Copy of a letter from Vice-Admiral Lord COLLINGWOOD, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the Mediterranean, to WILLIAM MARSDEN, Esq. dated on board the Queen, off Cape Spartzel, the 9th November 1805.

SIR,

I inclose, for their Lordships information, the Tonnant's return of killed and wounded in the action with the combined fleets off Cape Trafalgar, the 21st ultimo, which I received yesterday, and now completes them.

An abstract of the Killed and Wounded on board his Majesty's ship the Tonnant, in the action with the combined fleets of France and Spain, off Cape Trafalgar, the 21st of October 1805.

**KILLED.**  
1 petty officer, 16 seamen, and 9 marines.—Total 26.

**WOUNDED.**  
2 officers, 2 petty officers, 30 seamen, and 16 marines.—Total 50.

William Brown, Midshipman.

**DUTY ON PROPERTY.**

Exemptions and Allowances in respect of Colleges, Friendly Societies, and Charitable Institutions, and Dividends belonging to Foreigners.

**THE** Commissioners appointed for special purposes under certain Acts of the 43d and 45th years of his present Majesty for granting a Contribution on Property, &c. hereby give notice, that persons may claim Exemptions from the said Duty:

1st, For the Duties charged on any College or Hall in any of the Universities of Great Britain and Offices belonging thereto, or for the money expended in the necessary repairs thereof.

2d, For the Duties charged on the Site of any Hospital, or Public School, or Alms-house or Offices belonging thereto, or for the money expended in the necessary repairs thereof.

3d, For the Duties charged on the Rents of Lands, Messuages, and Tenements belonging to any Hospital, Public School, or Alms-house, or vested in trustees for charitable purposes.

4th, For the Dividends payable out of the Public Revenue, and arising from the Stock of any Friendly Society established under an act of the 33d year of his present Majesty.

5th, For the Dividends belonging to any Corporation, Fraternity, or Society of Persons established for charitable purposes only, or applicable by them to charitable purposes only, pursuant to any Act of Parliament, Charter, Decree, Deed of Trust, or Will, in so far as the Dividends before mentioned shall have been applied to charitable purposes.

6th, For the Dividends, *bona fide*, belonging to any person not being a subject of his Majesty, and not resident in Great Britain.

And that all persons claiming such Exemptions are required to make their claims before the said Special Commissioners in writing, to be delivered at the Office for Taxes, Somerset, under cover to the Secretary for the affairs of Taxes, and the forms for such claims are to be had at the said Office, and at the Office of the Inspector for the Duty on Dividends at the Old Stock Exchange, of the Clerks to the Commissioners for executing the Property Act in the several Districts, and of any Inspector or Surveyor of Taxes.
