RULES FOR NAVAL ORDNANCE MAGAZINE DEPÔTS.

Under the "Defence of the Realm Regulations."

RULES for securing safety of the Naval Ordnance Magazine Depôts under the charge of the Admiralty.

In pursuance of the powers conferred by Regulation 35_{A} of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby make the following rules :—

1.—Application.

These rules shall apply to every person employed in the Naval Ordnance Magazine Depôts and shall have effect over the whole area within the Depôt except only such areas or buildings (if any) as are expressly excepted by the order of the Officer in Charge of the Depôt. The posting of

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these Rules conspicuously in or at the entrance to [the Depôt shall be deemed to be notice of their contents to all persons concerned.

2.—Smoking, Tobacco, &c.

No person shall smoke anywhere within the Depôt, or bring into or have in his possession while within the Depôt any cigar, cigarette, tobacco, pipe, or contrivance for smoking, except as authorised by the Officer in Charge of the Depôt or the Depôt Rules.

3.—Matches, Lights, &c.

No person shall bring within the Depôt or have in his possession whilst within the Depôt any match or apparatus for producing light, or any lamp, light or fire of any description or any article of iron or steel, except as authorised by the Officer in Charge of the Depôt or by the Depôt rules.

4.—Searching.

The Police and anyone authorised by the Officer in Charge of the Depôt may search at any time any person entering or being within the Depôt, and may examine such person's clothing and any bag, basket, parcel or other article being carried, and any person entering or being within the Depôt shall, if so required by any such authorised person, submit to being searched and comply with any reasonable directions or regulations given or made with the object of enabling the same to be carried out. Provided that in no case shall any female person be searched by or in the presence of, anyone but a female person.

5.—Intoxication.

No person in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or to remain within the Depôt.

6.—Saving of Other Rules.

Nothing in these rules shall affect any shop or other rules of or prescribed for the Depôt, or the power to impose fines for the breach of such rules, subject to the provisions of the Truck Acts.

Any person failing to comply with the above rules will be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations and liable on summary conviction to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding £100, or both.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

Order (Amendment) of the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) for the Scotland, WEST CENTRAL, AREA (ARGYLL AND BUTE).

We the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm hereby make the following Order :---

Limits of Area.

1. This Order shall apply to so much of the Scotland (West Central) Area as comprises the Burghs of Oban and Tobermory, the Island of Mull, and the Parishes of Kilmore and Kilbride, and Ardchattan and Muckairn, in the County of Argyll, and all arms of the sea and waters between the Island of Mull and the Mainland.

Amendment of the Order for the Scotland, West Central, Area (Argyll and Bute).

2. The Order of the Board for the Scotland,

West Central, Area (Argyll and Bute), made on the 29th day of July 1916, shall, in so far as it affects the above-mentioned part of the area, be amended as follows :---

Article 3 of the said Order shall be revoked and the following Article shall be substituted therefor:—

Sale of Spirits prohibited.

Notwithstanding anything contained in Article 2 or Article 5 (d) of this Order, . no person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club or dispatch therefrom any spirits to be consumed either on or off the premises, or purchase or consume in or take from or permit any person to consume in or take from any such premises or club any spirits.

Provided always that :---

- (a) The sale or supply of spirits on an order stating why the spirits are required and signed by an officer of police or procurator fiscal; or, in cases where spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes, on an order stating that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes and specifying the quantity of spirits required, and signed by any duly qualified medical practitioner, police constable, magistrate or minister of religion, shall not be deemed to be in contravention of " the provisions of this Article, provided that such order be transmitted to the procurator fiscal in the manner, with the note and within the time required by s. 55 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act, 1903, and the provisions of the said section shall apply to such order:
- (b) The consumption by any person in any licensed premises or club or the taking by him therefrom of any spirits possession whereof has been acquired without contravention of the provisions of this Article shall not be deemed to be in contravention of the provisions of this Article.

And the said Order shall be read as if the foregoing Article were expressly inserted therein.

3. Article 5 (c) of the said Order is hereby revoked.

4. The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of exciseable liquor in the above-mentioned part of the area shall keep permanently affixed in some conspicuous place in the club or in each public room in the licensed premises a copy of this Order.

5. This Order shall come into force on the twenty-ninth day of March 1917.


