**W**HEREAS by the Crown Office Act, 1877, a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, consisting of the Lord Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being, the Lord Privy Seal for the time being, and one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, may by Order make and (when made) from time to time revoke, add to, or alter, Rules prescribing the documents to which the Wafer Great Seal, as defined in the said Act, is to be attached, and the material on which the said documents are to be prepared :

And whereas the Lords of the said Committee, in pursuance of the said Act, did by Their Order dated the 30th day of August 1916, make Rules directing (amongst other things) that the documents specified in the first column of the Schedule to the said Order should be printed or written on the material mentioned in the second column, and should be impressed with or have attached to them the Great Seal named in the third column :

And whereas it is expedient to add to the documents specified in the said Schedule :

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been compiled with :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Committee, in pursuance of the said Act, do hereby order that the following addition be made to the Schedule to the said Order of the 30th day of August 1916, that is to say :—

**WHEREAS** His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by Section one, sub-section one, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May 1916, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3," to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation :

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State, such List as so varied or added to being in the last mentioned Proclamation referred to as the "Statutory List" :

And whereas the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect :—

That the "Statutory List" of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom trading is prohibited, should be further amended by the variation and addition of the names set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having any dealings with any of the persons or firms mentioned in this List, or in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3. A List consolidating all previous Lists was published on the 22nd December 1916 (the Consolidating List No. 15a), which, together with the List herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the same country, all dealings in that country with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses is specifically mentioned.

\*NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June and 10th November 1915 with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List

NOTE (4).—In order to minimise as far as

possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared, on application, to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants, in making inquiries, would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to His Majesty's Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

The KING has been pleased to give and grant unto Charles Stuart M'Kinley, Esq., His Majesty's Royal licence and authority to wear the Insignia of the Seventh Class of the Order of the Excellent Crop, which Decoration was conferred upon him by the late President of the Republic of China in recognition of valuable services rendered by him.

His Majesty the KING has been pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Joseph Johannes Venter under the following circumstances:—

On the 19th April 1915, Thomas Reardon and Joseph Johannes Venter were carrying out blasting operations at the Government Gold Mining Areas (Modderfontein) Consolidated Mine, South Africa. Each man was working in a separate drive, and it was their practice to charge their shot holes (13 in number) and await the signal of a boy stationed at a point where the two drives joined, whereupon they lit their fuses and withdrew to the junction of the drives.

On this occasion Venter duly received the signal and lit his fuses. On reaching the junction of the drives he heard a report in Reardon's drive and was told by the boy that Reardon was still at his working place. He at once rushed down Reardon's drive, through heavy fumes, and, after travelling about 250 feet, fell over Reardon's body. He picked him up and carried him about 78 feet when two further shots exploded in Reardon's place, knocking Venter down. Venter then dragged Reardon to the shelter of the wall and ran for help, returning in about two minutes with two or three men. As they entered the drive, further shots exploded. They went through the fumes and carried Reardon clear, but he died four days later.

In entering Reardon's drive for the purpose of rescuing Reardon, when only one shot out of thirteen had exploded, and knowing that the remaining shots might (as in fact some of them did) explode at any moment, Venter undoubtedly risked his life to save Reardon.

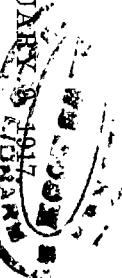

No person shall sell raw wool grown on sheep in Great Britain, Ireland and the Isle of Man prior to 1st January 1916, including fleece wool and skin wool, but not including daggings, locks, brokes and fallen wool, otherwise than to persons authorised by licence, appointment, or general or special permit granted by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts or at prices other than those set out in the Schedules annexed to the said Order of the Army Council relating to dealings in wool and dated 14th November 1916, or at such other prices as in any particular case may be allowed by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, provided that nothing herein contained shall regulate or restrict the sale of raw wool as last aforesaid if such sale is completed within 30 days next following after the date hereof.

2. All persons having in their custody or control any raw wool grown on sheep in Great Britain, Ireland and the Isle of Man prior to 1st January 1916, shall furnish such particulars of such wool as may be required by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts.
