WHEREAS by the Colonial Boundaries Act, 1895, it is provided that, where the Boundaries of a Colony have, either before or after the passing of that Act, been altered by Order in Council or by Letters Patent, the Boundaries as so altered shall be, and be deemed to have been, from the date of the alteration, the Boundaries of the Colony :

And whereas it is expedient that the Boundaries of the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony should be altered so as to include the Island in the Pacific Ocean known as Christmas Island :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Colonial Boundaries Act, 1895, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

From and after the proclamation of this Order by publication in the Western Pacific High Commission Gazette the Boundaries of the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony shall be extended so as to include Christmas Island.

TAILORING TRADE BOARD
(GREAT BRITAIN).

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918,

the Trade Board Established under that Act for certain branches of the Tailoring Trade in Great Britain which are engaged in making garments to be worn by male persons as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 10th January 1914, having given due notice on 1st August 1919 of Proposals to Vary as therein shown the rates as set out in the Notice varying minimum rates for male workers dated 12th November 1917, and the Notice varying minimum rates for female workers dated 25th March 1918, and to Fix Piece Work Basis Time Rates, have given notice that they have varied the General Minimum Time Rates and Fixed Piece Work Basis Time Rates as follows—

LEARNERS.

The Trade Board have also varied the General Minimum Time Rates for male and female learners and have fixed Piece Work Basis Time Rates for male and female learners (other than female learners engaged in Fitting-up and Hooking-up).

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the following awards to the undermentioned Officers, in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the field :—

Awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

Maj. Henry Whitten Hickie, 84th Punjabis I.A. (BLACK SEA)

By his skilful handling of a tactical situation at Shusha on the 4th June 1919 he enabled one company of the 84th Punjabis to be interposed, with very slight loss, between considerable forces of Tartars and Armenians engaged in a faction fight. To carry this out he walked under heavy rifle fire from the Armenian trenches to the Tartar positions, showing great coolness and resource.

Capt. Norman Henry Prendergast, Queen Victoria's Own Corps of Guides, attd. North Waziristan Militia, I.A. (INDIA)

He has led detachments of his corps gallantly on all operations, especially on 27th May 1919, at Miranshah, and has always shown high soldierly qualities. The fact that practically the whole of his corps has remained loyal is chiefly due to his personal influence and power of command.

Awarded a Bar to the Military Cross.

Capt. Norman Burgan, M.C., 2/11th Gurkha Rifles, I.A. (INDIA)

He commanded the leading company of his battalion in the attack on Khargali Ridge on 11th May 1919 with great courage and determined leadership. By his dash and rapidity of movement in seizing the centre of the position he enabled other portions of

the battalion to reach the hostile gun emplacements, resulting in the capture of four guns with ammunition and horses.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Geoffrey Pigot, M.C. 1/19th Punjabis, I.A. (BLACK SEA)

For gallantry in action on Bahram Ali front on 16th January 1919. By his prompt action and able disposition of the advanced British troops, of which he was in command, he enabled an attack by the enemy in overwhelming numbers to be held off till reinforcements arrived. His coolness and decision throughout the action inspired confidence in all ranks.

(M.C. gazetted 12th September 1919.)

Awarded the Military Cross.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Robert Christian Anderson, 1st Bn., 76th Punjabis, I.A. (INDIA)

He commanded Jandoa Post in a state of siege from 28th May to 9th June 1919. His fine example inspired confidence in his men, many of whom were young Mussulman soldiers, and held his post in good order till relieved.

T./Lt. (A./Capt.) Ernest Frank Bugler, 35th Sikhs, I.A. (INDIA)

For conspicuous gallantry on 17th May 1919, at Dakka. Several times during the fight he collected and got forward parties of our men who had become leaderless. He directed fire on to parties of the enemy who were holding up our advance. He assisted in the removal of wounded, continually exposing himself whilst doing so to a very heavy fire. All through the attack he set a very fine example to the men.

Lt. Frederick William Farmer Card, 1st D. Gds. (INDIA)

For marked gallantry on 16th May 1919, at Dakka. He handled his troops with marked gallantry and ability throughout the retirement. When the charge was ordered the situation was so pressing that there was no time for a proper deployment. He gave the order for the nearest men to gallop, and, without waiting for them to get into formation, rode out far ahead of them straight towards the enemy, whom he attacked with the greatest gallantry.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Stewart Dudley, 27th Light Cavalry, I.A. (INDIA)

By the bold leading of his squadron he delivered a decisive defeat to the enemy on 31st May 1919, at Murtaza. He personally disposed of six of the enemy himself. The moral effect of this charge was great, and some 150 of the enemy were killed or wounded. He did fine work.

Lt. Reginald Leonard Haine, V.C., H.A.C., attd. 35th Sikhs, I.A. (INDIA)

For conspicuous gallantry on 17th May 1919, at Dakka. On many occasions during the fight near the summit of the hill he did everything in his power to collect the men for

an attack on the enemy entrenches on the top in face of very heavy fire. When it was decided to retire and take up a position further down the hill he collected all the men he could gather, and, before descending, assisted in getting all the wounded away.

Capt. Wrack Hatton, 2nd Bn., N. Staff. R.

(INDIA)

He commanded the leading company of the N. Staffs. Regt. in their attack on 11th May 1919, at Khargali. His coolness and courage throughout the advance went far in enabling his company to arrive within a few yards of the enemy's trenches before our artillery lifted. His example of courage and devotion to duty at the most critical period of the day was undoubtedly of the very greatest value.

T./Lt. Edward Victor Horseman, Worc. R.,
attd. 2nd Bn., N. Staff. R.

(INDIA)

For marked gallantry and able leadership on 11th May 1919, at Khargali. He commanded the first platoon of the leading company in its attack on the first objective. He led the way into the enemy's trenches, shooting down three of the enemy personally. Though wounded, he continued to command his platoon. He was also in command of the platoons which were attacked near Jamrud on the 9th May 1919, when they beat off the enemy.

Capt. John Sydney Lethbridge, R.E., attd.
57th Coy., Sappers and Miners, I.A.

(INDIA)

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Thal, 27th May to 2nd June 1919. During the siege he was untiring in helping all units to improve their defences. He improvised a fresh hospital, and showed great energy throughout, working for the most part under shell and sniping fire.

Lt. Thomas Ivor Stevenson, K.R.R.C., Spec.
Res., attd. 2/8th Gurkha Rif., I.A.

(INDIA)

For good leadership and conspicuous gallantry during the withdrawal to camp from Orange Patch Ridge on 15th May 1919. The enemy pressed the retirement heavily, and, being without signallers, he went from one position to another under continual fire and personally arranged the retirement of each party of his force. The retirement was carried out most successfully.

Lt. Wilfred Charles Tungate, I.A.R.O., attd.
1/9th Gurkha Rif., I.A.

(INDIA)

On the 17th May 1919, on the attack on the Ridge he led a party with the greatest gallantry to within twenty yards of the summit, and maintained himself there unsupported in the face of greatly superior forces for many hours. When eventually reinforced, he and his party were the first on the summit.

Lt. John Leslie Waggett, 1st D. Gds.

(INDIA)

For conspicuous gallantry on 16th May 1919, at Dakka. He was in command of

two troops which were sent to guard the left flank. The enemy made determined efforts to work round this flank, and was only prevented by the skill with which he handled his command. The successful withdrawal of the centre and right were in a large measure due to his courage and initiative. He subsequently played a prominent part in the charge.

SOUTH AFRICAN FORCE.

T./2nd Lt. Ernest Carter, M.M., 1st Bn.,
S. Afr. Infy. (France).

His behaviour was most outstanding during the action west of Bouchavasnes on 24th March 1918, and inspired his men. His courage and leadership contributed materially to the stubbornness of the defence, and the defeat of numerous hostile attacks. He was eventually wounded while taking men across the open under close range machine-gun fire, to put out a defensive flank.

T./2nd Lt. Gordon Cuthbert Curtis, 1st
Bn., S. Afr. Infy. (France).

During the fighting east of Hendicourt on 22nd March 1918, he displayed great courage and resource. He was in command of a very extended length of trench, and by his able and determined leadership beat back numerous enemy attacks. By altering his dispositions as occasion demanded he stopped several attempts of the enemy to envelop his right flank.

Temp. Lt. William Frederick Faulds, V.C.,
1st Bn., S. Afr. Infy. (France).

In the retirement from the line east of Hendicourt, 22nd March 1918, he was commanding one of the platoons which formed the rear guard. He handled his men most ably, and exposed himself freely. Though the enemy pressed hard, he, by his fearless and able leadership, checked them, and enabled the remainder of the battalion to withdraw with slight losses. He was wounded on the 24th.

T./2nd Lt. Thomas Garstang, 2nd Bn., S.
Afr. Infy. (France).

During the operations 21-24th March 1918, he set a splendid example to his men, exposing himself continually to the hottest fire. Numerous encircling movements by the enemy were frustrated by his alertness and good leadership. His behaviour throughout was of a very high order.

His Majesty the KING has directed that the award of the Military Cross to Lieutenant Cuthbert Arthur Quin, 1st Battalion, The Royal Fusiliers, which was gazetted on the 16th August 1917, shall be cancelled and his name erased from the Register in consequence of his having been dismissed the service by sentence of a General Court Martial.

His Majesty the KING has directed that the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medal to Lieutenant Cuthbert Arthur Quin, 1st

Battalion, The Royal Fusiliers, when serving as No. 13635 Serjeant, 1st Battalion, The Royal Fusiliers, as published in the London Gazette on 14th January 1916, shall be cancelled and his name erased from the Register in consequence of his having been dismissed the service by sentence of a General Court Martial.

His Majesty the KING has directed that the award of the Military Cross to Temporary Lieutenant Alan Dunbar Leslie, Service Battalions, The King's Own (Royal Lancaster Regiment) which was gazetted on the 2nd December 1918, shall be cancelled and his name erased from the Register in consequence of his having been dismissed the Service by sentence of a General Court Martial.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.

THE COAL (PIT'S MOUTH) PRICES ORDER AND DIRECTION, 1919, DATED 28TH DAY OF NOVEMBER 1919, MADE AND GIVEN BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F, 2G, 2J, 2JJ, AND 9G OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade deeming it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects coal and deeming it expedient to make further provision with regard to the use and management of collieries, hereby order and direct as follows:—

(1) The owner of every colliery shall supply coal of such description and in such quantity and to such persons as the Controller in his discretion may direct.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order, 1919, where a person certifies as hereinafter provided that any coal delivered to him on cash terms from a colliery is required by him for re-sale or use for domestic or household purposes exclusively, the price at which such coal may be sold for cash at the pit's mouth shall be ten shillings per ton less than the standard price fixed by the said Order and no person shall sell or offer for sale or buy or offer to buy coal for cash at the pit's mouth for such purposes at any other price.

(3) No person shall sell coal for cash at the pit's mouth at the price fixed by this Order for domestic or household purposes unless the buyer certifies in writing in the form contained in the Schedule hereto that the coal so being bought by him is required by him for re-sale or use in either case for domestic or household purposes exclusively.

(4) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order, 1919, where coal is delivered to a factor, merchant, or dealer otherwise than on cash terms the purchaser may upon the expiration of the term of credit give to the colliery owner from whom he purchased the coal a certificate in the form contained in the Schedule hereto that the whole or some part (to be specified in the certificate) of such coal has

been or will be re-sold or used by him for domestic or household purposes exclusively, and he shall then be entitled to deduct from the standard price a sum of ten shillings per ton in respect of so much of the said coal as is included in the said certificate. Every colliery owner to whom such certificate is given shall allow such deduction accordingly.

(5) Where coal is delivered to a gas or electricity undertaking the owners or secretary or manager may when paying therefor give a certificate either to the colliery owner or to the factor, dealer or merchant from whom they bought that a proportion of the said coal has been or will be used by them for making gas or electricity for domestic or household purposes and shall in that case be entitled to deduct ten shillings per ton from the price in respect of such proportion. The proportion in respect of which such certificate may be given shall not exceed the proportion which the gas or electricity supplied by them for such purposes bears to their total output. Provided that the Controller may vary or prescribe the amount of coal in respect of which such deduction may be made as he in his absolute discretion thinks fit.

(6) No person shall give a false certificate for the purpose of obtaining coal under the provisions of this Order.

(7) Every colliery owner and every factor, dealer or merchant, and the owners of every gas or electricity undertaking shall, if and when required by the Controller so to do, disclose to him any book kept by them, containing entries in regard to coal bought or sold by them and shall supply copies of any entries that the Controller may require verified in such manner as he may direct.

(8) All contracts for the sale of coal at the pit's mouth in force at the date when this Order comes into effect are hereby modified, so that the price of any coal or of any instalment despatched from a colliery on or after such date shall not exceed the price hereby authorised and the price to be paid by any person to whom the coal is delivered in pursuance of any subsidiary contract shall be reduced by an equivalent amount, and subject as aforesaid, all such contracts and subsidiary contracts shall remain in force.

(9) Nothing in this Order shall affect the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order, 1919, as to any coal bought or sold for any purpose other than domestic or household purposes.

(10) Coal shall be deemed to be bought or sold for domestic or household purposes only when it is bought or sold for the purpose of supplying (either by re-sale or directly) customers under the provisions of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1919, or any modification thereof.

Gas or electricity supplied for domestic or household purposes means gas or electricity supplied to any premises coming within, and for the purposes mentioned in, the said Order.

(11) This Order shall apply to Ireland only in respect of coal supplied from collieries in Great Britain and in deciding and certifying whether any such coal is bought or sold for domestic or household purposes the provisions of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1919, shall be deemed to apply to Ireland.

(12) In this Order "Controller" means the person holding the Office of Controller of Coal Mines for the time being.

(13) If any person infringes any of the provisions of this Order or if any colliery proprietor, agent or manager disregards any of the directions hereby given, he is guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and is liable on summary conviction to be sentenced to imprisonment with or without hard labour or a term not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine.

(14) This Order and Direction shall come into force on the first day of December nineteen hundred and nineteen, and may be cited as the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order and Direction, 1919.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.

THE WHOLESALE COAL PRICES ORDER, 1919, DATED 28TH DAY OF NOVEMBER 1919, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Board of Trade hereby order as follows :—

1. No factor, merchant or dealer shall sell or deliver to another factor, merchant or dealer, coal in respect of which a certificate has been given to a colliery owner that the coal has been re-sold or is required for re-sale or use for domestic or household purposes under the provisions of the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order and Direction, 1919, unless the purchaser gives a certificate in the form in the schedule hereto that he has re-sold the coal for domestic or household purposes exclusively or that he requires the coal for re-sale or use in either case for domestic or household purposes exclusively.

2. No person shall buy coal from a factor, merchant or dealer by railway wagon, barge load, or cargo for re-sale or use in either case for domestic or household purposes without giving a certificate in the said form to the seller that the coal is required exclusively for such purposes.

3. No factor, merchant or dealer shall knowingly sell coal by railway wagon, barge load or cargo for domestic or household purposes without receiving such certificate as aforesaid.

4. No person shall re-sell or use any coal bought by him under any certificate given in pursuance of this Order except for domestic or household purposes.

5. No person shall give a false certificate for the purpose of obtaining coal under the provisions of this Order.

6. Coal shall be deemed to be bought or sold for domestic or household purposes only when it is bought or sold for the purpose of supplying, either by re-sale or directly, consumers under the provisions of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1919, or any modification thereof.

7. This Order shall apply to Ireland only in respect of coal supplied from collieries in Great Britain and in deciding and certifying whether any such coal is bought or sold for domestic or household purposes the provisions of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1919, shall be deemed to apply to Ireland.

8. If any person infringes any of the provisions of this Order he is guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations and is liable on summary conviction to be sentenced to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to both such imprisonment and fine.

9. Nothing in this Order shall affect the provisions of the Wholesale Coal Prices Order, 1917.

10. This Order shall come into force on the first day of December nineteen hundred and nineteen and may be cited as the Wholesale Coal Prices Order, 1919.

DIRECTIONS OF THE BOARD OF TRADE AS TO THE SALE OF COAL FOR BUNKERING CERTAIN SHIPS AT PORTS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM, DATED THE 27TH NOVEMBER 1919.

1. Subject as hereinafter provided—the prices specified in the Schedule hereto shall be charged as fixed prices for all coal supplied for bunkering the following ships or classes of ships on or after 1st December 1919 (including coal supplied under existing contracts), such coal being limited to coal for the ship's own use :—

- (a) Trawlers and other fishing boats ;
- (b) Ships engaged in the coasting trade of the United Kingdom while actually so engaged ;
- (c) Tugs, barges and other miscellaneous craft whilst navigating inland waters or in, near, or about the coasts of the United Kingdom.

2. Where the coal is sold to a broker, merchant or exporter, the broker's, merchant's or exporter's commission on re-sale must be charged by way of addition to the colliery price.

3. Except where otherwise specified in the Schedule, the prices are nett f.o.b. at the nearest shipping places to the collieries and for cash within seven days after shipment. Where it has been the custom for owners of regular liners to receive longer credit, the practice may be continued in respect of bunkers supplied to them for such liners, provided that the above nett payment shall in every case be made not later than the 25th of the month following the delivery of the coal. If the coal is shipped at a more distant place the extra railway and shipping dues may be charged.

Provided that the extra railway and shipping dues as compared with those for shipment at the nearest shipping place to the colliery must in all cases be charged for coal when shipped at ports outside the limits prescribed below for each colliery district, namely :—

Scotland.

Scottish ports south of the Tay.

Northumberland.

Amble and shipping places on the Tyne (south side).

Durham.

Middlesbrough and shipping places on the Tyne (north side).

Cumberland.

Cumberland ports.

Mersey ports and ports in Cheshire and Flintshire.

Ports in Gloucestershire on the south side of the Severn and in Somersetshire.

South Wales and Marmorouth.

Provided also that in the case of anthracite from collieries in South Wales shipped at ports east of Port Talbot, the extra railway and shipping dues, as compared with those for shipment

at the nearest shipping place to the colliery, shall in all cases be charged.

4.—(a) These prices are nett, and no discount, rebate or allowance of any kind, either in money, quantity, credit or otherwise, is to be given to any buyer, and the quantities to be paid for shall be the quantities certified by the colliery, railway or harbour authority as customary.

5. Part V. of the Directions of the Board of Trade as to the Sale of Coal, dated the 28th May 1919, shall not, on and after the first December 1919, apply to the sale of coal for bunkering the ships or classes of ships specified in Article 1 of these Directions.

6. These Directions shall not apply to purchases made by the Admiralty.

7. These Directions and the prices specified in the attached Schedule may be varied as occasion requires.
