SIR—I have the honour of informing you, that I yesterday captured the Spanish letter of marque Amelia, of eight 6-pounde s and 40 men, from Corunna to Chamana, with a valuable cargo of dry goods and wine.

I have further to inform you, that the Heureux and Kingslifter captured, on the 28th of last month, the Spanish merchant brig Solidad, from Cadiz to Vera Cruz, laden with brandy and wine.

Six—I have the honour to inform you, that, on the 8th inft, I fell in with and captured the French privateer ship Le Heuron, mounting 16 eighteen-pounder carronades and two long nines, and having on board 130 men. Upon the Heureux's coming alongside Le Huron she opened a fuart fire, which was foon filenced; by which act of ratines her Captain, Second Lieutenant, and two men were killed, and feven seamen wounded.

Extract of a letter from Lieut. Briarley, commanding his Majesty's armed brig Steady, 24th of December, 1805.

In confequence of a request from his Excellency-the Governor of Trimid d. I proceeded to Pardo Bay, on the Spanth coast, in the Brilliam Schoon-er, attended by a Launch, and took possession of the Vacuna, a small row boat privateer, and a schooner and two sloops which she had captured, their crews having deferted them on our appear-ance.

Sir—Yesterday at noon, Barbadoes bearing fouth 72 deg. west, distant fifty-fix miles, two strange sail were seen to windward, steering large. We soon discovered one of them to be his Majesty's ship Heureux, in chace of an enemy's schooner. Being to leeward, I was happy in having it in my power to affist the Heureux, by preventing the chace getting before the wind, though she endeavoured to cross us. The Agamemon gained very saft on her to leeward, as did the Heureux to windward. Both ships got alongside of her at half pass, see P. M. when the Heureux took possession. She proves to be the Dame Ernout, of sixteen long sixes (throwing overhoard in the chace) and one 12-pounder, with a complement of one hundred and sisteen man; had been out fourteen days from Guadaloupe, without making any capture.—I have the honour to be, &c.

S18,77-Herewith I inclose, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a let-ter I have received from Lieut. Charles Shakleton, days of Rebuff gun-brig, acquainting me with the caphing ture of the Sorciere lugger privateer, belonging to
St Maloes. She furrendered to the Mayflower
privateer, of Guernfey, which joined in the chace,
and from her fast failing, came up with her; great
praife is due to Mr James Laine, her Commander,
for his activity and exertions on this occasion.

The Sorciere is a remarkable fast failer, and has
done immense injury to our trade, particularly off
the coast of Ireland, and in the British Channel.
