He repeatedly crossed a fire-swept zone from a captured trench with messages, each time giving valuable personal estimates of the situation. Subsequently he took control of two platoons which were without an Officer. Throughout the operations his extraordinary coolness under fire and his devotion to duty afforded a splendid example, and gave great encouragement to all the men with him.
2450	Private	Norris, T	3rd Dragoon Guards	For conspicuous gallantry on the 13th May 1915, near Ypres, when he volunteered to carry an important message under a very heavy shell and rifle fire at a critical period of the operations and after two other men had been killed in endeavouring to get the message through.

A	1st Battalion, Cheshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on the 7th May 1915, near "Hill 60," when he voluntarily left a trench, crawled over an open space under an accurate fire from the enemy, and dragged in a wounded man. He went out, under heavy fire, on four occasions, without hesitation and without direct orders, and mended the wires.

He fearlessly exposed himself in clearing away the earth under a heavy fire, and continued working the gun during the remainder of the day, protected only by the gun shield.
