Copy of a letter from Admiral the Right Hon. Lord Gardner, to William Marsden, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship the Dryad, in Cork Harbour, Feb. 5. 1806.

SIR—His Majesty's ship *Druid* arrived here early this morning; and I have the pleasure to inclose, for their Lordships' information, copy of a letter, dated at sea the 2d inst. from Capt. P. B. V. Broke, giving an account of his having captured the French ship privateer *Prince Murat*, having on board eighteen six pounders; and one hundred and twenty-seven men; five days at sea from L'Orient, and had not made any captures.

MY LORD—I have the pleasure to inform you, that his Majesty's ship under my command, captured this morning, after a chase of ninety miles, the *Prince Murat* French ship privateer, of eighteen guns, six-pounders, and one hundred and twenty-seven men, commanded by Monsieur Rine Murin, out five days from L'Orient, and had made no captures;—she is a coppered ship, and a fast sailer.
