2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) Arthur Mervyn Bown,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During hostile shelling the ammunition in the gunpit was set on fire. He went to the pit to extinguish the fire. While thus employed a large number of trench mortar bombs exploded a short distance away, wounding a man in the pit. He removed the man to a dug-out, and returning succeeded in extinguishing the fire, thus saving a large quantity of ammunition.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank William Bracecamp, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reconnoitred a position upon which it was necessary to bring observed fire. He got within two hundred yards of the spot, and in spite of rifle fire and continuous sniping completed his observation.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Frank Brindley, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He covered the retirement of the Battalion to a fresh position with a machinegun, and was the last man to leave the position. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Francis Benjamin Brooke, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was sent up to the firing line to observe the situation, and when the Infantry advanced he went with it, and was able to send and bring back most valuable information, crossing time after time under heavy

2nd Lt. George Brown, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men to the assault with great dash and succeeded in inflicting many casualties on the enemy.

2nd Lt. John Wilfred Brown, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances under heavy fire, and brought back most valuable information. His fine example added greatly to the spirit and initiative of the patrols working under him.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) George McIllree Stanton Bruce, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his company was strongly counter attacked he went from post to post under heavy fire encouraging his men. It was greatly owing to his fine leading and example that the enemy attack was beaten off.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Stawell Bryan, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He gallantly led his platoon forward in the face of the most intense hostile fire. He has at all times set a magnificent example to his men.

Temp. Capt. Joseph Michael Buckley, Rif.  $\mathbf{Bde}.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led two companies in the most |

gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He gained his objective, capturing sixty prisoners and two machine-guns.

2nd Lt. Richard Edward Walter Burke, R. Ir. Regt., Spec. Res., attd. Conn. Rang.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on enemy trenches. though wounded early in the proceedings he continued to lead his men until ordered to the rear. He has on all occasions set a fine example under fire.

2nd Lt. Frank Burn-Callander, R.F.A.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When acting as Brigade F.O.O., the post was heavily shelled, but he succeeded in sending back timely and valuable information. During operations it was due to his great daring and knowledge of the situation that communications were maintained with the rear.

Capt. Richard Thompson Caesar, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On taking over the line, the cellars of the village were full of wounded. He proceeded with bearers to search all the cellars and organised removal of patients. Although the shelling was heavy and practically continuous, he remained all day and succeeded in clearing the village of all wounded.

Temp. Lt. Peter Forbes Campbell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was commanding a party assisting to consolidate the captured position. went forward to reconnoitre, but wounded; he continued his reconnaissance and was again wounded. He was finally wounded a third time before being picked up thirty hours later. He succeeded in having his report sent in to his O.C. before being evacuated.

Temp. Capt. Frederick George Cangley, D.S.O., L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally assisted in cutting enemy wire under close rifle and machine gun fire. The success of the attack was largely due to his determination and dash.

Capt. Ughtred Eliott Carnegy Carnegy, D.G.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He prepared the cavalry track through the trenches immediately after the advance of the infantry and under heavy fire. He also showed great gallantry in organising the evacuation of the wounded.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Joseph Carr Archer, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry while ferrying troops across the river. He showed great coolness and resource in launching the first pontoon: He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.
