C. 41434	Quarter-master-Serjeant	Milburn, A. R. ...	2nd Brigade, Canadian Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry on the 24th April 1915, at Wieltje, in bringing up ammunition under heavy shell fire. He also saved a wagon of ammunition under heavy fire after the drivers and horses had been killed.
6401	Company Serjeant-Major	Miller, G. ...	1st Battalion, King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry	For gallant conduct and resource on the 8th May 1915, at Frezenberg. All his Company Officers having been killed or wounded, Serjeant-Major Miller took command of the Company, and by his prompt action kept them well in hand under difficult circumstances.
64	Private ...	Mills, G. H. ...	2nd City of London Field Ambulance, Royal Army Medical Corps (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on the 25th May 1915, at Festubert. When the stretcher-bearers of the advanced companies had all been killed or wounded, Private Mills volunteered for this work, and remained working under a heavy fire until every wounded man had been dressed. On previous occasions he has shown the greatest devotion to duty.
6548	Corporal ...	Mills, J. ...	2nd Battalion, Scots Guards	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 16th May 1915, at Festubert, when, after the German front line had been taken and many wounded were lying between the British and German trenches, he repeatedly went out during the day under a heavy shell fire, which was killing many of the wounded, and carried back wounded men until he was himself hit. His gallant conduct undoubtedly saved many lives.
1974	Private ...	Mills, S. W. ...	15th County of London Battalion, The London Regiment (Prince of Wales's Own Civil Service Rifles), T.F.	For conspicuous gallantry on the 24th and 25th May 1915, at Festubert, when assisting as bomber in an assault on a hostile trench by another Regiment, who were short of bombers through casualties. Out of eight men supplied, four were killed and two wounded.
2009	Serjeant ...	Milne, S. S. B. ...	1/5th (Angus and Dundee) Battalion, Royal Highlanders (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on the 9th May 1915, near Rouges Bancs, when he performed many acts requiring exceptional coolness and courage, and in particular he went out twice, under a heavy shell and machine-gun fire, and brought in wounded men.
9623	Lance-Corporal (now Serjeant)	Milner, W. ...	1st Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on the 24th May 1915, near Wieltje, when he carried a machine gun over three-quarters of a mile of open ground, which was being heavily shelled, eventually getting his gun into the firing line. He showed the greatest bravery and coolness, and by his fine example gave great encouragement to the men in his command.
7911	Serjeant ...	Mitchell, G. ...	2nd Battalion, Yorkshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on the 16th May 1915, at Festubert. After his Officer was killed, he commanded, with great efficiency, his detachment until he was himself wounded by a high explosive shell. Throughout the campaign he has shown untiring energy, and was responsible for the training of three machine-gun detachments. When the machine-gun officers were killed, he displayed high powers of command.
