A PROCLAMATION

RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation :

And whereas by various Proclamations entitled Prohibition of Import Proclamations the importation of certain goods has been prohibited accordingly :

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain other goods should be prohibited, and the existing prohibition imposed on the importation of certain goods removed :

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows :—

(1) As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into

the United Kingdom of the following goods is hereby prohibited, viz. :—

Automatic machines for the retail sale of any article.

Military rifles and carbines.

Miniature and cadet rifles and carbines.

Revolvers and pistols.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

(2) As from and after the date hereof the prohibition imposed by the Prohibition of Import (No. 10) Proclamation, 1916, on the importation of the following goods shall be removed, and the said Proclamation amended accordingly, viz. :—

Cotton hosiery.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (No. 13) Proclamation, 1916.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twenty-second day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and in the Seventh year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS on the 20th day of January 1914, an International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, and for purposes incidental thereto, was duly entered into by His Majesty and the other Signatory Powers more especially referred to and set out in the said Convention :

And whereas a Statute 4 & 5 Geo. V., c. 50, intituled "An Act to make such amendments of the law relating to Merchant Shipping as are necessary or expedient to give effect to an International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea" (being the Convention above referred to) was passed on the 10th day of August 1914, the short title of which is "The Merchant Shipping (Convention) Act, 1914";

And whereas by Section 29, Sub-section 5, of the said Act it was provided as follows :—

"This Act shall come into operation on the 1st day of July 1915 ;

"Provided that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, from time to time postpone the coming into operation of this Act for such period, not exceeding on any occasion of postponement one year, as may be specified in the Order" :

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 2nd day of June 1915, His Majesty did postpone the coming into operation of the said Act until the 1st day of January 1916 :

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 30th day of November 1915, His Majesty did further postpone the coming into operation of the said Act until the 1st day of July 1916 :

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 23rd day of May 1916, His Majesty did further

postpone the coming into operation of the said Act until the 1st day of January 1917 :

And whereas His Majesty deems it expedient, owing to a state of War, that the provisions of the Merchant Shipping (Convention) Act, 1914, should be further postponed :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in Him by the above-recited provision, and of all other powers Him thereunto enabling, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions of the Merchant Shipping (Convention) Act, 1914, shall be postponed from coming into operation until the 1st day of January 1918.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by Section one, sub-section one, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May 1916, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3," to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation :

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State, such List as so varied or added to being in the last mentioned Proclamation referred to as the "Statutory List" :

And whereas the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect :—

That the "Statutory List" of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom trading is prohibited, should be further amended by the variation and addition of the names set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

* NOTE (1).—Under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25 June and 10 November 1915, all Proclamations relating to Trading with the Enemy apply to all persons or bodies of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Liberia, Persia, Morocco or Portuguese East Africa, and consequently it is an offence to trade with any person or body of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Liberia, Persia, Morocco or Portuguese East Africa, even though such person or body of persons is not included by name in the above List, and the omission of the name of any such person or body of persons from such List is not an authority or licence to trade with such person or body of persons.

NOTE (2).—Where a firm named in the List has more than one branch in the same country, all branches in that country are held to be included in the List even in cases where no address, or of several addresses one only is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—The List for each country is sent by telegraph to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who will notify British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List; but firms in the United Kingdom with branches

abroad are advised to furnish such branches with copies of the Statutory List. The Lists for all countries in Central and South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington.

The Foreign Trade Department is prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of substitutes for any firm on the Statutory List. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he must undertake to pay the cost of the telegraphic correspondence. A considerable amount of information is, however, already

available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is hoped that it may be possible in many cases to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes in response to inquiries, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. It would greatly facilitate the work of this Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade, or trades for which substitutes are required.

NOTE (4).— Issued concurrently with this Order is a Consolidating List, No. 5A, revised to date and including the amendments in the Schedule annexed hereto.

WHEREAS by virtue and in exercise of the powers conferred on Him by section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, as extended by section one of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, and section one of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to issue a Proclamation dated the 25th day of June 1915, declaring that the exportation of the articles mentioned in the second column of the Schedule to that Proclamation is prohibited to the country named in the first column of the said Schedule unless those articles are consigned to the persons referred to in the third column of the said Schedule :

And whereas by section two of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, any Proclamation made under section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may be varied or added to whilst a state of war exists by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by an Order of Council dated the 7th day of October 1915, the said Proclamation of the 25th day of June 1915 was amended by the substitution of a new Schedule for the Schedule to that Proclamation :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect :—

That the Proclamation dated the 25th day of June 1915, as amended, should be further amended by the substitution for the Schedule to that Proclamation, as amended, of the following Schedule :—

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914,") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1.—(1) The following words shall be added at the end of subsection (2) of Regulation 2F:—
"and any such order may direct that all contracts, or any class of contracts, or any special contract, affected by any provision applied by the order shall remain in force notwithstanding anything in the provision as so applied, but subject to any modifications for which provision may be made by the order."

(2) In Provision No. II. of the provisions appended to Regulation 2F, the following words shall be inserted at the end of the provision:—
"and where the order prohibits or restricts the use of the article for any special purpose a person shall not (subject to any conditions contained in the order), if the use of the article is prohibited, use the article for that purpose, or, if the use of the article is restricted, use it except in accordance with the restrictions."

(3) In Provision No. IV. of the provisions appended to Regulation 2F, after the words "the distribution of the article" there shall be inserted the words "or as to the consumption of the article," and the words "distribution or consumption" shall be substituted for the words "or distribution."

2. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 10:—

"10. The competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions may by order—

(1) require all or any licensed premises within any area specified in the order to be closed, either altogether, or subject to such exceptions as to hours and purposes, and to compliance with such directions as may be specified in the order;

(2) make such provisions as he thinks necessary for the prevention of the practice of treating in any licensed premises within any area specified in the order.

"Any order of the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions under this regulation may be made to apply either generally or as respects all or any members of

His Majesty's forces mentioned in the order, and may require copies of the order to be exhibited in a prominent place in any licensed premises affected thereby.

"If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of an order made under this regulation or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations, and the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions may cause such steps to be taken as may be necessary to enforce compliance with the order.

"In this regulation the expression 'licensed premises' includes any premises or place where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under a licence."

3. After Regulation 10B the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"10c. Where it appears to the Admiralty or the Army Council or to the Minister of Munitions that the use of any premises or place (whether licensed for the purpose or not) for public singing, dancing, music, or other public entertainment of the like kind, is prejudicial to the discipline of any members of His Majesty's forces, or to the production of war material, the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions (as the case may be) may by order require the premises or place to be closed for those purposes, either altogether, or subject to such conditions as to hours and purposes or otherwise as may be specified in the order.

"If the occupier of any such premises or place or any other person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of an order made under this regulation or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations, and the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions may cause such steps to be taken as may be necessary to enforce compliance with the order."

4. The following regulation shall be inserted after Regulation 35A:—

"35AA. It shall be lawful for the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions, with the concurrence of a Secretary of State, to make and apply to any factory or other premises in or upon which any explosive substance or any substance required for the production thereof is manufactured, treated, produced, stored, or in any way used or handled, rules with a view to securing the health of all or any of the persons managing, or employed or being in or about such premises, and in particular rules requiring any occupier of such premises to provide any form of medical attendance, whether on the premises or otherwise, nourishment, clothing, ventilation, or other sanitary arrangements, or to provide and use or to refrain from using any machinery, appliance, method, or process, and by such rules to impose duties on the persons managing, or employed or being in or about such premises.

"Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any such rule shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

5. At the end of proviso (c) to the first paragraph of Regulation 41A after the words "may direct" there shall be inserted the following paragraph:—

"It shall be the duty of every person who

under this regulation is required to make such list as aforesaid, or who keeps such record as aforesaid, to deliver forthwith to the recruiting officer for the locality in which the premises at which the persons included in the list or record are employed, or if such persons are not employed at or about any premises the employer's premises, are situated, a true copy of such list and record, and thereafter to deliver to such recruiting officer during the first week in each calendar month a written report showing any alterations and additions to the said list and record down to the last day of the preceding calendar month, and if he fails to do so he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

6. After Regulation 41A the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"41AA.—(1) Without prejudice to any duty imposed on employers by Regulation 41A, it shall be the duty of every person who in Great Britain takes into his employment any male person who has attained the age of 18 and has not attained the age of 42 in any establishment where munitions work, as defined in section nine of the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916, is carried on, or in an establishment of any class to which this regulation may be applied by order of the Army Council, to deliver, within twenty-four hours after such person is so taken into employment, to the recruiting officer for the locality in which the premises at which such person is employed, or if such persons are not employed at or about any premises the employer's premises, are situated, the particulars in writing concerning such man specified in the table annexed to Regulation 41A, and if any person fails to comply with this regulation, or gives any false information in the particulars required to be delivered, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"(2) It shall be the duty of every person who is taken into employment in any establishment to which this regulation applies, to furnish to his employer, when so required, such information as may be necessary to enable him to deliver the particulars aforesaid, and if he fails to do so, or gives any false information, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

7. After Regulation 41B the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"41C.—(1) Regulation 41B shall apply to any country which is for the time being under blockade on the part of the Allies in the same manner as it applies to an enemy country, and to any persons who would be enemies if the country so under blockade were an enemy country in the same manner as it applies to enemies.

"(2) This regulation shall be deemed to have had effect as from the eighth day of December nineteen hundred and sixteen."

8. After Regulation 42A the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"42B. If any person, without the consent of the Admiralty or Army Council respectively, communicates either directly or indirectly with any member of any of His Majesty's naval or military forces or with the commanding or other officer of such member with intent to induce or assist such member to obtain or apply for his release, transfer to the reserve, or discharge,

so that he may during the continuance of the war engage in civil employment, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"Any communication with a member of any of His Majesty's forces or an officer of such member stating that if such member is released, transferred to the reserve, or discharged, employment can or may be found for him, shall be deemed to have been made with the said intent unless the contrary is proved.

"Nothing in this regulation shall apply to communications with or by a Government department.

"The Admiralty or Army Council may by order grant exemptions from the provisions of this regulation as respects any members or class of members of His Majesty's naval or military forces respectively."

9. In subsection (11) of Regulation 56 the words "an aliens officer, or a person authorised by the Government Department concerned" shall be substituted for the words "or an aliens officer"; and the following words shall be inserted at the end of that subsection:—"Where any of these regulations enables any Government Department to apply by order the regulation or any provision contained in or appended to the regulation, or to make rules or orders, the Government Department by whose order the regulation or provision is applied, or by which the rules or orders are made, shall, for the purposes of this provision, as respects offences against the regulation as so applied, or offences by way of contravention or failure to comply with the rules or orders, be the Government Department concerned; and where the administration of any regulation is assigned by the regulation to any special department, that Government Department shall, for the purposes of this provision, as respects offences against that regulation, be the Government Department concerned."

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 26th April 1916, to sanction the enlistment of Motor Drivers for the Royal Marine Artillery Howitzer and Anti-Aircraft Brigades in the Royal Marines as Privates at the ordinary

rate of pay, and the grant of extra pay to them when qualified as Drivers :

“And whereas no provision is made for the payment of men enlisted prior to the date of that Order in Council :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the institution of the following rates of pay for Motor Drivers and Mechanics of the Royal Marine Artillery Siege and Anti-Aircraft Brigades, enlisted before the 26th April 1916, with retrospective effect to cover payments already made.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM ACTS.
ORDER BY THE ARMY COUNCIL.

LEATHER.

In pursuance of the Powers conferred on Them by the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Act, 1914, as amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, and the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Number 2 Act, 1915, and the Regulations made thereunder, and every other Power enabling Them in that behalf, the Army Council hereby give notice that it is Their intention to take possession of all Leather of the Classes mentioned in the Schedule hereto annexed which is now in stock in the United Kingdom whether in the finished state or in course of production, and of all Leather of the same classes, which can be produced between the date hereof and the 31st March 1917.

If after this notice any person having control of any such Leather, without the consent of the Army Council sells, moves, or secretes such Leather or deals with it in any way contrary to any condition imposed in any licence, permit, or order that may be granted in respect thereof, he shall be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914.

Applications for permission to sell or remove such Leather should be addressed to the Director of Army Contracts, Imperial House, Tothill Street, Westminster, S.W.

SPECIAL ACTS (EXTENSION OF TIME)
ACT, 1915.
GLASGOW (TRAMWAYS, BRIDGES, &c.)
ACT, 1914.

WHEREAS by the Special Acts (Extension of Time) Act, 1915, it is provided *inter alia* that where the time within which a power may be exercised under any Special Act is limited, an application may be made by the person by whom such power may be exercised to the appropriate Government Department for an Order extending that time, and that the Department, if satisfied that the time should be extended, may make an Order accordingly:

And whereas under Part V. of the Glasgow (Tramways, Bridges, &c.) Act, 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1914"), the Corporation of the City of Glasgow (hereinafter called "the Corporation") were empowered compulsorily to acquire certain lands for the purposes therein mentioned and by Section 45 of the Act of 1914 the time within which the said power of compulsory acquisition may be exercised is limited to a period which will expire on the 7th day of August 1917.

And whereas by Section 63 (16) of the Glasgow Corporation (Tramways Consolidation) Order, 1905, as applied by Section 22 of the Act of 1914 to certain of the tramways authorised to be constructed by the Act of 1914 the time within which the construction of the said tramways may be commenced is limited to a period which will expire on the 7th day of August 1917.

And whereas the Corporation have in terms of the Special Acts (Extension of Time) Act, 1915, applied to the Secretary for Scotland for an Order extending the said periods as hereinafter prescribed.

And whereas I am satisfied that the periods in respect of which the application is made should be extended as hereinafter prescribed.

Now THEREFORE, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the last mentioned Act, I, the Right Honourable Robert Munro, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, hereby order as follows:—

1. The time within which the powers of the Corporation for the compulsory purchase of lands under the provisions of Part V. of the Act of 1914 may be exercised is hereby extended for a period of one year, that is to say, until the 7th day of August 1918 so far as regards the following Tramways, Street Works and Bridges authorised by that Act:—

Tramways Nos. 1 to 15 inclusive, and 17 to 28 inclusive described in Section 6 of the Act of 1914.

Street Works Nos. 1 to 13 inclusive described in Section 11 of the Act of 1914.

Bridges Nos. 1 and 3 described in Section 23 of the Act of 1914.

2. The time within which the construction of such of the tramways authorised by the Act of 1914 as will be situate in burghs and districts beyond the city in the counties of Lanark, Renfrew and Dunbarton may be commenced is hereby extended for a period of one year, that is to say, until the 7th day of August 1918.

3. This Order may be cited as the Glasgow (Tramways, Bridges &c.) Act 1914 (Extension of Time) Order, 1916.
