

478 L./Cpl. W. Lamplugh, 1st Lond. Sanitary Sec. R.A.M.C., T.F.

For exceptionally good work in regard to the sanitary requirements of the Army.

11859 Pte. L. Lawton, 7th Bn., N. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry when building up, under heavy rifle fire, the parapet of a trench which had been blown in by high explosive shells. He has since been wounded.

66 Sjt.-Dmr. E. C. Lee, 6th Bn., Essex R., T.F.

For consistent good work, notably in keeping down snipers, of whom he has accounted for many.

9766 Coy. S./M. G. Lee, 7th Bn., Yorks. L.I.

For consistent gallantry and good work throughout, notably when at a critical time he went through a very heavy fire and brought up a supply of ammunition. Later he went back and fetched a second box.

1578 Cpl. J. T. Lees, 2/1st W. Rid. Fd. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work when carrying out his duties under heavy shell fire.

9550 L./C. W. R. Lees, 1st Bn., K. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry. He climbed on the enemy parapet in order to spot the result of our bombing. This duty he took up immediately after two men had already been killed doing the same thing.

9944 Staff Sjt. F. G. Levings, Supply and Transport Corps, Ind. Army.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty. He has always set a fine example.

8/14704 Coy. S./M. W. Lightfoot, 8th Bn., Bord. R.

For conspicuous coolness under fire, notably when he rescued a badly wounded man under heavy shell fire.

12290 Pte. W. H. Lines, 7th Bn., Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry. He has always volunteered for any dangerous work. On one occasion, when the officer of his patrol was killed, he took command, got up to the enemy's parapet, and obtained the required information. He was wounded when wiring within 15 yards of the enemy.

1083 Pte. S. Littleford, 9th Bn., Manch. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in flinging a lighted bomb over the parapet, and thus probably saving many casualties. He was himself wounded in the arm by the explosion.

187 Sqdn. S./M. A. Littleworth, Dorset. Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in a successful charge and pursuit of the enemy.

52852 Coy. S./M. E. Lockwood, T.C. Newark (formerly 89th Fd. Coy.), R.E.

For consistent good work in the front line, frequently under fire.

25 Coy. S./M. H. Lodge, 1/7th Bn., W. York. R., T.F.

For consistent devotion to duty under all circumstances.

S/8273 L./C. S. Lovejoy, 1st Bn., R. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in holding up the enemy in a sap. When his companion was wounded, he worked by himself till reinforced by the bombers of another battalion.

12344 Sjt. F. H. Lucas, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work as Sanitary Officer in a much-shelled area. He has repeatedly shown great pluck, notably when he went to a party of men who had been shelled, rendered first aid, and got the wounded into safety under very heavy shell fire.

1441 Sjt. H. G. Lupton, 1/20th Bn., Lond. R., T.F.

For consistent good and gallant work with the Grenadier Platoon. He has successfully undertaken risky reconnaissance work.

3/5456 L./C. D. MacAulay, 3rd Bn. (attd. 1st Bn.) Cam'n. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as a stretcher bearer often under fire. He has set a fine example.

6984 Actg. S./M. C. MacDonald, 11th Bn. Manch. R.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty.

12040 Coy. S./M. (Actg. S./M.) J. Mackie, 12th Bn., L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a heavy bombardment by the enemy he moved fearlessly about to places of the greatest danger. He has done fine work on patrol, and on one occasion dispersed with bombs an enemy working party.

898 Pte. F. T. Major, 10th Bn. Lond. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry as a signaller. Though wounded in three places by a bomb, he stuck to his post during an attack by the enemy, and both sent and received messages for two hours.

1529 By. S./M. H. Males, 5th By., 1/3rd N. Mid. Bde., R.F.A., T.F.

For consistent energy and good work. He has done excellent service in training men.

46654 Actg. Bomr. A. E. Marsh, 94th By., R.F.A.

For consistent good and gallant work when repairing telephone wires under fire, on one occasion in full view of the enemy's trenches. He has always volunteered for dangerous work.

88053 Gunr. G. W. G. Marshall, R.H.A. (attd. 14th Anti-Aircraft Sec.).

For conspicuous gallantry. When his section had been heavily shelled, and had suffered severe casualties, he acted with the greatest coolness and on his own initiative, with the assistance of some other gunners, removed all the wounded under heavy shell fire.
