Awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

200105 Pte. L. R. W. Barton, 10th Bn., E.
Kent R., attd. 21st Inf. Bde., Sig. Sec., 7th
Ind. Div. Sig. Coy. (Margate).

(PALESTINE)

For gallantry and devotion to duty on the
19th September 1918, when he laid a wire
under heavy fire and maintained communi-
cation between his unit and the brigade until
the final objective was reached.

165951 Sjt. P. C. Bryan, 45th Bde., Sig.
Sub. Sec., R.E. (Savannah, U.S.A.).

For continuously good work and great
courage and devotion to duty, especially on
the 29th September 1918. On this date in
the neighbourhood of Messines he went for-
ward with the attacking infantry, and main-
tained during the whole of a day of heavy
fighting communication between the brigade
and the advancing infantry brigade, thus
enabling most valuable information to be
sent back to the heavy artillery.

S/15520 Pte. C. Campbell, 7th Bn., Argyll
and Suth'd Highrs., T.F. (Airdrie).

For gallantry and devotion to duty east of
Gavrelle on the 27th August 1918, when
after his company had gained its objective a
strong enemy attack developed, which drove
back several of our posts and inflicted heavy
casualties, Pte. Campbell immediately took
command of the situation, and by his per-
sonal example inspired those around him to
great efforts, which resulted in the position
being held. His coolness and utter disregard
of danger was an example to all.

14244 Sjt. H. N. Clarke, 9th Bn., E. Surr.
R. (Aberdeen).

For gallantry and devotion to duty during
the advance east of Cambrai in October 1918,
when on several occasions he showed great
energy and skill when the outpost line was
temporarily held up by enemy shell and
machine-gun fire. He was able to secure the
prompt capture of hostile machine guns, and
so prevented the advance being delayed.

200045 Sjt. J. Crow, 1/4th Bn., R. Scots
T.F. (Edinburgh).

For consistent gallantry and good work.
Throughout a period of nineteen months he
acted as battalion scout sergeant and did
excellently. He was frequently in sole charge
of the battalion scouts, and his work in
"No Man's Land" when in the line or in
action with the battalion was always gallantly
and ably carried out.
