By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

**W**HEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited :

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918 and the 12th day of March 1919, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect :—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918 and the 12th day of March 1919, should be further amended by making the following amendment in the Schedule to the same :—

That the following heading should be deleted :—

(B) Cotton, American.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

**RATES OF INTEREST ON LOANS FROM  
THE LOCAL LOANS FUND FOR  
HOUSING.**

The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that They have been pleased to direct by Their Minute of the 30th ultimo that the following rates of interest shall be charged as from the 1st instant on Loans from the Local Loans Fund for Housing, viz. :—

**I.**

Loans in respect of schemes not receiving subsidy under the Housing Acts :—

(a) To Companies and Private Persons limiting their profits to 6 per cent. per annum (subject to Income Tax) :—

Not exceeding 30 years,  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.  
Not exceeding 40 years,  $5\frac{3}{4}$  per cent.

(b) To Companies and Private Persons not so limiting their profits :—

Not exceeding 30 years, 6 per cent.  
Not exceeding 40 years,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

**II.**

Loans in respect of schemes receiving subsidy under the Housing Acts :—

Loans to Local Authorities, secured on Local Rates, any period,  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

Loans to Public Utility Societies limiting their profits to 6 per cent. per annum, as defined by the Housing Acts, 1919 (subject to Income Tax) :—

Not exceeding 30 years,  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.,  
Not exceeding 50 years,  $5\frac{3}{4}$  per cent.,

provided always that for the present, and as a purely temporary measure until a permanent rate can be fixed—which will be done shortly—there shall be included in the mortgage in respect of any such loans (whether to Local Authorities or Public Utility Societies) a condition that the above rates are provisional only, and may be revised when permanent rates can be fixed, such revised rate to run from the commencement of the loan.

\* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

## SCOTLAND, EAST COAST.

FIRTH OF FORTH—PROHIBITED AREA WITH REGARD TO ANCHORING AND TRAWLING.

*Position.*—Hawkcraig point, lat. 56° 03' N., long. 3° 17' W.*Details.*—The anchoring of boats for the use of fishing nets and trawls is prohibited within the following area :

Limits :

- (a) *On the West.*—By a line drawn from the pier on the northern side of Hawkcraig point in a 207° (S. 44° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 6 cables.
- (b) *On the South.*—By a line drawn from the southern extremity of limit (a) in a 93° (S. 70° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 6 cables.
- (c) *On the East.*—By a line drawn from the eastern extremity of limit (b) in a 10° (N. 27° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 6 cables.

*Remarks.*—The above area is to be surrounded on the chart by pecked lines and a note, "Prohibited Area for Anchoring and Fishing," inserted within it.*Variation.*—17° W.

## ENGLAND, SOUTH-EAST COAST.

DOVER STRAIT—TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

*Former Notice.*—No. 1275 of 1919; hereby cancelled.

1. Shipping is to proceed in accordance with the instructions laid down in the Mine Warnings to Mariners.

2. Vessels proceeding through the Straits of Dover are no longer boarded for the purpose of issuing to them route instructions unless they require it.

Vessels proceeding into the North sea which wish to obtain the latest Mine Warnings to Mariners or other information regarding routes in order to check, correct, or amplify the instructions already in their possession, must pass through the Downs, and should :

- (a) By day, fly Y flag International Code.

(b) By night, make the flashing signal "Y" by Morse code, until attended to, to indicate that they wish to be boarded for this purpose. They should approach the boarding vessel, which will exhibit :

(a) By day, 3 black balls horizontally.

(b) By night, 3 red lights horizontally.

3. On and after 1st October 1919 the Boarding Service in the Downs will be discontinued, and the arrangements notified in paragraph 2 above will then cease.

Vessels requiring the latest Mine Warnings to Mariners must then obtain them through the same sources by which they obtain Admiralty Notices to Mariners under normal peace arrangements.

4. British Merchant vessels approaching the Straits of Dover are to hoist their number in the International Code.

*Note.*—This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

## ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

CAUTION WHEN APPROACHING  
BRITISH PORTS.

## PART I.

## CLOSING OF PORTS.

*Former Notice.*—No. 1 of 1919; hereby cancelled.

(1) My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having taken into consideration the fact that it may be necessary to forbid all entrance to certain ports of the Empire, this is to give Notice that on approaching the shores of the United Kingdom, or any of the ports or localities of the British Empire, referred to in Part III. of this Notice, a sharp look-out should be kept for the signals described in the following paragraph, and for the vessels mentioned in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice, and the distinguishing and other signals made by them. In the event of such signals being displayed, the port or locality should be approached with great caution, as it may be apprehended that obstructions may exist.

(2) If entrance to a port is prohibited, three red vertical lights by night, or three red vertical balls by day, will be exhibited in some conspicuous position, in or near to its approach, which signals will also be shown by the vessels indicated in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice.

If these signals are displayed, vessels must approach the port with the greatest caution and implicitly obey all orders or signals given them by the Examination vessel or signal station.

(3) At all the ports or localities at home or

abroad referred to in Part III. of this Notice, search-lights are occasionally exhibited for exercise.

Instructions have been given to avoid directing moveable search-lights during practice on to vessels under way, but mariners are warned that great care should be taken to keep a sharp look-out for the signals indicated in paragraph (2) above, when search-lights are observed to be working.

PART II.

EXAMINATION SERVICE.

(4) In certain circumstances it is also necessary to take special measures to examine vessels desiring to enter the ports or localities at home or abroad, referred to in Part III. of this Notice.

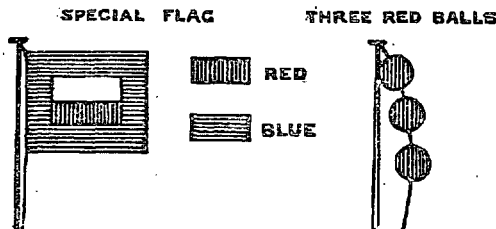
(5) In such case, vessels carrying the distinguishing flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7) will be charged with the duty of examining ships which desire to enter the ports and of allotting positions in which they shall anchor. If Government vessels, or vessels belonging to the local port authority, are found patrolling in the offing, merchant vessels are advised to communicate with such vessels with a view to obtaining information as to the course on which they should approach the port. Such communication will not be necessary in cases where the pilot on board has already received this information from the local authorities.

(6) As the institution of the Examination Service at any port will never be publicly advertised, especial care should be taken in approaching the ports, by day or night, to keep a sharp look-out for any vessel carrying the flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7), and to be ready to "bring to" at once when hailed by her or warned by the firing of a gun or sound rocket.

In entering by night any of the ports mentioned in Part III., serious delay and risk will be avoided if four efficient all round lamps, two red and two white, are kept available for use.

(7) By day the distinguishing flags of the Examination Steamer will be a special flag (white and red horizontal surrounded by a blue border) and a blue ensign.

Also, three red vertical balls if the port is closed.



By night the steamer will carry:—

- (a) Three red vertical lights if the port is closed.
- (b) Three white vertical lights if the port is open.

The above lights will be carried in addition to the ordinary navigation lights, and will show an unbroken light around the horizon.

(8) Masters are warned that, when approaching a British port where the Examination Service is in force, they must have the distinguishing signal of their vessel ready to hoist immediately the Examination Steamer makes the signal.

(9) Masters are warned that, before attempting to enter any of these ports when the Examination Service is in force, they must in their own interests strictly obey all instructions given to them by the Examination Steamer.

Whilst at anchor in the Examination Anchorage, Masters are warned that they must not lower any boats, communicate with the shore, work cables, move the ship, or allow anyone to leave the ship, without permission from the Examination Steamer (except to avoid accident).

(10) In case of fog, Masters are enjoined to use the utmost care, and the Port should be approached with caution.

(11) The order prohibiting merchant vessels from making use of private signals when approaching ports is no longer in force.

(12) The pilots attached to the ports will be acquainted with the regulations to be followed.

PART IV.

SWEEPING OPERATIONS.

Notice is hereby given that under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force.

H.M. Vessels are constantly engaged, both singly and in pairs, in sweeping operations off the coasts of the United Kingdom, and whilst so engaged they are hampered to a very considerable extent in their manœuvring powers.

With a view to indicating the nature of the work on which they are engaged, these vessels will show the signals hereinafter mentioned, and for the public safety all other vessels, whether steamers or sailing craft, must keep out of the way of vessels flying these signals and not approach them inside the distances mentioned herein, specially remembering that it is dangerous to pass inside these distances or between the vessels of a pair, as the vessels may have mines trailing in their sweeps and also on account of the danger caused to traffic if mine-sweepers have to slip their sweeps to get out of the way of vessels.

#### 1. SIGNALS THAT WILL BE SHOWN BY DAY.

##### (a) By vessels working singly:

A black ball at the foremast head, and a similar ball at each yardarm or where they can best be seen.

Vessels showing this signal are not to be approached nearer than 300 yards.

##### (b) By vessels working in pairs:

A black ball at the foremast head, and a similar ball at the yard-arm or where it can best be seen, on that side on which it is dangerous to pass.

Vessels are not to pass within a distance of 400 yards astern of a single pair of sweepers, or when more than one pair are working in company within a distance of 400 yards astern of rear pair. They are on no account to attempt to pass between pairs working in company.

#### 2. SIGNALS THAT WILL BE SHOWN BY NIGHT.

As for day, except that all round green lights will be used in place of the black balls.

#### CAUTION.

Part IV. of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in Part IV. of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

#### NAMES OF VESSELS TO BE DISPLAYED ON ENTERING CERTAIN PORTS.

*Former Notices.*—No. 309 of 1918; hereby cancelled. No. 526 of 1918.

Every merchant vessel entering a French port, or on Government service proceeding to Archangel and the Black Sea, shall display her name painted in white letters on a black board on the side on which she is approaching the Examination steamer and at such other times, and in such manner as may be directed by the Port Authorities.

The name shall be painted in block letters of such size as to enable the name to be read by the naked eye at a distance of twice the vessel's own length in ordinary clear weather (visibility = 0 in the scale), whether by day or under search-light beam at night.

Vessels of under 500 tons gross shall display one such board placed over the side in the vicinity of the vessel's bridge.

Vessels of 500 tons gross and over shall display two such boards, one in the vicinity of the vessel's bridge, and in the other in the next most conspicuous position over the side.

The above order does not relieve a vessel of the necessity of complying with the Board of Trade requirements as to the proper equipment of signal flags.

The order relating to vessels entering ports in the United Kingdom, published in the former Notice No. 309 of 1918, is no longer in force.
