At the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 12th of February, 1806.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This day his Grace John Duke of Bedford, the Right Hon. Henry Earl of Carnarvon, the Right Hon. John Joshua Earl of Carysfort, the Rt. Hon. Charles Augustus Lord Ossulton, the Right Hon. St Andrew Lord St John, of Bletsoe, and the Rt. Hon. William Elliot, were, by his Majesty's command, sworn of his Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty, in Council, was this day pleased to declare his Grace John Duke of Bedford Lieutenant-General, and General Governor of that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to deliver the custody of the Seals of the Duchy and County-Palatine of Lancaster to the Right Hon. Edward Earl of Darby, the oath of Chancellor of the said Duchy was this day, by his Majesty's command, administered to his Lordship.

His Majesty having been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to constitute the Right Hon. Francis Earl of Moira Constable of his Majesty's Tower of London, and also Lord Lieutenant of the Tower Hamlets, his Lordship this day, in Council, took the oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy, as Constable of the said Tower, and as Lord Lieutenant of the said Tower Hamlets, and likewise the oath of Constable of the Tower of London.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. Francis Earl of Moira to be Constable of the Tower of London, in the room of the Marquis Cornwallis, deceased.

The King has also been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. Francis Earl of Moira to be his Majesty's Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the Tower Hamlets, in the room of the Marquis Cornwallis, deceased.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right

Hon. Richard Brinsley Sheridan, the office of Treasurer of his Majesty's Navy.

The King has been pleased to grant to John Calcraft, Esq. the office of Clerk of the Ordnance of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. Robert Earl of Buckinghamshire, and the Right Hon. John Joshua Earl of Carysfort, Knight of the Illustrious Order of St Patrick, to the office of Postmaster General.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. Richard Chandos Earl Temple, and the Right Hon. John Townshend, commonly called Lord John Townshend, to the office of Paymaster General of his Majesty's Forces.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignities of Baron and Viscount of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to Thomas Anson, Esq. and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the names, styles, and titles of Baron Soberton, of Soberton, in the county of Southampton, and Viscount Anson, of Shugborough and Orgrave, in the county of Stafford.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to the Most Honourable John Denis Marquis of Sligo, Knight of the Illustrious Order of St Patrick, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Montreagle, of Westport, in the county of Mayo.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to the Right Hon. Hugh Earl of Eglington, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Ardrossan, of Ardrossan, in the county of Ayr.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to John Crewe, Esq. and the heirs male of his body, lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Crewe, of Crewe, in the County-Palatine of Chester.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to William Lygon, Esq. and the heirs male of his body, lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Beauchamp, of Powdyke, in the county of Worcester.

The King has been graciously pleased to grant unto the Right Hon. and Rev. Wm. Nelson, D. D. Baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Hilborough, in the county of Norfolk, Viscount Merton and Earl Nelson of Trafalgar and of Merton, in the county of Surrey, sole brother and heir of Horatio, late Viscount and Baron Nelson, deceased, his Royal licence and authority that he and his issue may bear the honourable augmentations to their Armorial Ensigns which were granted to the said Horatio, late Viscount and Baron Nelson, and that he and his issue male may bear the Crest and Motto, and that he and the heirs male of his body, to whom the aforesaid dignities of Earl Nelson, Viscount Merton, and Baron Nelson shall descend, may bear and use the Supporters which were borne and used by the said Horatio, late Viscount and Baron Nelson, deceased.

And also to order that this his Majesty's said concession and declaration be recorded in the College of Arms.

WESTMINSTER, FEB. 12.

This day, the Lords being met, and the Commons attending, the Royal Assent, by Commission, was given to an act for continuing and granting



to his Majesty certain duties upon Malt in Great Britain, for the year 1806.

An Act for continuing and granting to his Majesty a duty on Pensions, Offices, and Personal Estates in England, and certain Duties on Sugar, Malt, Tobacco, and Snuff, in Great Britain, for the service of the year 1806, and one private act.
