8817	Private ...	O'Connor, R. ...	Lahore Divisional Signal Company	For conspicuous gallantry and ability during April and May 1915, near Ypres, when acting as a telephone operator. On one occasion he left his station and went out under a heavy shell fire to repair a cable line, when two linesmen, who had been dispatched, did not return. He succeeded in repairing the line at a most critical time, and then resumed his duties as an operator.
6919	Acting Bombardier	Oldershaw, A. G. ...	4A Reserve Brigade, Royal Field Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry and ability in repairing telephone lines under a heavy fire. On the 5th May 1915, east of Ypres, at a most critical period, he went out by himself no less than six times under a heavy fire and restored communication from the trenches to his battery.
C/41055	Corporal ...	Olsen, O. C. ...	2nd Brigade, Canadian Artillery	For great gallantry and resource from the 22nd April to 4th May 1915, in repairing telephone wires under heavy shell fire. Also for acting as scout, and obtaining valuable information on the 2nd May 1915, when all the wire had been cut.
2340	Acting Serjeant	Owen, J. S. ...	1st/4th Battalion, Royal Lancaster Regiment (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on 15th June 1915, at Rue D'Ouvert, when he recovered a Maxim gun under very heavy shell fire after it had been buried, and for the great assistance rendered to the men of his section when they were buried by shell fire.
1136	Serjeant	Oxman, R. H. ...	23rd County of London Battalion, The London Regiment (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on the 25th and 26th May 1915, at Givenchy. In his efforts to consolidate a captured position under continuous shell and rifle fire, he exhibited remarkable ability, and fearlessly exposed himself throughout the night, no less than seven bullets penetrating his clothing and equipment. Twice during the night he crawled into the open under a very heavy fire, and assisted the wounded lying between the lines. His fine example gave the greatest encouragement to the men with him.
9191	Private ...	Page, H. W. ...	2nd Battalion, Leicestershire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on the night of the 14th-15th June 1915, near Richebourg l'Avoué. A few men, under an Officer, were putting out wire in a very exposed place in our front. The position was given away by flares, and the enemy opened a heavy rifle and machine gun fire, seriously wounding the Officer. Private Page at once followed another Officer over the parapet, and assisted to carry the wounded Officer to safety, under a heavy fire and continuous flares. He was always ready to undertake any hazardous work, and set a splendid example of great courage and devotion to duty.
Z/1511	Acting Corporal	Parker, J. ...	1st Battalion Rifle Brigade	For conspicuous gallantry on the 13th May 1915, east of Ypres, in distributing ammunition along the firing line under a heavy shell fire. Although wounded early in the day, he continued to carry out his duties until the end of the engagement.
R/10194	Private ...	Parnell, R. ...	4th Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps	For conspicuous gallantry on the 8th May 1915, east of Ypres, when he dug out an Officer and another man, who had both been buried in a trench, and dressed their wounds under a very heavy shell fire.
