The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of November nineteen hundred and fourteen His Majesty was pleased to make Regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914 ") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm :

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915 :

And whereas the said Regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said Regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore. His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendment be made in the said Regulations:

After Regulation 9, the following regulation shall be unserted :---

"9A. Where there is reason to apprehend that the holding of a meeting in a public place will give rise to grave disorder, and will thereby cause undue demands to be

made upon the police or military forces, it shall be lawful for a Secretary of State, or for any mayor, magistrate, or chief officer of police who is duly authorised for the purpose by a Secretary of State, or for two or more of such persons so authorised, to make an order prohibiting the holding of the meeting, and if a meeting is held, or attempted to be held, in contravention of any such prohibition, it shall be lawful to take such steps as may be necessary to disperse the meeting or prevent the holding thereof.

thereof. "In the application of this regulation to Scotland, references to the Secretary for Scotland and a provost shall be substituted respectively for references to a Secretary of State and a mayor.

"In the application of this regulation to Ireland references to the Lord Lieutenant shall be substituted for references to a Secretary of State."

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said Rules into consideration, and the General Medical Council having made no Representation with respect thereto, are pleased to approve the said Rules as set forth in the Schedule hereto, until further Order.

SCHEDULE.

CENTRAL MIDWIVES BOARD FOR SCOTLAND.

Rules framed under Section 5 (1) of the Midwives (Scotland) Act, 1915 (5 and 6 Geo. V. c. 91).

RULES A.—REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD.

1. Chairman and Deputy-Chairman. — The Chairman and Deputy-Chairman shall be elected by ballot at the first ordinary meeting of the Board in the month of February in each year, and shall hold office until the first ordinary meeting in the month of February in the year following.

2. Casual Vacancies.—Should the office of Chairman or Deputy-Chairman fall vacant during the year, it shall be filled by election at the next ordinary meeting of the Board, and the member so elected shall hold office for the remainder of the year for which his predecessor was elected.

3. *Meetings.*—The Board shall meet in each month, unless otherwise decided at a previous meeting, on a day to be fixed to suit the convenience of its members, and at such other times as may be necessary. The Chairman may at any time convene a meeting of the Board, and the Secretary shall convene a meeting if required to do so by any three members of the Board by writing under their hands.

4. Notice.—Not less than four days' notice of any meeting shall be given to each member of the Board, directed to such address as he or she may from time to time furnish to the Secretary.

5. Quorum.—The quorum of the Board shall be four.

6. Order of Business.—The order of business shall be as follows :—

- (1) Minutes of the last meeting.
- (2) Notices of motion.
- (3) Reports of Committees.
- (4) Correspondence.
- (5) Business arising directly under the Act.
- (6) Statements of Accounts.
- (7) Bills and claims.
- (8) Any other competent business.
- (9) Date of next meeting.

Provided that the Board may at any meeting vary the order of business on the ground of urgency or convenience.

7. Absence of Chairman and Deputy-Chairman. —In the event of the Chairman and Deputy-Chairman not being present at any meeting of the Board, the Board shall elect a presiding Chairman for that meeting.

8. Agenda.—No business which is not upon the Agenda Paper shall be discussed at any meeting of the Board (except routine business) unless the Chairman shall declare such business to be of an urgent nature, and shall be supported by two-thirds of the members p?esent and voting.

9. Voting.—Every question, the manner of voting on which is not otherwise specified in these rules, shall be decided on a show of hands by a majority of members present and voting, but any member may call for a division, in which case the names for and against shall be taken down in writing and entered on the Minutes. In the case of an equality of votes the presiding Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

10. Motions.—Every motion or amendment shall be moved and seconded, and handed to the Chairman in writing, and shall be read, before it is further discussed or put to the meeting.

11. Notices of Motion.—Every notice of motion shall be in writing, signed by the member giving the notice, and shall be given or sent to the Secretary, who shall insert in the Agenda Paper of the next ordinary meeting of the Board all notices of motion which he may have received not less than forty-eight hours prior to the day on which the Agenda Paper is sent out to members in the order in which they have been received by him.

12. Rescinding of Resolution.—No resolution of the Board shall be altered or rescinded at a subsequent meeting except upon a notice of motion of which a copy has been sent out to members by the Secretary fourteen clear days before such meeting.

12. Committees.—There shall be the following Committees of the Board :—

- (1) A Standing Committee consisting of the whole Board. (Quorum shall be four.)
- (2) A Penal Cases Committee. (Quorum shall be three.)
- (3) A Finance Committee. (Quorum shall be three.)

The two latter Committees shall be appointed annually at the first ordinary meeting in the month of February, and shall hold office until their successors are appointed. Other Committees may be appointed for special purposes from time to time.

Every Committee appointed by the Board shall make a report of its proceedings to the Board in writing, and the recommendations of every Committee shall, so far as practicable, be in the form of resolutions, to be considered by the Board; and the acts and proceedings of every Committee shall be submitted to the Board for approval, unless the resolution of the Board appointing the Committee shall otherwise direct in respect of all or any of the matters referred to it.

14. Reports.—Every report from a Committee shall be submitted by the Convener of the Committee (if present) who shall move that it be received by the Board, and on the motion being carried, the Convener, or any other member of the Committee, may move to agree with the resolutions of the Committee. and such resolutions shall be considered *seriatim*. The question that the report (if necessary, as amended) be now approved shall be put from the Chair, but no debate shall be allowed thereon.

15. Bills and Claims.—All bills and claims shall be examined by the Secretary and laid by him before the Finance Committee, who shall report them to the Board, and such bills and claims as are allowed shall be initialed by the presiding Chairman for payment.

16. Cheques.—All cheques for the payment of money shall be signed by two members of the Board, and countersigned by the Secretary.

17. Financial Statement.—At every Monthly Meeting of the Board the Secretary shall present a statement in writing showing the receipts and expenditure of the Board for the current year up to the date of such Meeting, and showing the existing balance, if any, to the credit of the Board.

18. Decision of Chairman.—The presiding Chairman shall decide upon any point of order or procedure, and his decision shall be final.

RULES B.—REGULATING THE ISSUE OF CERTIFI-CATES AND THE CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION TO THE ROLL OF MIDWIVES.

1. Candidates must satisfy the Board that they have reached a sufficient standard of general education, and submit the following documents, duly filled in and signed :---

(a) A certificate of birth, or of baptism, or a statutory declaration made by a competent person, showing that the candidate is not under twenty-one years of age, and, where the candidate has been married, the certificate of marriage also;

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- (b) Certificates to the effect that the candidate has undergone the training set forth in C;
- (c) A certificate of good moral character. This certificate must be in the form prescribed by the Board, and must be signed by two persons of position acceptable to the Board. Each person signing must state in the certificate that he or she has known the candidate for at least twelve months, and must append to his or her signature a statement of his or her calling or position and postal address. (Schedule, Form I.)

2. Candidates must pass an examination as hereinafter set forth. (See C below.)

3. A candidate who has complied with the above requirements and has successfully passed the examination shall receive a certificate in the form set out in the Schedule, and her name shall be entered by the Secretary on the Roll of Midwives. (Schedule, Form II.)

4. The names of all women admitted to the Roll of Midwives under Sections 2, 11. and 14 of the Midwives (Scotland) Act, 1915, shall be printed in one single list and in alphabetical order.

Rules D.—Regulating the Admission to the Roll of Women already in Practice as Midwives at the Passing of the Act.

1. Applications for admission to the Roll of the Schedule (Form IX.), must be signed by a Midwives under Sections 2 and 11 of the Mid- Justice of the Peace, minister of religion, registered

wives (Scotland) Act, 1915, must be made on the prescribed forms (Schedule, Forms VI., VIII.), and must be forwarded to the Central Midwives Board for Scotland together with such one or more of the following certificates as may be required.

2. In the case of women claiming admission on the ground of having obtained a certificate in Midwivery from the Royal Maternity Hospital of Edinburgh, the Royal Maternity Hospital, Glasgow, the Maternity Hospital, Aberdeen, the Maternity Hospital. Dundee, the Obstetrical Society of London, the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, the Coombe Lying-in Hospital and Guinness's Dispensary, the Rotunda Hospital for the Relief of Poor Lying-in Women of Dublin, the National Maternity Hospital, Dublin, or the Central Midwives Board for England, (a) either the original certificate on which the application is based, or in the event of the original certificate having been lost, a voucher from the accredited Secretary or other agent of the certifying body to the effect that a certificate was granted to the applicant on such and such a date; and (b) a certificate signed by a Justice of the Peace, minister of religion, or registered medical practitioner, or the Secretary of an Institution (approved by the Central Midwives Board for Scotland) of which the applicant is a member, or is or was an employee, stating that the applicant is the person to whom the aftermentioned certificate in Midwifery was granted. The Secretary of the Board shall, by comparison of the handwriting, or by such enquiry as he may think necessary, satisfy himself as far as possible of the applicant's identity. The application must be accompanied by a fee of ten shillings.

3. In the case of women claiming admission on the ground of having obtained a certificate of Midwifery from any institution or examining body other than those specified in Section 2 of the Midwives (Scotland) Act, 1915, the certificate on which the application is based, together with satisfactory evidence, in the form prescribed by the Central Midwives Board for Scotland (Schedule, Form VII.), to the effect that before the certificate was granted the applicant had received a proper course of instruction and training (including personal attendance, under competent supervision, upon at least twenty cases during and after labour), and had passed an examination in Midwifery and the duties of a Midwife, and that the institution or examining body by which the certificate was granted considers the applicant at the present time to be a proper person to be admitted to the Midwives Roll. The application must be accompanied by a fee of ten shillings.

The applicant may be required to furnish other documents or particulars to enable the Board to decide whether the application can be granted.

4. In the case of women claiming admission on the ground of having been in *boná fide* practice as Midwives for twelve months previous to the 1st January 1916, a certificate to the effect that the applicant has to the personal knowledge of the person signing been in *boná fide* practice as a Midwife for at least twelve months prior to the 1st January 1916, and that she is trustworthy, sober, and of good moral character. This certificate must be in the form given in the Schedule (Form IX.), must be signed by a Justice of the Peace. minister of religion, registered medical practitioner, or other person acceptable to the Board, and must be accompanied by a fee of ten shillings.

5. The certificates to be issued by the Board under Sections 2 and 11 will be in the prescribed forms (Schedule, Forms X., XI.).

Note.—Applications for admission to the Roll of Midwives under Section 2 of the Midwives (Scotland) Act, 1915, should be lodged not later than 31st December 1917.

"Maine" Ammunition Ship, in which a quantity of high explosives was stowed, and he at once reported the fact to Lieutenant - Commander Warden at the Office of the Naval Transport Officer.

In the meantime the ship was abandoned by her officers and crew, and steps were taken by the local fire brigade to rig the shore fire hoses.

Lieutenant-Commander Warden immediately proceeded on board, and on arrival at the after hold found smoke issuing from between the high explosive cases in the centre of the hatch. He went down into the hold, lifted up one of the cases, and called for the fire hose, which was passed to him by Private Edward Gimble, 1st Battalion, Middlesex Regiment, who had followed him on board.

This case, and the one next to it, were alight on their adjacent sides. Lieutenant-Commander Warden played the hose on them and extinguished the fire. Subsequent investigation showed that the fire was in all probability due to the ignition by friction or spontaneous combustion of amorphous phosphorus, which had leaked from boxes containing that substance stowed above the cases containing the high explosives.

There is little doubt that the prompt and gallant action of Lieutenant Commander Warden prevented an explosion which would have had serious and possibly disastrous results with almost certain loss of life.

The Albert Medal of the Second Class has been awarded to Private Gimble.

For most conspicuous bravery. During heavy fighting on three consecutive days he repeatedly went backwards and forwards, under continuous and heavy shell and machine-gun fire, between our original trenches and those captured from the enemy, in order to tend and rescue wounded men. He brought in ten badly wounded men on the first day from ground swept by machine-gun fire, and three were actually killed while he was dressing their wounds.

The battalion to which he was attached was relieved on the second day, but he went back and brought in twelve more wounded men.

On the night of the third day he took charge of a party of volunteers and once more returned to the trenches to rescue the remaining wounded.

The splendid work was quite voluntary on his part and outside the scope of his ordinary duties.
