A PROCLAMATION

FOR APPOINTING SATURDAY, JULY 19, A BANK HOLIDAY AND A PUBLIC HOLIDAY THROUGHOUT THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

**W**E, considering that, with a view to the more wide-spread and general celebration of the Conclusion of Peace, it is desirable that Saturday the Nineteenth day of July instant should be observed as a Bank Holiday and as a Public Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, and in pursuance of the provisions of The Bank Holidays Act, 1871, The Holidays Extension Act, 1875, The Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, and The Revenue Offices (Scotland) Holidays Act, 1880, Do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Acts aforesaid, appoint Saturday the Nineteenth day of July instant, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and as a Public Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, under and in accordance with the said Acts, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said day to be so observed, and all Our loving subjects to order themselves accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Eleventh day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Tenth year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Mr. John William Pratt, M.P., has been appointed by the Secretary for Scotland, in terms of the Scottish Board of Health Act, to be Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Health in Scotland.

In terms of Section three of the Scottish Board of Health Act, the Secretary for Scotland has nominated Sir James Leishman and Dr. J. C. M'Vail, two of the Scottish Insurance Commissioners, to be members of the Scottish Board of Health. He has also designated Sir George M'Crae, D.S.O., to be Chairman of the Board in the absence of the President and Vice-President.

**W**HEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of

the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day of March 1919, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day of March 1919, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:—

(1) That the following headings should be deleted:—

Chemicals, drugs, dyes, dyestuffs, and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations, the following:—

(B) Potash Salts and mixtures containing such Potash Salts not otherwise prohibited;

(A) Hides, wet salted, cattle;

(A) Leather, except chamois, skivers, and seal;

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, the following:—

(A) Vegetable, fresh, of all kinds.

(2) That the following headings should be added:—

(A) Hides, British and Irish cattle;

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, the following:—

(A) Tomatoes, fresh.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING has been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal, bearing date the 18th day of June 1919, to appoint the Right Hon. George Nathaniel Earl Curzon of Kedles-

ton, Lord President of the Council, the Right Hon. Rufus Daniel Earl of Reading, Lord Chief Justice of England, the Right Hon. Richard Burdon Viscount Haldane, the Right Hon. Robert Bannatyne Viscount Finlay, the Right Hon. Stanley Owen Lord Buckmaster, the Right Hon. William Lord Sterndale, President of the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division, to be Commissioners for the care and custody of the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland during the absence of the Right Hon. Frederick Lord Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, from the United Kingdom.

The KING has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ, in the University of Oxford, to elect a Bishop of the See of Oxford, the same being void by the resignation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Charles Gore, late Bishop thereof; and His Majesty has been pleased to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Hubert Murray Burge, now Bishop of Southwark, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Oxford.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Lieutenant (acting Major) William Revell Smith, M.C., R.F.A., Sergeant Alexander Gibson, Royal Engineers, and Corporal James Smith, Military Mounted Police, in recognition of their gallantry in endeavouring to save life at Wizernes in January last.

On the 17th January 1919, a fire occurred at the brewery at Wizernes. In the engine room a Frenchman, whose cries for help could be heard, had been entombed by a fall of masonry which completely blocked the entrance. The upper part of the building was blazing fiercely, and the only entrance to the engine room was by a small hole in the wall which carried the machinery belting. Major Smith, Sergeant Gibson, and Corporal Smith succeeded in making their way through this hole into the room, and worked for three-quarters of an hour before they exposed the head and shoulders of the entombed man, who was found to be dead.

They undoubtedly risked their lives in endeavouring to save life, for a further collapse of masonry (which appeared imminent) would have completely cut off their exit.

GENERAL LICENCE.

TRADING WITH THE ENEMY.

FEEs IN RESPECT OF PATENTS, DESIGNS, AND TRADE MARKS.

The Board of Trade, on behalf of His Majesty

and in pursuance of the powers reserved in the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations and all other powers thereunto them enabling, do hereby give and grant licence

(1) To all persons residing, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom to pay

(a) on their own behalf or on behalf of any person or persons residing, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom ;

(b) on behalf of any person or persons residing, carrying on business or being in any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom who have been authorised to make such payments by the Government of that part of His Majesty's dominions ; and

(c) on behalf of any other person who has been authorised or is permitted to make such payments by the Government of the country in which such person resides, carries on business or is,

any fees necessary for obtaining the grant of or for obtaining the renewal of Patents, or for obtaining the registration of Designs or Trade Marks or the renewal of such registration in an enemy country, and to pay to enemy agents their charges and expenses in relation to the matters aforesaid ;

(2) To all persons residing, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom to pay on behalf of an enemy any fees payable on application for or renewal of the grant of Patents, or on application for the registration of Designs or Trade Marks or the renewal of such registration.

(a) in the United Kingdom ;

(b) in any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom where the payment of such fees on behalf of an enemy has been authorised by the Government of that part of His Majesty's dominions ; and

(c) in any other country where the payment of such fees on behalf of an enemy has been authorised or is permitted by the Government of that country ;

and to pay to

(a) agents in the United Kingdom (including themselves) ;

(b) agents in any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom who have been authorised by the Government of that part of His Majesty's dominions to act on behalf of enemies in connection with the matters aforesaid ; and

(c) agents in any other country who have been authorised or are permitted by the Government of that country to act on behalf of enemies in connection with the matters aforesaid,

their charges and expenses, if any, in relation to the matters aforesaid .

#### THE DOWNS—INFORMATION WITH REGARD TO ROUTE INSTRUCTIONS.

On and after 28th July 1919, vessels proceeding through the Downs will no longer be boarded for the purpose of issuing to them Route Instructions unless they require it.

Vessels proceeding into the North Sea which wish to obtain the latest Mine Warnings to Mariners or other information regarding Routes, in order to check, correct or amplify the instructions already in their possession, must pass through the Downs, and should :

- (a) by day, fly Y flag International code.
- (b) by night, make the flashing signal “Y” by morse code, until attended to, to indicate that they wish to be boarded for this purpose. They should approach the Boarding vessel, which will exhibit :
  - (a) by day, 3 black balls horizontally.
  - (b) by night, 3 red lights horizontally.
