

Copy of a letter from Admiral Lord Gardner to Wm. Marsden, Esq. dated at Cork, the 28th April 1806.

SIR—Inclosed, I transmit for their Lordships' information, copy of a letter delivered to me this day by Capt. Maitland, of his Majesty's ship Loire, giving an account of the capture, by that ship, on the 22d instant, of the Princess of Peace, Spanish schooner privateer, which vessel arrived here this morning with the Loire.

Loire, at Sea, April 23, 1806.

MY LORD—I have to inform you, that his Majesty's ship Loire, yesterday evening, in lat. 48 deg. 30 min. long. 12 deg. 20 min. captured the Princess of Peace, a very fine new Spanish privateer schooner, pierced for 14 guns, though only carrying one large 24-pounder and 63 men; she had been out of Passage five days, on her first cruise, without having taken any thing.

SIR—I have the honour to inclose a copy of my letter, of this day's date, to Eliab Harvey, Esq. Rear-Admiral of the Blue.—I am, &c.

Minerva, off Cape Finisterre, April 26, 1806.

SIR—I have the honour to inform you, that, waiting in Finisterre Bay for moderate weather, and the junction of his Majesty's gun-brig Conflict, Lieut. J. B. Batt, to cut out some small craft lying under the town, a French privateer lugger rounded the Cape, and immediately wore, and stood to sea. At eleven P.M. after a chase of near sixty miles, she was boarded by Lieut. Batt, and proved to be the French lugger Finisterre, of fourteen guns and fifty-two men, commanded by Monsieur Michelle Denré; left Corunna that morning, had made no capture, and intended cruising off Oporto for British convoys.

I have great pleasure in stating the very active conduct of Lieut. Batt, of the Conflict, to whom I feel principally indebted for the capture of the privateer.—I have the honour to be, &c.

WESTMINSTER, MAY 5.

This day, the Lords Being met, and the Commons attending, the Royal Assent, by commission, was given to

An act for raising the sum of three millions, by loans or Exchequer bills, for the service of Great Britain for the year 1806.

An act for repealing the several duties of customs upon Tea imported into Great Britain, and granting a duty in lieu thereof; and for granting to his Majesty additional duties of Excise on Tea.

An act for granting to his Majesty, during the present war, and for six months after the expiration thereof by the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, additional duties on certain goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into, exported from, or brought or carried coastwise, within Great Britain.

An act for granting to his Majesty, until twelve months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, additional duties of Excise on Tobacco and Snuff.

An act for granting to his Majesty certain Stamp

Duties on Appraisements, and on licences to Appraisors in Great Britain.

An Act to enable his Majesty to grant a certain annuity to Vice-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, Knight, of the most honourable Order of the Bath, in consideration of the eminent services which he has rendered to his Majesty and the public.

An Act for carrying to the Consolidated Fund of Great Britain the duties on Wine, granted by two Acts of the 43d and 44th years of his present Majesty.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act of the last Session of Parliament as charges a duty of 3s. upon certain tenements or dwelling-houses in Ireland.

An Act to revive and amend so much of an act made in the forty-third year of his present Majesty, for granting certain stamp duties in Ireland as provides for the exempting from the said duties bank notes, and bank post bills, issued by the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland.

An Act for the better regulation of the office of Treasurer of the Ordnance.

An Act to declare the law with respect to witnesses refusing to answer.

An Act to extend the provisions of so much of an act passed in the thirty-ninth and fortieth years of his present Majesty as relates to repairing certain turnpike-roads, in the county of Aberdeen, to other roads within the said county; and to fourteen other road and private acts.
