(b) 4d. a day, paid continuously to Royal Naval Air Service Gunlayers ('Aerial Gunlayers'), payment to be restricted to the Air-

craft Branch.

(c) The non-substantive allowances for Aerial Gunlayer and Armament Instructor, not to be paid simultaneously, but an Aerial Gunlayer who is also qualified as an Armament Instructor, to receive non-substantive pay at the rate of 8d. a day.

(d) Aerial Gunlayers (whether of the 'Mechanic' or 'Aircraft' Branches) to be eligible for continuous Flying Pay of 2s. a day when employed in an area of operations.

(e) Payment of the foregoing allowances not to be made in respect of any period prior

to the 11th August 1917.

BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY AND FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919, which is covered by the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 12th December 1919, with respect to the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary the minimum rates of wages for male workers at present effective and set out in the Notice dated 27th November 1919, issued by the Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain) established under Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 10th January 1914, in their application to male workers in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part III. of the Schedule hereof, and to Fix minimum rates of wages for male workers in those branches of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part III. of the Schedule hereof, to which the Minimum rates of wages set out in the above-mentioned Notice dated 27th November 1919, do not apply, the proposed minimum rates of wages being as set out in the Schedule hereto.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the Notice of Proposal to Vary being given.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR MALE WORKERS.

SECTION I .- FOR MALE WORKERS.

(a) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and less than one year's subsequent employment in the trade:—

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 5d. per hour.

Proposed Piece-work basis Time-Rate, 1s. 6½d, per hour.

(b) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and not less than one and less than three years' subsequent employment in the trade:—

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 6d. per hour.

Proposed Piece - Work basis Time-Rate, 1s. 7 d. per hour.

(c) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and not less than three years' subsequent employment in the trade:—

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 7d. per hour.

Proposed Piece-Work basis Time-Rate, 1s. 8½d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of male workers who are employed in the following branches of the trade, namely, the making up of (a) Military dress uniforms (excluding khaki), (b) Naval frock and dress uniforms, (c) Hunt coats and hunt riding breeches, (d) Frock and dress coats, and (e) Court and diplomatic garments, and who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership in the trade, the General Minimum Time-Rate and Piece-work basis Time-Rate shall be:—

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 9d. per hour.

Proposed Piece-Work basis Time-Rate, 1s. 102d. per hour.

In cases where a worker is employed on piecework, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in this Section.

SECTION II.—FOR MALE APPRENTICES.

Who are learning to make the various garments throughout under a contract in writing and are registered with the Trade Board in accordance with rules laid down from time to time by the Trade Board.:—

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rate.

For the first year of Apprenticeship in thetrade, 10s. per week of 48 hours.

For the second year of Apprenticeship inthe trade, 12s. per week of 48 hours.

For the third year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 17s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the fourth year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 25s. per week of 48 hours.

For the fifth year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 35s. per week of 48 hours.

The weekly rates for male apprentices as set out in this section are based on a week of 48 hours, and they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by the apprentice in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

In cases where an apprentice is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out in this Section.

PART II.

PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby give notice that they propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

On any day (other	than S	Saturda	ıy)		9
On Saturday					5

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Trade Board gave similar Notice that they propose to fix Minimum Rates for Over-time in respect of hours worked by a Male Worker in excess of such normal number of hours, as follows, that is to say :-

- (a) For Male Workers employed on Time-work. (1) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time-anda-quarter, that is to say, one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate other-
 - (2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to timeand-a-half, that is to say, one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate
 - (3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to double time, that is to say, twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable.
 - (4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be timeand-a-quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this section. The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday, exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that :-

wise applicable.

otherwise applicable.

- (a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 91
- (b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

In the application of these Provisos, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) shall be paid for at time-and-a-quarter for the first two hours and time-and-a-half thereafter.

(b) For Male Workers employed on Piece-work. (i) A Male Worker as specified in Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule employed on piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work

Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule, a sum equivalent to the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, one-half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or one-quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the overtime rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on time-work, were double-time, time-and-a-half, or time-and-aquarter respectively.

(ii) A Male Apprentice as specified in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule employed on piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, onehalf of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or one-quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the overtime rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on time-work, were double-time, time-and-a-half, or time-and-a-quarter respectively.

SECTION III.

Where a worker is of the Jewish Religion, and, subject to the provisions of Section 48 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, is employed on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday." and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

Note.—The hours which young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART III.

The above respective minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to the above-mentioned classes of male workers employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 12th December 1919, that is to say:

Those branches of men's, women's, boys' and girls' bespoke tailoring in which the tailor supplies the garment direct to the individual wearer and employs the worker direct.

A worker shall be deemed to be employed by the tailor direct, if employed by another worker in the employ of the tailor, to whom a minimum rate of wages fixed under the Trade Boards Acts is applicable, or if employed by a sub-contractor engaged in cutting, making or finishing garments exclusively for the tailor in the tailor's shop or in a building of which the Basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in shop forms part or to which the shop is attached;

Including:

- (1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of men's, women's, boys' or girls' tailored garments where carried out for the individual wearer by a tailor who employs the worker direct as defined above.
- (b) The cleaning of such garments where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the repairing, renovating or remaking of the garments;
- (2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;
- (3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the abovementioned branches of tailoring;
- (4) The packing and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

But excluding:

- (1) All or any of the above-mentioned operations where carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments:
 - (2) The making of head-gear.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.

The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Vary and Fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 13th February 1920. Such objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), 5 Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they Propose to Fix General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, and to Declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates as set out in the Schedule below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade.

Male Workers.

Section I.—For Male Workers employed as— Dressers, Stampers, Polishers or Planishers.

A.—Workers of 21 years of age and over—

(a) Dressers and Stampers.

Workers of Grade I. as hereinafter defined, 70s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade II. as hereinafter defined, 78s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade III. as hereinafter defined, 84s. per week of 47 hours.

(b) Polishers and Planishers.

Workers of Grade I. as hereinafter defined, 72s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade II. as hereinafter defined, 81s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade III. as hereinafter defined, 86s. per week of 47 hours.

Provided that a Male Worker entering the trade as a Dresser, Stamper, Polisher or Planisher for the first time at or over the age of 21 may be employed, during the first three months of his employment, at a rate of 10s. per week less, and during the second three months of his employment at a rate of 5s. per week less than the minimum rate otherwise applicable as set out above.

Definitions.—For the purpose of the above rates the following definitions shall apply:—

Dressers.—A Dresser of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Dressing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Dresser of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dresser and who turns, screws inside and out, files flat and square at the vice, and finishes his own work throughout.

A Dresser of Grade III. is a Male Worker of

21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is also an expert in all processes or is a Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Stampers.—A Stamper of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Stamper of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Stamper and is an expert in all processes, and who undertakes all classes of work of all strengths of metal used.

A Stamper of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is an expert in all classes of Stamping, Pressing and Cutting-out by hand, or who is Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Polishers.—A. Polisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. and Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Polisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work, or is a Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Planishers.—A Planisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Planishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade II. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Planisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Planisher and is an expert in all processes and is able to do good class work.

PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

Section III.—Workers employed on Piece-Work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime as defined above, in addition to Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the equivalent of the Piece-Work Basis Time Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed, the equivalent of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable:—

As respects—(a) All employment on a Sunday, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

(b) All employment on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, a sum equivalent to half the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

(c) All other Overtime, a sum equivalent to one-fifth of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

SECTION IV.—The hours of Overtime which Female Workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART IV.

The Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers proposed in Parts I., II., and III. of this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

(a) The manufacture, wherever carried on, of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process.

(b) The manufacture of Cerements, including shrouds, face curtains, face cloths, sidecloths, winding sheets, pillow covers, coffin pads, sleeves or frilling.
