Temp. 2nd Lt. Eric Gordon Henderson

Lyon, Sco. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He was severely wounded in the earlier stages of the raid, but continued to lead his men till the objective was reached.

2nd Lt. Stewart Milley, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He bombed two dug-outs, killing three of the enemy, and rescued a wounded officer from the enemy front line. Later, he, single-handed, drove back a party of the enemy and rescued several wounded men under very heavy fire.

Lt. (acting Capt.) John Graham Mowat, W. Rid. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great gallantry, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. On one occasion he personally helped to clear a gap in the enemy's wire.

2nd Lt. John Richard Neave, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when leading a patrol. He encountered two enemy patrols of superior strength to his own, and at once attacked them and drove them off in disorder. He displayed great courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. William Herbert Odbert, Conn.

Rang., attd. R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During an intense hostile bombardment of the front line, he went backwards and forwards between various posts to see that his men were ready to meet an attack.

2nd Lt. Alfred Oliver Pollard, H.A.C..

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol and carried out a dangerous reconnaissance. Later, he assumed command of a company and repulsed two strong enemy counter-attacks.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Harold Alfred Pound,  $\mathbb{R}.N.V.R.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of a company, and, under the most difficult conditions, succeeded in closing a gap in the front line. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Basil Bedsmore Rackham, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked ability in preparing gun positions, and continually moved from position to position under very heavy fire. On another occasion, he displayed great bravery in going round the whole line during an enemy counter-attack.

Temp. Lt. Allan George Reid, R.A.M.C., attd. R.N. Fld. Amb.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy fire, and worked continuously for 36 hours in command of a bearer sub-division which was operating in a forward area.

2nd Lt. Cecil Oliver Rich, Wilts. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually carried out daring patrols of the enemy's wire, and the success of a raiding party was largely due to his information.

Temp. Lt. William Lister Robotti, R.M.L.I.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion
to duty. He conducted two echelons of a
pack-animal train to within 300 yards of the
front line, under very heavy fire. He displayed great courage throughout, and set a
fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harvey Wilfred Warwick Rowe, Ches. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He was the first to enter the trench, and himself accounted for five of the enemy. He then organised the clearing of the trench with marked coclness and ability, with the result that heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy.

2nd Lt. Wilfrid Rippon Snow, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He successfully bombed a hostile aerodrome from a height of 1,000 ft. Later, in another machine, he again bombed the hostile aerodrome from a low altitude. On another occasion he made two very daring trench reconnaissances.

2nd Lt. George Stephens, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his platoon with great gallantry, and materially assisted in repelling a strong enemy raiding party.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. John Cecil Sterndale-Bennett, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rushed up and endeavoured to save a post which was being strongly attacked by the enemy. In doing this he was severely wounded, but refused to leave his post until another officer could be found to replace him.

Lt. Geoffrey Killigrew Wait, Wilts. R.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. He
led a raiding party with great gallantry,
and organized the different attacking parties
with great skill. He set a splendid example
throughout.

2nd Lt. John Watson, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded in two places, he continued to lead and encourage his men until he fainted from loss of blood close to the enemy's wire.

2nd Lt. Frank Bernard Williams, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He voluntarily carried an important message under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Williams, R. Welsh

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches.
