybeare, 1st Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability, from 10th to 14th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle.

He handled his trench mortars with dash and ability on 10th March, and did not retire until two of his guns had been damaged by shell fire and his powder exhausted; he then rejoined his battalion with the gun teams, and subsequently led forward his platoon very ably.

Lieutenant G. S. Dobbie, 1st Battalion, The Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry and resource at Neuve Chapelle.

Taking advantage of the confusion caused in the enemy's ranks from our bombs, he collected a few men and charged a greatly superior force, driving the enemy back to their trenches.

Lieutenant H. G. Gilchrist, Royal Engineers, Territorial Force, attached 8th Signal Company, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry in repairing telephone lines under heavy fire, from 10th to 14th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle.

Lieutenant A. D. Gordon, 2nd Battalion, Princess Charlotte of Wales's (Royal Berkshire Regiment).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on 10th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle.

He commanded a machine gun section, blocking parties, and bomb-throwers, in a very able manner until he was severely wounded.

Lieutenant A. C. Hincks, 26th Field Ambulance, Royal Army Medical Corps, Territorial Force (2nd Wessex).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Neuve Chapelle, from 11th to 14th March 1915, in collecting the wounded whilst under heavy fire.

On the night of 13th-14th March, whilst he was attending on a wounded man, a shell struck the ambulance waggon, killing the man and rendering Lieutenant Hincks unconscious. On recovering, he at once proceeded to collect the wounded under fire, and continued doing so throughout the night.

Second Lieutenant F. R. F. Lankester, 1st Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability from 10th to 13th March 1915, as forward observation Officer in the firing line, when he worked night and day to keep his telephone line open.

He repeatedly mended his broken wires under very heavy fire, and rendered great assistance to the artillery in conveying information, carrying back the messages himself when no other means of communication were available.

Second Lieutenant A. R. F. Lucas, "O" Battery, Royal Horse Artillery.

For the excellent work performed from 10th to 12th March 1915, as forward observing Officer during the attack on Neuve Chapelle, when his information was always timely and accurate.

On the 12th March he continued to furnish valuable information, although his station was subjected to heavy shell fire.

Lieutenant W. F. Somervail, 3rd Battalion, The Cameronians (Scottish Rifles), attached 2nd Battalion.

For conspicuous gallantry, marked ability, and presence of mind at Neuve Chapelle from 10th to 14th March 1915, when he ably seconded his Commanding Officer and performed excellent work on his own initiative.

On the evening of the 12th March he collected the men of his Battalion and conducted them over unknown ground to a position for attack with very good judgment.

He brought his Battalion out of action after the engagement on 14th March.

4978 Serjeant-Major J. Chalmers, 2nd Battalion, The Cameronians (Scottish Rifles).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability from 12th to 14th March 1915, at Neuve Chapelle, in organising carrying parties for ammunition, bombs, &c.

When Lieutenant Somervail was the only Officer left, this Warrant Officer rendered valuable assistance to him in the firing line, and also when taking the battalion out of action on 14th March.

Forty-eight hours' grace from the time of the commencement of the blockade will be given for the departure of neutral vessels from the blockaded area.

##### MOTOR CARS.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (BURGH OF BURNTISLAND) ORDER, 1915. Dated 26th April 1914.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by Section 9, as read with Section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable Thomas M'Kinnon Wood, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the Town Council of the Burgh of Burntisland, being the local authority of the said Burgh, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Burntisland) Order, 1915," and the regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which the notices placed in the Burgh are made conform to these regulations as read with the regulations prescribed by the Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Burntisland) Order, 1909, in terms of Section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903.
2. A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the Schedule to this Order.

#### SCHEDULE.

##### Limits or Places.

(1). *Kinghorn Road*.—From the fountain at the junction of Cromwell Road and Buccleuch

Place eastwards to the first milestone at Bentfield Villas.

(2). *Kirkcaldy Road*.—From its junction with Cromwell Road westwards to its junction with Aberdour Road.

(3). *Aberdour Road*.—From the limit on Aberdour Road referred to in the Schedule to the Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Burntisland) Order, 1909, westwards to the Burgh boundary.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (COUNTY OF CLACKMANNAN) ORDER, 1915. Dated 27th April 1915.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by Section 9, as read with Section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable Thomas M'Kinnon Wood, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the County Council of the County of Clackmannan, being the local authority of the said County, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (County of Clackmannan) Order, 1915," and the Regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which, for the purpose of giving effect thereto, the local authority shall, in terms of Section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, place notices in conspicuous places on or near such limits or places.
2. A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the Schedule to this Order.

#### Limits or Places.

(1). *Tillicoutry—Alloa Road*.—From the Alloa Burgh boundary, at "The Whins," to 50 yards north of the Sauchie Manse, opposite the free-stone quarry.

(2). *Stirling and Perth Road (Hillfoot Road)*.—From the United Free Church, at the west end of Menstrie Village, to 50 yards east of road leading to Menstrie Railway Station.

(3). *Stirling and Kinross Road via Coalsnaughton*.—From Woodhead House, at west end of Coalsnaughton Village, to 50 yards east of Ramsay Street, Coalsnaughton.

(4). *Coalsnaughton—Tillicoutry Road*.—From the United Free Church, Coalsnaughton, to the Devonside Bridge.

(5). *Stirling—Kinross Road via Fishcross*.—From the Bridge over North British Railway, at the west end of Fishcross Village, to a point 200

yards west of the junction of Pitfairn Road, at east end of Fishcross Village.

(6). *Tillicoutry—Alloa Road via Fishcross*.—From 50 yards south of Fishcross School to 50 yards north of Fishcross Church.
