“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval

or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 14th day of October 1913 to sanction the grant of the rank of Brigadier-General to each of the five Colonels Commandant in Your Majesty's Marine Force:

“And whereas Your Majesty's Army Council have abolished the rank of Brigadier-General in Your Majesty's Army with effect from the 1st January 1921, and have provided that Officers fulfilling the duties of the appointments carrying in future the temporary ranks of Colonel-Commandant and Colonel on the Staff, which have been instituted in place of the rank of Brigadier-General, shall have precedence of, and command over, all Colonels:

“And whereas we consider that the rank of Brigadier-General should be similarly abolished in Your Majesty's Marine Force, and that provision should be made to define the relative rank of Colonels Commandant, Royal Marines:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the cancellation of the provisions of Your Order in Council bearing date the 14th day of October 1913, for the grant of the rank of Brigadier-General to Colonels Commandant, Royal Marines, and to

approve of Colonels Commandant, Royal Marines, having the relative rank of Commodore, these provisions to have effect as from the 1st January 1921."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd January 1920, to sanction the payment of First Lieutenants' allowance and Machinery allowance to Officers serving in Your Majesty's ships in commission:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that we should have discretion to pay such allowances to Officers serving in the Ship of the Senior Officer of the Central Reserve at each Port, although these ships are not in commission:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorise us, at our discretion, to issue as from the 1st January 1921, payment of First Lieutenants' allowance of 1s. 6d. a day in respect of the Senior Officers' ships of the Central Reserve at each of the three Home Ports, and Machinery allowance to the Engineer Officers borne for charge of machinery of the vessels of the Central Reserve.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 25th day of March 1920, to sanction the formation of a special Reserve of Engineer Officers, R.N.:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to approve of the leave and sick leave regulations for Royal Naval Reserve Officers being extended to Engineer Officers of the Special Reserve; the grant of such leave to be at our discretion.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 23rd day of March 1921 (No. 17 N.P. (4) 217/20), in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having

been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas by Section 2 of the Naval Pensions Act, 1884, it is enacted that any reference in the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, to a Pension or Naval Pension, or to money payable by the Admiralty, shall be construed to include a Naval Pension and a Greenwich Hospital Pension, Gratuity and Allowance within the meaning of the Greenwich Hospital Acts, 1865 to 1883, and any sum due on account of such a pension, gratuity, or allowance:

“And whereas by Section 3 of the Naval Pensions Act, 1884, it is enacted that a provision of any Order in Council made in pursuance of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, or of the Greenwich Hospital Acts, 1865 to 1883, respecting the restoration in whole or in part of any forfeited pension shall have effect notwithstanding any Act or law relating to the forfeiture of a pension on conviction for crime:

“And whereas by Article 1973 of the Regulations for the Government of Your Majesty's Naval Service certain restrictions, conditions and provisions were directed in respect of pensions payable to Petty and Non-Commissioned Officers, Seamen, Marines and Boys in such Service:

“And whereas it has been brought to notice that the provisions therein regarding the power of restoration of a pension forfeited for misconduct, or on conviction of felony, has not been specifically sanctioned by Order in Council:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to empower us at our discretion to restore any pension that may have been, or may hereafter be, forfeited for misconduct or on conviction of felony, either at the original amount or at such lower rate as may be thought fit; and that this power may be made retrospective as from the date on which the Naval Pensions Act, 1884, became operative.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

The Home Secretary gives notice that in pursuance of Section 2 (1) of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, he has made an Order authorising the employment of women of 18 and male young persons of 16 years of age and over in making wire springs and straightening, winding and weaving wire, on two day-shifts, subject to the conditions that no worker shall be employed in the afternoon shift in consecutive weeks and that suitable cloakroom and messroom accommodation, and facilities for sitting, shall be provided.

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (COURTS OF REFEREES) (AMENDING) REGULATIONS, 1921, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF LABOUR UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920 (10 AND 11 GEO. 5, C. 30).

Whereas the Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, has made the Unemployment Insurance (Court of Referees) Regulations, 1920 (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Regulations) for regulating certain matters with reference to the constitution and procedure of Courts of Referees.

And whereas it is desirable to amend the said Regulations.

Now therefore the Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the said Act, and of all others powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations for amending the said Principal Regulations.

Amendments to Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations.

1. (1) At the end of the proviso to paragraph (1) of Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations there shall be inserted the words:—

“ Provided also that at any sitting of a court at which claims made by women as well as claims made by men are to be considered, the court shall, if practicable, consist of a chairman appointed by the Minister and of one man and one woman drawn from the employers' panel and one man and one woman drawn from the insured contributors' panel, but where a court is so constituted, a man drawn from either of the panels shall not have any right to vote upon the consideration of a claim made by a woman and a woman drawn from either of the panels shall not have any right to vote upon the consideration of a claim made by a man.”

(2) After paragraph (3) of Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations the following paragraph shall be inserted:—

“ (4) No member of a panel shall act as a member of a court during the consideration of a case in which he appears as the representative of the claimant or in which he is or may be affected or in which he has taken any part as an official of an association or as an employer or as a witness or otherwise.”

(3) Paragraph (4) of Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations shall be re-numbered 3 as a separate Regulation.

(4) Paragraph (5) of Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations shall be omitted.

Additions to Principal Regulations.

2. After Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations (that is after Regulation 3 of the said Principal Regulations as amended by these Regulations) the following Regulations shall be inserted:—

“ 4. (1) Reasonable notice of the time and place at which a court will sit for the consideration of any claim shall be given to the claimant and except by consent of the

claimant a court shall not proceed to the consideration of any claim unless such notice has been given.

“ (2) During the consideration by a court of any claim, the claimant, the insurance officer or his deputy, and any other officer of the Ministry of Labour that the Minister may direct shall be entitled to be present at the sitting of the court and the claimant may be represented at the sitting of the court by any person, not being a counsel or solicitor, authorised by him, but for the purpose of discussing its recommendations the court may order all persons not being members of the court to withdraw from the sitting of the court.

“ (3) The court may allow any person appearing to the court to be likely to be affected by the decision of the court to be present during the consideration of a claim, but save as aforesaid, there shall not be admitted to the sitting of the court any member of the public or the representative of any newspaper.

“ Provided that where the claim to be considered by a court is a claim for payment by an association which has made an arrangement under Section 17 of the Act of a sum in lieu of unemployment benefit, the secretary of the association, or the secretary of the branch of the association through which the claim was made shall have the same rights as to notice, presence at the sitting of the court, and representation by another person, as are given to a claimant by these Regulations.”

Amendment to Regulation 3 of the Principal Regulations.

3. Regulation 3 of the principal Regulations shall be re-numbered 7.

Amendment to Regulation 4 of the Principal Regulations.

4. There shall be substituted for Regulation 4 of the Principal Regulations the following Regulation:—

“ 8. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Courts of Referees) Regulations (Amended) 1921, and shall as amended come into force on the 29th day of March 1921.”

Printing of Future Copies of Principal Regulations.

5. Where by these Regulations any Regulations or words are directed to be added to or omitted from the Principal Regulations or to be substituted for any other Regulations or words in the principal Regulations, copies of the Principal Regulations printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office after these Regulations come into force, may be printed with the Regulations or words added, omitted, or substituted as these Regulations require, and with the Regulations and paragraphs thereafter numbered in accordance with such direction; and the principal Regulations shall be construed as if they had at the time at which these Regulations come into force, been made with such additions or omissions.

Short Title and Commencement.

6. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Court of Referees) (Amending) Regulations, 1921, and shall come into force on the date hereof.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.
COTTON WASTE RECLAMATION TRADE
BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Waste Materials Reclamation) Order, 1920, which is covered by the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, and dated 27th August 1920, with respect to the Cotton Waste Branch of the Waste Materials Reclamation Trade, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary the General Minimum Time Rates and Overtime Rates for certain classes of male and female workers, as set out in the Schedule of the notice issued by the Trade Board, and dated 28th January 1921, the proposed Minimum Rates of wages being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the issue of this notice.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—MALE WORKERS.

General Minimum Time-Rates—Great Britain.

- (a) Workers of 21 years of age and over—at present fixed, 1s. 4½d. per hour; proposed, 1s. 3d. per hour.
- (b) Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age—at present fixed, 1s. 3d. per hour; proposed, 1s. 1½d. per hour.
- (c) Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age—at present fixed, 1s. 1¾d. per hour; proposed, 1s. 0¾d. per hour.
- (d) Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age—at present fixed, 11¼d. per hour; proposed, 10¼d. per hour.
- (e) Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age—at present fixed, 10d. per hour; proposed, 9d. per hour.
- (f) Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age—at present fixed, 7¾d. per hour; proposed, 7d. per hour.

- (g) Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age—at present fixed, 6¼d. per hour; proposed, 6d. per hour.

NOTE.—No variation is proposed in the General Minimum Time-Rate of 5d per hour for male workers of 14 and under 15 years of age.

SECTION II.—FEMALE WORKERS.

England and Wales.

- (a) Workers of 18 years of age and over—at present fixed, 9¼d. per hour; proposed, 8¾d. per hour.
- (b) Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age—at present fixed, 7¾d. per hour; proposed, 7d. per hour.
- (c) Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age—at present fixed, 5¾d. per hour; proposed, 5¼d. per hour.
- (d) Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age—at present fixed, 4¼d. per hour; proposed, 4d. per hour.

Scotland.

- (a) Workers of 18 years of age and over—at present fixed, 8¾d. per hour; proposed, 8d. per hour.
- (b) Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age—at present fixed, 7¾d. per hour; proposed, 7d. per hour.
- (c) Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age—at present fixed, 5¾d. per hour; proposed, 5¼d. per hour.
- (d) Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age—at present fixed, 4¼d. per hour; proposed, 4d. per hour.

NOTE.—No variation is proposed in the General Minimum Time-Rate of 3d. per hour for female workers of 14 and under 15 years of age in England and Wales and in Scotland.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

As regards the classes of workers for whom variation in the General Minimum Time-Rate is proposed according to Part I. of this Schedule, Overtime Rates, calculated on the General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner set out in the Schedule of the notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 28th January 1921, shall apply in substitution for the rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule of the notice dated 28th January 1921, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

The above proposed variation shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male and female workers, in Great Britain, of the classes specified above, in respect of all time during which they are employed in any section of the Cotton Waste Branch of the Waste Materials Reclamation

Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 27th August 1920, that is to say:—

1. The collecting, sorting or grading of cotton waste when carried on in an establishment in which such operations are the main or principal business.

2. The following operations when carried on in, or in association with, or in conjunction with any establishment of the kind specified in paragraph 1 above:—

- (a) The willowing, machining, breaking-up, scouring, or putting down mixings of cotton waste;
- (b) The collecting, sorting, or grading of any of the materials or articles, other than cotton waste, specified in paragraph 1 or paragraph 2 of the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Waste Materials Reclamation Order), 1920.†
- (c) The operations specified in paragraph 3 of the Appendix to the above-mentioned Order, other than those specified in sub-paragraph (a) above.‡

3. The operations of receiving, packing, compressing, teagling, craning, despatching or warehousing when carried on in association with or in conjunction with any of the operations included in paragraphs 1 and 2 above;

But Excluding:—

- (i) Any of the operations mentioned in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above when carried on in the establishment in which the waste materials are produced or in which they are used as raw materials for further manufacture.
- (ii) The making or repairing of sacks or bags when carried on in a factory or workshop engaged solely or mainly in the making or repairing of sacks or bags.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposal to vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 15th April 1921. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Cotton Waste Reclamation Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the objections should state

† *List of Materials and Articles:—* Rags, waste paper, paper stock; woollen, worsted, jute, flax, hemp or other textile waste; textile clippings or cuttings; used bags, sacks or sacking; scrap rubber; scrap iron or other scrap metal; fur cuttings; rabbit skins; bones or fat; used tins; broken glass or earthenware; discarded clothing (including head-gear or foot-gear); discarded textile articles; old ropes; used bottles or used jars.

‡ *List of Operations:—*The ripping of worn clothes for rags; the picking of old ropes; the trimming of paper salvage; the washing of used bottles or used jars; the washing of used tins; the breaking of scrap metal; the drying of rabbit skins; the making or repairing of sacks or bags; the willowing, pulling, scouring, carbonising or putting down mixings of textile waste (other than cotton waste).

It is provided by the above-mentioned Regulations that:—

Every occupier of a factory or workshop or of any place used for giving out work to outworkers shall on receipt of this notice post up and keep posted up a sufficient number of true copies thereof in prominent positions in the factory, workshop or place used for giving out work in such manner as to ensure that in each case the notice shall be brought to the knowledge of all workers employed by him or on his premises who are affected thereby. Penalty for non-compliance, a fine not exceeding 40s.

Under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, it is provided among other things that:—

1. Where any minimum rate of wages fixed by a Trade Board has become effective, an employer shall, in cases to which the minimum rate is applicable, pay wages to the person employed at not less than the minimum rate clear of all deductions, and if he fails to do so shall be liable on summary conviction in respect of each offence to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds and to a fine not exceeding five pounds for each day on which the offence is continued after conviction therefor.

In the foregoing provision, the expression "deductions" includes deductions for or in respect of any matter whatsoever (other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund), and notwithstanding that they are deductions which may lawfully be made from wages under the provisions of the Truck Acts, 1831 to 1896, and where any payment being a payment authorised to be received by an employer under Section 1, Section 2, or Section 3 of the Truck Act, 1896, is made by any employed person to his employer, the employer shall, for the purposes of the foregoing provision, be deemed to have deducted that amount from wages.

On the conviction of an employer for failing to pay wages at not less than the minimum rate to a person employed, the Court may by the conviction adjudge the employer convicted to pay, in addition to any fine, such sum as appears to the Court to be due to the person employed on account of wages, the wages being calculated on the basis of the minimum rate, but the power to order the payment of wages under this provision shall not be in derogation of any right of the person employed to recover wages by any other proceedings.

2. If a Trade Board are satisfied that any worker employed, or desiring to be employed, in any branch of a trade to which a general minimum time-rate, a guaranteed time-rate or a time-work overtime rate is applicable is affected by any infirmity or physical injury which ren-

ders him incapable of earning that minimum rate, and where the worker is not already employed on piece-work, are of opinion that the case cannot suitably be met by employing him on piece-work, the Trade Board may, if they think fit, grant to the worker, subject to such conditions, if any, as they prescribe, a permit exempting the employment of the worker from the provisions of this Act relating to the payment of wages at less than the minimum rate, and, while the permit is in force, the employer shall not be liable for paying wages to the worker at a rate less than the minimum rate so long as the conditions prescribed by the Trade Board on the grant of the permit are complied with.

3. It shall be the duty of every employer in a trade to which a minimum rate is applicable, to keep such records of wages as are necessary to show that the provisions of this Act are being complied with as respects persons in his employment, and if he fails to do so he shall be liable on summary conviction in respect of each offence to a fine not exceeding two pounds, and also to a fine not exceeding one pound for every day during which the default continues after conviction.

On any prosecution of a person for failing to pay wages at not less than the minimum rate, it shall lie on that person to prove that he has not paid wages at less than the minimum rate.

Any agreement for the payment of wages in contravention of the provisions of the Acts shall be void.

4. An employer shall, in cases where persons are employed on piece-work and a general minimum time-rate, but no general minimum piece-rate has been fixed, be deemed to pay wages at less than the minimum rate—

- (a) in cases where a special minimum piece-rate has been fixed under the provisions of this Act for persons employed by that employer, if the rate of wages is less than that special minimum piece-rate; and
- (b) in cases where a special minimum piece-rate has not been so fixed, unless he shows that the piece-rate of wages paid would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the same amount of money as the basis-rate.

For the purpose of this section the expression "basis-rate" means the general minimum time-rate, or, where a rate (in this Act referred to as a "piece-work basis time-rate") has been fixed by the Trade Board for the purpose of being substituted for the general minimum time-rate as the basis-rate, the rate so fixed.

5. (1) Where a worker in any trade, being a person to whom a minimum rate of wages fixed by a Trade Board applies, is an apprentice or learner, it shall not be lawful for his employer to receive directly or indirectly from him, or on his behalf or on his account, any payment by way of premium:

Provided that nothing in the foregoing provision shall apply to any such payment duly made in pursuance of any instrument of apprenticeship, not later than four weeks after the commencement of the employment.

(2) If any employer acts in contravention of this provision, he shall be liable on summary conviction, in respect of each offence to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds, and the Court may by the conviction, in addition to imposing

a fine adjudge him to repay to the worker or other person by whom the payment was made the sum improperly received by way of premium.

6. For the purpose of calculating the amount of the wages payable in the case of a worker employed on any work for which a minimum rate of wages has been fixed under the principal Act, the worker shall be deemed to have been employed during all the time which he was present on the premises of the employer, unless the employer proves that he was so present without the employer's consent, express or implied, or that he was so present for some purpose unconnected with his work and other than that of waiting for work to be given to him to perform, and in the case of a worker employed on piece-work shall be deemed during any time during which he was so present and was not doing piece-work to have been employed at the general minimum time-rate applicable to workers of the class to which he belongs:

Provided that—

- (a) where a worker resides on the premises of the employer he shall not be deemed to be employed during any time during which he is present on the premises by reason only of the fact that he is so resident; and
- (b) a worker while present during normal meal times in a room or place in which no work is being done shall be deemed to be present for a purpose unconnected with his work.
