By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated then 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited :

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th

day of March 1919, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect :—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, as amended, and added to by subsequent Orders of Council and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day of March 1919, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same :—

(1) That the following headings should be deleted :—

- (A) Fish, except the following :—Tinned, preserved or frozen fish, chinchards, sprats, herrings, cray fish and prawns ;
- (A) Malt dust, malt flour, culms, sprouts or combings ;
- (A) Oleaginous kernels, nuts, seeds, and products of all kinds.

(2) That the following headings should be added :—

- (A) Fish, except the following :—Tinned, preserved or frozen fish, chinchards, sprats, herrings, cray fish, prawns, and lobsters ;
- (A) Malt dust, culms, sprouts or combings ;
- (A) Oleaginous kernels, nuts, seeds, and products of all kind except castor seed ;
- (A) Armoured motor cars ;
- (A) Implements and apparatus designed exclusively for the manufacture of munitions

of war or for the manufacture or repair of arms of war material for use on land or sea ;

(A) Apparatus which can be used for the storage or projection of compressed or liquified gases, flame, acids, or other destructive agents capable of use in warlike operations, and their component parts.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

That the Order of Council dated the 21st March, 1919, as amended by the Orders of Council of the 11th April 1919, the 15th April 1919, and the 9th May 1919, be cancelled, that is to say that lists " D " and " E " be abolished forthwith.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

(Power to the Provost, Magistrates and Councillors of the Burgh of Dumbarton to construct and equip new Gas Works for the manufacture, storage, and supply of gas, and for the manufacture, etc., of residual products; to supply gas from such new works to the Burgh of Dumbarton and districts and places adjacent; to acquire lands by compulsion or agreement for gas works; provision of dwelling houses for workmen; offices, show rooms, etc.; rates, rents and charges; alteration of rates, rents, and charges; power to sell existing Gas Works and Lands acquired for gas works purposes; agreements; confirmation of agreements made or to be made; stopping up of road; power to maintain and carry on and extend or discontinue the existing gas works of the Town Council; supply of gas in bulk; consumption of gas by meter; licenses and patent rights; manufacture, etc., of gas fittings, etc.;

pressure price illuminating power testing and quality of gas; calorific standard; repeal or amendment of obligations as to illuminating power etc.; rebates; refusal to supply; minimum charge; power to lay pipes etc. in private streets; power to refuse to supply gas in certain cases; antifluators; entry of premises and removal of fittings; prepayment meters; application of money; borrowing powers; rates and assessments; application of funds; costs of order; by-laws; incorporation amendment and repeal of Acts; and other purposes).

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Secretary for Scotland on or before the 17th day of December 1919 by Petition under the provisions of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899 for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called "the Order") promoted by the Provost Magistrates and Councillors of the Burgh of Dumbarton (hereinafter called "the Town Council") for the following or some one or more of the following objects, powers, and purposes, that is to say:—

The area of land situate in the Burgh of Dumbarton, Parish of Old Kilpatrick, and County of Dumbarton, and extending to eight and one-half acres or thereabouts, and bounded on the south-east by property belonging or reputed to belong to Babcock and Wilcox Limited on the south-west by the line of railway (worked by the Caledonian Railway Company) of the Lanarkshire and Dumbartonshire Railway Company running from Glasgow to Dumbarton on the north-west by lands belonging or reputed to belong to the Trustees of Marchesa Chigi Zondadari Geils and on the north-east by other lands belonging or reputed to belong to the said Trustees.

To authorise the Town Council on the lands hereinbefore described or on any part thereof or on any land which they may acquire by agreement to erect provide and maintain dwellings for officers workmen and others employed in the service of the Town Council or to appropriate any lands for the time being vested in them for those purposes or to feu or lease any lands or houses for those purposes or other purposes.

To enable the Town Council to purchase or lease houses and other buildings for persons in their employ and offices show-rooms and other buildings for the purposes of their gas undertaking and to erect maintain and let any such buildings on any lands of the Town Council.

To authorise the Town Council on the one hand and the Caledonian Railway Company and the Lanarkshire and Dumbartonshire Railway Company or any company or person or persons on the other hand from time to time to enter into and carry out agreements for the construction use and maintenance and the working of lines of railways junctions and sidings with the railway lines and sidings of the said railway companies or either of them or of other persons and with the railway lines and sidings for that purpose of the proposed new gas works and other works before described and for all other accommodation and conveniences connected with the carriage of coal lime and other materials products and things to and from the said intended works and to confirm any agreement already made or to be made in connection with any of the said matters or otherwise.

To provide that the said new and additional gas works and other works before described and the lands houses and other properties connected therewith shall for all purposes whatsoever be deemed part of the gas undertaking of the Town Council.

To empower the Town Council to purchase by agreement or to take on lease for the general purposes connected with the supply of gas or the residual products or the storage of gas and for any of the purposes of their gas undertaking such other lands as may be required or to appropriate any lands for the time being vested in or belonging to them for those purposes and to sell and lease or otherwise dispose of any lands for the time being acquired by or belonging to the Town Council and not required for the purposes of their gas undertaking.

To authorise and empower the Town Council at any time and from time to time to sell and dispose of either by public sale or private bargain all or any part of the existing gas works and property of the Town Council so far as these may not be required for the purposes of the gas undertaking and to effect, conclude, and complete the sale of the said works and the said lands aforesaid in such way and manner and for such price or prices and consideration as the Town Council in their discretion may think reasonable and to apply the price or prices

received on the sale of such works lands and property for the purposes of the gas undertaking under the powers of the Order as the Order may define specify and prescribe.

To authorise and empower the Town Council to enter into and carry out agreements with any person for the sale and disposal of the existing gas works and lands of the Town Council or any part thereof on any terms and subject to any conditions which the Town Council think fit, and to confirm any such agreements already made or which may be made for such purposes.

To authorise the Town Council to stop up and discontinue the use by the public of the following lane or road situate within the burgh parish and county of Dumbarton, that is to say, the lane or road known as Churchyard Lane leading from High Street, Dumbarton, to the River Leven, and to extinguish all servitudes and all rights-of-way and all other rights in and over the same and to appropriate and use the solum thereof.

To empower the Town Council from the existing gas works and from the new gas works to be authorised by the Order or from either of them to supply gas for lighting domestic trading heating public and other purposes within the existing limits or any extension thereof for the supply of gas by the Town Council.

To authorise the Town Council to maintain alter or renew or discontinue or remove the existing works plant apparatus machinery mains, and pipes of the Town Council or any part or parts of the same and within the limits of supply to make and lay down such new and additional and enlarged mains and any extension of mains and pipes and works as in the opinion of the Town Council may be necessary for the purpose of distributing and supplying gas and to open and break up or interfere with railways tramways streets (public and private) roads bridges highways sewers drains pipes electric telegraphic and telephonic apparatus rivers canals bridges passages or other places within the limits of supply or within any part of the same.

To authorise the Town Council to supply gas in bulk to any local authority company body or person and to authorise the Town Council to take a supply of gas in bulk from any local authority company body or person.

To make provision for exempting the Town Council in certain cases from penalties and from the obligation to supply gas.

To make provision for the payment of standing charges for gas supplied to any person having a separate supply of gas or a supply of electricity, and the terms and conditions on which such supply is to be given by the Town Council.

To require the consumers of gas supplied by the Town Council to consume the gas supplied to them by meter.

To authorise the Town Council to require the use of antifluators for gas engines and to remove test and inspect the same.

To empower the Town Council to enter premises and remove fittings and fixtures.

To enable the Town Council to take hold and use licenses and authorities under Letters patent.

To extend and apply to the Order and the

objects and purposes thereof the Dumbarton Corporation Guarantee Rate authorised by the Dumbarton Corporation Gas Works Pier etc. Act 1873.

To empower the Town Council to manufacture supply let for hire and deal in gas fittings pipes meters engines motors and heating and cooking apparatus and to provide for the protection from distress of those let on hire and the inspection and approval of fittings.

To amend all or any existing statutory provisions with regard to the supply pressure maximum price and illuminating power of gas and the method and place of testing.

To make further provision with respect to the testing and quality of gas supplied by the Town Council and to repeal or amend the existing provisions with respect to testing for illuminating power and with respect to the burner and instruments to be used for such testing and to relieve the Town Council from all obligations and penalties with respect to the maintenance of a standard of illuminating power for the gas supplied by them, and to prescribe a standard of calorific power for such gas in lieu thereof.

To authorise rebates on and the recovery of gas rents and charges and the cutting off of and refusal to supply gas in certain cases.

IN accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act for that branch of the Paper Box Trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material, having given due notice on 7th August 1919 of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the rates as set out in the Notice varying minimum rates dated 16th December 1918, have given Notice that they have Varied the General Minimum Time Rates so previously Varied by them on 16th December 1918, for Female Workers from 5½d to 8d per hour and for Male Workers from 9d to 1s 1½d. per hour, with corresponding Variations in the General Minimum Time Rates fixed for younger Female and Male Workers.

The Trade Board have given similar Notice that they have Fixed Piece Work Basis Time Rates for Female Workers of 8½d per hour and for Male Workers of 1s. 3¼d. per hour.

The Trade Board have further given Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 12th November 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the above minimum rates of wages as varied and fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 17th November 1919 as the date from which such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

LAUNDRY TRADE BOARD.

(GREAT BRITAIN).

IN accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Laundry Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, having given due notice on the 16th July 1919 of Proposal to Fix General Minimum Time-Rates, Overtime Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers, have given notice that they have fixed General Minimum Time Rates, Overtime Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers, the Minimum Rates as fixed being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS OTHER THAN THOSE SPECIFIED IN PART II. OF THIS SCHEDULE.

Section I.—General Minimum Time-Rates.

	General Minimum Time-Rate per week.
(a) Workers under 15 years of age	12s.
" of 15 and under 16 years of age	15s.
" " 16 " 17 " 	19s.
" " 17 " 18 " 	23s.
" " 18 years of age and over	28s.

(b) The minimum rates applicable in the case of workers of 16 and under 18 years of age entering the Laundry trade for the first time shall be for the first six months of employment 3s. per week less than the minimum rates applicable under the above scale.

(c) The minimum rates applicable in the case of workers of 18 years of age and over entering the Laundry trade for the first time shall be, for the first six months of their employment, 4s. per week less than the minimum rate applicable under the above scale.

Section II.—Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate shall be 8½d. per hour, that is to say, in cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid shall be sufficient to yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 8½d an hour to an ordinary worker.

Section III.—Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers.

The guaranteed time-rates for piece-workers to apply in the case of workers employed on piece-work for the purpose of securing to such workers a minimum rate of remuneration on a time-work basis shall be as follows, that is to say:—

	Guaranteed Time-rate per week.
Workers under 15 years of age	12s.
" of 15 and under 16 years of age	15s.
" " 16 " 17 " 	17s.
" " 17 " 18 " 	21s.
" " 18 years of age and over	24s.

A piece-worker shall be entitled to be paid not less than the minimum rate applicable to a worker of her age as set out above in any case where her earnings on piece-work are less than such sum, subject to the deductions allowed under the provisions of Section IV. of Part I. of this Schedule.

Section IV.

The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-workers are for a week not exceeding 48 hours, and save as provided in Part III. hereof, no deductions shall be made from such rates where the number of hours worked in any week is less than 48, except:—

(a) Where the worker is absent without the permission of the employer or at her own request or in order to comply with an obligation imposed by Law, or through being incapacitated from work by illness or other cause, or during any customary local holidays.

(b) Where, at her own desire, it is agreed that any worker shall be regularly employed for a less period than the full working week of the Laundry.

(c) Where, in pursuance of an agreement made in writing between an employer and the workers affected (and registered with the Trade Board) it is provided that by reason of seasonal trade or for any cause not within the control of the employer short time is regularly to be worked for any period commencing not less than seven days after the date of such agreement.

(d) Where in any week a worker is required to stand off for not less than a quarter of the normal working week of the Laundry by reason of a stoppage of work caused by a breakdown in machinery, a stoppage in supplies of water, gas, electric current or fuel, a general breakdown in transport services or other similar emergency over which the employer has no control. Provided that this clause should not operate until the expiration of at least seven days from the date on which notice so to stand off is given to the worker by the employer.

In such cases a proportionate deduction may be made according as the number of hours worked is less than the full working week of the Laundry when not on short time.

Provided that for the purpose of calculating the proportionate deduction under the provisions of the foregoing Clause, no deduction shall be made in respect of absence from work on any day allowed as a holiday under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, except where in any week in which such holiday occurs the worker, without reasonable and sufficient cause, absents herself for more than two hours during the period in which she had the opportunity of working.

Section V.—Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.

The Overtime Rates for Time-Workers shall be as follows:—

(b) The normal number of hours of work per week is hereby declared to be 48, and the above Overtime Rates shall be payable in respect of all time worked in any week in excess of 48.

(c) The normal number of hours of work on Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor under Section 43, of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901) is hereby declared to be five, and the above Overtime Rates shall be payable in respect of time worked on such day in excess of five hours (so far as is allowed under the Factory and Workshop Acts) notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to piece-workers.

PART II.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS SPECIALLY EMPLOYED FOR EMERGENCY WORK OR WHOSE EMPLOYMENT IS OF A CASUAL NATURE.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore con-

tained, the following shall be the time-rates for workers who are specially employed for emergency work or whose employment is of a casual nature.

Section I.—General Minimum Time-Rates.

For Female Workers under 18 years	7d per hr.
" " " of 18 years of age	" " "
" " " and over	7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d

Section II.—Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.

The piece-work basis time-rate shall be 9d per hour, that is to say, in cases where a worker is employed on piece-work each piece-rate paid shall be sufficient to yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9d an hour to an ordinary worker.

Section III.—Overtime Rates.

(a) Subject to the provisions of Sub-section (c) of this Section, the Overtime Rates for time-workers comprised within Part II. of this Schedule shall be as follows:—

Workers under 18 years of age	8 $\frac{1}{2}$ d per hr.
" " " of 18 years of age and over	9 $\frac{1}{2}$ d

(b) Subject to the provisions of Sub-section (c) of this Section, the normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be the same as for workers comprised within Part I. of this Schedule, and the Overtime Rates set out in Sub-section (a) of this Section shall be payable in respect of time worked in excess of such normal number of hours.

(c) Where an Exemption Order under Section 150 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, is in operation providing for the working of longer hours than those otherwise allowed, the normal number of hours of work on Saturday and on Sunday shall be deemed to be nine, and all time worked in excess of such normal number of hours shall be paid for at the rate of time-and-a-half. Provided that in cases where a worker has worked 48 hours in the week prior to mid-day on Saturday, all time worked after mid-day on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time-and-a-half, and all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to piece-workers.

The Trade Board have further given notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 12th November 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the above minimum rates of wages as fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 24th November 1919 as the date from which such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

BOOT AND SHOE REPAIRING TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE WORKERS EFFECTIVE AS FROM 17TH NOVEMBER 1919.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in Great Britain, for the Branches of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 11th August 1919, of Proposal to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have fixed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for male workers, and have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and that the Minimum Rates as fixed are shown in the Schedule set out below, which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 12th November 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the rates as fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 17th November 1919* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

*NOTE.—Should this date, however, not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer at intervals not exceeding Seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 23rd November 1919.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.—GENERAL MINIMUM TIME RATES.

1. For workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 65s Od. per week of 48 hours.
2. For workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 45s. Od. per week of 48 hours.
3. For workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 37s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
4. For workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age, 32s. Od. per week of 48 hours.
5. For workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 27s. Od. per week of 48 hours.
6. For workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 22s. Od. per week of 48 hours.

The above rates are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

PART II.—OVERTIME RATES (ALL AGES).

The minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker whether engaged on Time-work or on Piece-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours (set out below) shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) For the first two hours Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time and a quarter*, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time and a half*, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *double time*, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board declare the normal number of hours of work to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

On Saturday, 4.

On Monday, 8.

On any other week-day, 9;

Provided that any other day not being Sunday, may be by agreement in writing between an employer and a worker substituted in place of Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours on such substituted day shall be 4, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 9.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

The above-mentioned provisions shall not prejudice a worker's claim to a Saturday half-holiday where it is now given.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates set out in sub-paragraphs (1) and (2) above shall be payable in respect of

- (a) all employment on a Saturday;
- (b) all employment in excess of 10 hours on a Friday or on one other day in each week (not being Saturday) as may be agreed between the employer and the worker;
- (c) all employment on any other week-day in excess of 9½ hours.

But in the application of this Proviso, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day shall be paid for at time and a quarter, for the first two hours and time and a half thereafter.

PART III.

The above minimum rates of wages shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, that is to say, the repairing wherever carried on, of boots, shoes, slippers, and all kinds of leather footwear, *including* the making of bespoke handsewn, riveted or pegged leather footwear, but *excluding* the manufacture of leather footwear on a large scale, the repairing

of saddlery and leather goods other than leather footwear and the retailing of leather footwear.

Provided that the above minimum rates shall not apply to Indentured Apprentices who were indentured prior to the 21st October 1919.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid, clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers earning a higher rates of wages.
