WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the Exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918,

and the 12th day of March 1919, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:-

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day of March 1919, should be further amended by making the following amendments in, and additions to, the Schedule to the same:—

That the following headings should be deleted:-

#### (A) Calfskins;

Chemicals, drugs, dyes, dyestuffs, and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations, the following:

(A) Ergot of rye, and the liquid extract of ergot;

Forage and food which may be used for animals, the following:-

- (A) Milldust and screenings;
- (A) Pollard; (A) Sharps;
- Guanos;
- (A) Hides, British and Irish, cattle;

ducts of all kinds:—

(A) Linseed;
(A) Phosphate Rock, namely, Apatites, Phosphate of Lime and Alumina:-

Provisions and Victuals which may be used as food for man, the following: -

- (A) Confectionery manufactured wholly or partly of sugar;
  - (A) Game, dead; (A) Poultry, dead;

That the following headings should be added:-

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, the following:-

(A) Poultry, dead, except Imported Frozen Poultry.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

COAL TRANSPORT ORDER, 1917.
DIRECTIONS.

1. No coal shall be transported by sea whether as bunkers or cargo from any Mersey, Lancashire or Cumberland Port to any destination in the United Kingdom without a permit in writing from the Controller of Coal Mines or his duly authorised representative.

2. Any application for such a permit shall be in writing and addressed to Mr. A. Howarth, Controller's Representative, Dock Board Office, Liverpool, or to his Local Officer for the Port from which shipment is desired.

3. Any such application must contain full particulars of the shipment desired.

4. A permit when granted must be presented to the Dock Authority at the port of shipment, and no Dock Authority at any Mersey, Lancashire or Cumberland Port shall load any coal for shipment coastwise to any destination in the United Kingdom without having

received such a permit or otherwise than in accordance with such a permit.

5. Any breach of these directions is an infringement of the above-named Order and a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

<sup>\*</sup> Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the local inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

# DETERMINATION OF QUESTIONS (PROVISIONAL) REGULATIONS.

For the purpose of prescribing the procedure to be followed with respect to questions to be determined by him under Section 10 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") the Minister of Labour by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the Act hereby make the following Regulations:—

Application for the Determination of Questions.

- 1. (1) Any person, or any association of employers or employees, or any officer of the Ministry of Labour authorised in that behalf, who desires to obtain the decision of the Minister on any question required to be determined by the Minister under Section 10 of the Act, may make an application for the purpose by delivering or sending to the Minister an application in such one of the forms set out in the Schedule to these Regulations as is appropriate to the case.
- (2) An application may be made to the Minister at any time for the revision of a decision previously given by him under the Act (other than a decision against which an appeal is pending or in respect of which the time for appealing has not expired) on the ground that there are facts which had not been brought to the Minister's notice at the time the decision was given.

Any such application must be made by some person by whom the original application could have been made and shall contain a statement of any such new facts upon which the applicant bases his claim that the decision ought to be revised.

#### Decision of Applications by Minister.

2. If the Minister on the consideration of any application under these Regulations is of opinion that the application is not made bona fide or is made by a person or association having no interest in the question or is frivolous he may refuse to decide the question; but if he is not of such opinion he shall give his decision on the question within such time as may be necessary for considering the matter and the Minister shall, if he considers the question admits of reasonable doubt, reserve his decision and give public notice, in such manner as he thinks fit, of the nature of the application and of the date, not being less than fourteen days after the date of the notice, on or after which he proposes to give his decision on the application;

Provided that where there is in the opinion of the Minister no reasonable doubt as to a class of employment or a class of persons (whether or not a decision has been given with reference to that class) and the only question raised in the application is whether a person is within such class, instead of giving public notice the Minister may give notice as aforesaid only to the person in question and to his employer and if the question relates to any Special or Supplementary Scheme, to the Joint Board of Management of the Special or Supplementary Scheme.

Power to make Representations to Minister, &c.

3. If before the decision is given any representations with reference to the application are made in writing to the Minister by or on behalf of any person or body appearing to him to be interested the Minister shall take those representations into consideration, and the Minister may at any time require any person appearing to him to be interested to supply to him such information in writing as he thinks necessary for the purpose of enabling him to give a decision.

All such representations and information shall be open to inspection by any person or body of persons appearing to the Minister to be interested or by any persons authorised in that behalf by any such person or body of persons.

#### Oral Hearing before Minister.

4. Any person claiming to be interested may apply to the Minister to be heard by him orally in reference to any application under these Regulations, and the Minister may, in any case in which he thinks it desirable, require the attendance before him of any person appearing to him to be interested to give oral information on the subject of any application.

#### Notice of Decision of Minister.

5. The Minister shall give notice of his decision to the applicant, and shall publish the decision in such manner as he thinks fit.

#### Procedure in Cases where the Minister refers the Question to the High Court.

6. In the event of the Minister determining to refer the question for decision to the High Court he shall send notice in writing of his determination to the applicant, and shall, in addition, either send notice of the application having been made and of his determination to any person or body of persons appearing to him to be interested or, if he thinks the case is one in which public notice ought to be given, give public notice to that effect in such manner as he thinks fit.

# Reference to Minister of Questions arising in any Proceedings.

7. Where any question is required to be referred to the Minister under sub-section (7) of Section 22 of the Act the question shall be referred to the Minister by means of an application for the purpose made by the Court before which the proceedings in which the question arises are pending and in any such case the foregoing provisions of these Regulations shall Apply.

#### Provisions as to Sending Notices.

8. Any notice or other document required or authorised to be sent to any person for the purpose of these Regulations shall be deemed to be duly sent if sent by post addressed to that person at his ordinary address.

#### Minister to Determine Procedure.

9. Anything required in these Regulations to be done by, to, or before the Minister may be done by, to, or before a person appointed by the Minister in that behalf, and, subject to the provisions of these Regulations, the procedure shall be such as the Minister may determine.

Commencement and Short Title.

10. These Regulations shall come into operation on the date thereof, and may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Determination of Questions) (Provisional) Regulations, 1920.
