advanced guard commander with energy and decision. When less experienced troops were temporarily thrown into confusion under heavy fire he' continued to advance his platoon and forced the enemy to quit their position. He then by his example and leadership gave the greatest help in restoring the situation until it was possible to continue the advance. He showed great gallantry and devotion to duty.

T./Lt. (T./Capt.) William James George Child, 1st Bn., N. Staffs. R.

At Rialka, on 15th March 1919, he, with a small party of Cossack Plastoon, attacked and captured two Bolshevik machine-guns, killing and driving off the teams, which were just coming into action against the party under Capt. Deighton, who were recapturing the village of Lytchino. His fine action, skill, and courage greatly assisted the attack, and set a high example to the Russian troops.

2nd Lt. (T./Capt.) George Frederick Harold Deighton, 3rd Bn., York and Lanc. R.

At Rialka, on 15th March 1919, the Bolsheviks attacked and held the village of Lytchino. He collected a small party of about twenty men, attacked and retook Lytchino, with five prisoners and two machine guns. His coolness, courage, and prompt action were of great assistance in repulsing the attack, and in setting a high example to the Russian troops.

T./2nd Lt. Robert Norman Dodds, D.C.M., M.M., R.E.

During the attacks on Bolshee-Ozerki on 23rd March and 2nd April 1919, he worked unceasingly under heavy fire from the enemy, and, after having established signal communication, continued, at great personal risk, to keep in touch with the different attacking parties. It was his disregard for danger and splendid spirit that inspired his men to keep up communication at all risks when exposed to great danger.

T./2nd Lt. Samuel George Dudley, 17th Bn., L'pcol R.

When the enemy attacked Mala-Beresnik on 1st May 1919, he was sent out to take charge of an advanced post of considerable importance. He handled the garrison of this post, consisting of one N.C.O. and eight men, with great skill, and set a fine example of cool courage. He took his detachment out of the post and engaged the enemy from his right rear, thus holding up the main enemy attack.

Lt. John Dudley Stanhope Holroyd-Sergeant Yorks. R., attd. 13th Bn.

On the early morning of the 3rd April 1919, he took up reinforcements to help the party in the blockhouse at the  $4\frac{1}{2}$  verst on Alexandrovo Road. Whilst his men were still in the sledges, he met the party from the blockhouse retiring on Sred Mekrenga. At the same moment he was fired on from both flanks. Owing to his great coolness and fine example set by him, the whole party was extricated with only the loss of one sledge. Later, when in charge of a blockhouse, he was strongly attacked by the enemy, but repulsed them with heavy casualties, leaving over 100 prisoners in our hands, with four machine guns.

T./2nd Lt. Charles Frederick Jameson, 13th Bn., Yorks R.

During the enemy's attempted attack on Sred Mekrenga on 17th March 1919, he showed a splendid example to the men. When the cavalry patrol fell back too rapidly, he rallied the British infantry patrol and set them the necessary example with great coolness under heavy rifle fire.

2nd Lt. Charles Norman Marshall, 6th Bn., Yorks R.

He showed great gallantry and disregard of danger in the action on 2nd April 1919, west of Bolshee-Ozerki. When all his company Lews guns were out of action he went back 300 yards under heavy machine-gun fire and brought up two more guns.

Lt. Bernhard William John Hankins Martin, D.S.O., R.F.A., Spec. Res.

At Vistafka, during the enemy attacks 28th February to 4th March 1919, he handled his gun with the greatest coolness and efficiency, relaxing no effort. His fine spirit communicated itself to those under his command.

T./Capt. Maurice George Trant M'Call, 13th Bn., Yorks R.

During the attack by the enemy on Sred Mekrenga on 17th March 1919, he was commanding the party covering our front line. Although both his flanks were turned by the enemy, he continued to put up such a stubborn defence that the enemy withdrew. He did fine work.

T./Lt. Ashton Christopher Mills, 6th Bn. Yorks. R.

For marked gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with his two platoons, held up the enemy east of Bailey's track, west of Bolshee-Ozerki, on 2nd April 1919, for five hours under heavy machine-gun fire, and repeated attempts of the enemy to turn his right flank. His gallant work and tenacity were the means of his company not being cut off.

Lt. (T./Capt.) Godfrey Fuller Whistler, R.F.A.

At Tulgas, on 25th April 1919, a mutiny occurred among the Russian troops. His prompt action in shooting a mutineer saved the lives of two other officers. He subsequently took charge and carried out the retirement of the guns from Tulgas with great ability. His courage and devotion to duty had the effect of keeping the Russian artillery personnel loyal.

T./2nd Lt. Leslie Milne Worgan, 17th Bn., L'pool R.

He held, with his platoon of twenty men, a forward post during the enemy attack on Mala-Beresnik on 1st May 1919. By the coolness and judgment with which he controlled the fire of his own unit and his fine
