EMERGENCY POWERS ACT, 1920.

THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES (COAL) (SCOTLAND)
ORDER, NO. 2, 1921, DATED 14TH APRIL
1921, MADE BY THE SECRETARY FOR SCOTLAND UNDER THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS,
1921.

In pursuance of the Powers conferred on me by the Emergency Regulations, 1921, and of all other powers in that behalf, and by arrangement with the Board of Trade, I hereby order as follows:—

(1) The following Article shall be substituted for Article (2) of the Local Authorities (Coal) (Scotland) Order, 1921:—

" (2) I hereby confer and impose upon the Local Authority and upon such of their officers as they may designate or appoint for the purpose the powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge within their district, in conformity with the Emergency Regulations, 1921, of the functions assigned to Local Authorities by the Coal (Emergency) Directions, 1921, the Coal (Emergency) Supplementary Directions, 1921, or any Directions amending or varying the same."

(2) This Order may be cited as "THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES (COAL) (SCOTLAND) ORDER, No. 2, 1921."

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (COURSES OF INSTRUCTION) (IRELAND) REGULATIONS, 1921,* MADE BY THE MINISTER OF LABOUR UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

The Minister of Labour, after consultation with the Board of Education and the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, hereby makes the following Regulations in pursuance of Sections 7 and 35 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, and all other powers in that behalf.

Short Title and Commencement.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Courses of Instruction) (Ireland) Regulations, 1921, and shall come into operation on the date hereof.

Interpretation.

- 2. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires or admits:
 - The expression "the Minister" means the Minister of Labour.
 - The expression "the Act" means the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.
 - The expression "insured contributor" has the same meaning as in the Act.

Minister to Approve Courses of Instruction.

- 3. For the purpose of Section 7 (1) (v.) of the Act the Minister may approve, subject to the concurrence of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, such courses of instruction as he thinks fit.
- Insurance Officer may require Applicant for Unemployment Benefit to attend Course of Instruction; considerations to be taken into account.
- 4. An Insurance Officer may require any insured contributor who is an applicant for unemployment benefit (or for payment in respect of unemployment from an Association of employed persons with which an arrangement has been made under Section 17 of the Act, after consultation with the Association concerned) to attend an approved course of instruction at such times and places and for such periods as the Insurance Officer may specify:

Provided that in determining whether such an insured contributor shall be required to attend an approved course of instruction and, if so, at what times and for what periods, the Insurance Officer shall take into account:—

- (a) the distance of the insured contributor's place of residence from the place where the approved course of instruction is to be held;
- (b) any available evidence tending to show that the insured contributor is attending a genuine educational course other than a course of instruction approved by the Minister under Regulation 3.

Insured Contributor Undergoing Instruction not obliged to Sign Unemployed Register.

5. An insured contributor shall be exempt from the obligation to attend at a Local Office and sign the unemployed register as a condition of qualification for, or receipt of, unemployment benefit upon any day on which the insured contributor duly attends an approved course of instruction, in accordance with the Insurance Officer's requirements.

Insured Contributor Undergoing Instruction not entitled to Unemployment Benefit in certain circumstances.

6. In the event of an insured contributor being excluded from an approved course of instruction on the ground of misbehaviour or unpunctuality or failing, without sufficient cause, to attend for the full period specified by the Insurance Officer, he shall not be deemed to have satisfied the statutory conditions for the receipt of unemployment benefit on any day of such exclusion or failure unless after consideration of any special circumstances, it has been otherwise determined in accordance with Section 11 of the

Act or Regulation 7 of the Unemployment Insurance (Associations) Regulations, 1920.

Insured Contributor Undergoing Instruction deemed to be available for work.

7. An insured contributor who is attending an approved course of instruction shall not be deemed to have proved that he is unable to obtain suitable employment if he fails to present himself at the Local Office for interview by an Officer of the Ministry of Labour in connection with a vacancy for employment, when so required, and, if so required, he shall be deemed to be available for work notwithstanding the fact that he is attending an approved course of instruction.

Regulations only operative in Ireland.

8. These Regulations shall be operative only in Ireland.

Order of the Board of Trade, dated April 19th, 1921, determining the Fees to be Paid by Applicants for Certificates of Qualification as Surveyor for the purposes of Section 20 and 21 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Coal Mines Act, 1911, under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920, and with the consent of the Treasury, the Board of Trade hereby revoke Clause 2 of the Order of the Secretary of State made on the 18th September, 1920, determining the fee to be paid by an applicant for a Certificate from the Board for Mining Examinations of Qualification as a Surveyor and determine that the fee to be paid by an applicant for such a Certificate shall be two pounds.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

LINEN AND COTTON HANDKERCHIEF AND HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND LINEN PIECE GOODS TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS, AND TO FIX PIECEWORK BASIS TIME-RATES AND GUARANTEED TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE PIECE-WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918 (the Minister of Labour having given his consent to the issue of such Notice), that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers at present fixed and set out in their Notice H.L. (2) dated 8th November 1920, as shown in the Schedule set out below. The Trade Board further give notice that they propose to Fix Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates for Female Workers employed on Piece-Work, the proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Provided that-

(a) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time between the ages of 16 and 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers payable during the first six months' period of employment shall be ½d. per hour less than the proposed rates otherwise applicable as set out above. Such workers, on completing six months' employment in the trade, shall be entitled to the proposed rates applicable to their age as set out in the foregoing Table.

(b) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the proposed General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the first twelve months' period

of employment shall be as follows :-

(i) During 1st three months of employment, 6d. per hour.

(ii) During 2nd three months of employment,

63d. per hour.

(iii) During 3rd three months of employment, 7½d. per hour.

(iv) During the 4th three months of employment, 8d. per hour.

The proposed General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to such workers on completing twelve months' employment in the trade shall be 8½d. per hour.

SECTION II.—(a) The Proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates set out in Section I. are applicable to the workers specified therein as follows, that is to say: where a worker is employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable.

(b) The Proposed Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers set out in Section I. are for the purpose of securing to workers employed on Piece-Work a Minimum Rate of remuneration on a Time-Work Basis, and such workers shall be entitled to be paid at not less than the Guaranteed Time-Rate applicable to a worker of her age as set out in Section I., in any case where her earnings on Piece-Work are less than such sum.

PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Female Workers (all Ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week			 	48
On Saturday			 	$4\frac{1}{2}$
On any other	week-da	ıy	 	9

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Proposed Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

- (a) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the proposed Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e. Time-and-a-Quarter.
 - (b) For Overtime after the first two hours

of Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the proposed Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(c) For all time worked on Sunday the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the proposed Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e.,

Double Time.

(d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the proposed Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Section.

The proposed Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9, or, in the case of Saturday. exceeds $4\frac{1}{2}$. notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

SECTION III.—The provisions of this Part of this Notice are without prejudice to the payment of Overtime Rates after a lesser number of hours than those declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number in the trade, in cases where such lesser number of hours constitutes the number customarily worked in the establishment.

Note.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons, and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

The above proposed Minimum Rates shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Board Acts, to all Female Workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Households Good and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, that is to say:—

1. The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics), or from other textile fabrics when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the before-mentioned fabrics, viz.:—

(a) Handkerchiefs (including Mufflers or Flags when made in association or in con-

junction with handkerchiefs);

(b) Bed-Linen, Towels, Dusters, Table-napery, Bed-spreads, Tea-cloths, Table-centres, Sideboard-covers, Cushion-covers, or similar household articles;

including all or any of the following operations:-

(i) Hooking, cutting, or tearing the material;

(ii) Vice-folding;

(iii) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, overlocking, tambouring, button-holing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching;

(iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine, whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above;

(v) The following processes, if done by machine:—Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling, and paring; (vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing,

folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, ware-

housing, packing, and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

2. The making-up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile articles cut from the piece, including:—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting boxing, warehousing, packing, and similar operations.

PART IV.

Section I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum

Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 16th April 1921. Such Objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade Board (Great Britain), 7 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

HAT, CAP, AND MILLINERY TRADE BOARD (SCOTLAND).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR, AND DEFINITION OF, A CERTAIN CLASS OF FEMALE LEARNERS IN THE HAT, CAP, AND MILLINERY TRADE.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap, and Millinery) Order, 1919, for the Hat,

Cap, and Millinery Trade in Scotland as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st March 1920, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 23rd September 1920, and made effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour dated 17th September 1920, in their application to certain classes of Female Workers, so that in lieu of such Minimum Rates, the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for the classes of Female Workers specified in the Schedule set out below, shall be as shown therein.

Proposed Variation of General Minimum Time-Rates for a Certain Class of Female Learners.

(i) The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be $2\frac{1}{4}$ d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

(ii) The advances to be given to learners commencing at/under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January or July of each year, the learner being entitled

to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

(iii) A Learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Section I. (a) of Part I. of this Schedule upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:-

Age of entering upon Employment, and Conditions. Under 15 years of age, the completion of not

- less than 3 years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
- 15 and under 16 years of age, the completion of not less than 2 years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
- 16 and under 21 years of age, the completion of 2 years' employment.
- 21 years of age and over, the completion of 1 year's employment.
- (iv) No Female Learner shall be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate under Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule to the Notice H.M.S. (2) issued by the Trade Board and dated 23rd September 1920, until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employ-ment she may have had. Provided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

(i) The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 13d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

Third year

- (ii) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.
 - (iii) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner, and

be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than Learners upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:-

Age of entering upon Employment, and Conditions.

Under 15 years of age, the completion of 3 years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

15 and under 17 years of age, the completion of 3 years' employment.

17 and under 19 years of age, the completion of 3 years' employment.

19 years of age and over, the completion of 3 years' employment.

(iv) No Female Learner shall be held to be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate under Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule to the Notice H.M.S. (2) issued by the Trade Board and dated 23rd September 1920, until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Provided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

Section II.—The General Minimum Time-Rates for all Female Workers in the Trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule (other than Female Learners as defined in Part III. of this Schedule, and Female Learners in the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Trade as defined in Section I. of Part IV. of the Schedule to the Notice H.M.S. 2, issued by the Trade Board, and dated 23rd September 1920), shall be the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Workers other than Learners set out in Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice H.M.S. 2, dated 23rd September 1920, viz., $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

Note.—The Minimum Rates for Female Workers and Learners in the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Trade, which are set out in the Trade Boards Notice H.M.S. 2, dated 23rd September 1920, and are effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour dated 17th September 1920, are unaffected by this Proposal.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR A CERTAIN CLASS OF FEMALE LEARNERS.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule in the manner specified in Part III. of the Schedule to the Notice H.M.S. (2) issued by the Trade Board, and dated 23rd September 1920, shall apply, in substitution for the Proposed Rates set out in Section I. - (4) The making of field-bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-robes, jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, teagowns, dressing gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, underskirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby linen, or similar articles;
- (5) The making of fur hats, where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of furs or furriers' skins into garments, rugs, or similar articles;
- (6) The making of knitted headgear and the making of headgear from knitted fabrics where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;
- (7) Warehousing and packing of men's, women's, or children's headgear, and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made or trimmed on the premises.

SECTION II.—The Retail Branch of the Trade is that branch of the Trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule, in which it is the usual practice for the employer to supply the garment direct to the wearer.

The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Scotland of the classes specified in Part I. of this Schedule who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 29th March 1920, as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, that is to say:—

Those branches of the Women's Clothing Trade that are engaged in the making of Non-Tailored Garments, namely, the making from textile or knitted fabrics of (a) non-tailored wearing apparel (other than handkerchiefs) worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex, or (b) boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex;

Including-

(1) All operations or processes of cutting, making, or finishing by hand or machine of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-robes, jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing-gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, underskirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby-linen, or similar non-tailored articles;

(2) The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph (1) above;

(3)—(a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or remaking of any of the abovementioned articles;

(b) The cleaning of any of the abovementioned articles, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or remaking of such garments

(4) All processes of embroidery or decorative | needle work where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating, or remaking of such articles other than hand embroidery or handdrawn thread work on articles made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton;

(5) The following processes if done by machine:-thread drawing, thread clipping, top sewing, scalloping, nickelling, and paring;

(6) Laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, packing, warehousing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making, altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of any of the above-mentioned articles;

But excluding-

(a) The making of knitted articles; the making of underclothing, socks, and stockings, from knitted fabrics; and the making from knitted fabrics of articles mentioned in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;

(b) The making of gloves, spats, gaiters,

boots, shoes, and slippers;
(c) The making of headgear, other than the articles mentioned in paragraph (2) above;

(d) The branches of trade covered by the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919;

(e) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(f) The making of women's collars and cuffs and of nurses' stiff washing belts where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the-making of men's or boy's shirts or collars;

(g) Warehousing, packing, and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises: And excluding also any processes or operations included in the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) ORDER OF 1921 (No. 8).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894

to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this benalf, hereby orders as follows:—

I.anding at certain Landing Places of Cattle not intended for Slaughter.

- 1.—(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Order of 1921 (No. 7), Cattle not intended for slaughter shipped from Ireland may, subject to the provisions of this Article, and not otherwise, be landed at any Landing Place for Irish Animals described in the Schedule hereto.
- (2) Cattle so landed shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) (Consolidation and Amendment) Order of 1914, except that the animals shall not be moved from the Landing Place until the expiration of fourteen days after the landing of the last animal at the landing place, and then only in accordance with the following provisions of this Order.

(3) The removal of any animal from the Landing Place must be authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Ministry.

(4) Each animal moved with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Ministry shall be moved to a place of detention specified in the licence, and not elsewhere, and shall be there detained and isolated, under the supervision of a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority from other animals for a period of seven days after the date of its arrival unless it is previously slaughtered in the place of detention.

(5) Animals moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route, and as far as practicable by railway, and during such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with animals not being moved under this

Article.

Condition of Landing at any Landing Place.

2. The landing of any animals under this Order must be authorised by the Superintendent or person in charge of the Landing Place.

Provision as to Marking.

3. An animal shall not be moved from the Landing Place unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner or his agent by the clipping of a broad arrow † about six inches long, on the left hind-quarter.

Provisions as to Licences.

- 4.—(1) Where animals are moved with a licence under this Order the licence shall forthwith, after completion of the movement, be delivered up to an Inspector of the Local Authority, or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District, by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (2) A movement licence granted under this Order shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.
- (3) A copy of a licence under this Order shall be sent by the Inspector granting the licence to the Clerk of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of detention is situate.

Movement from Landing Place subject to other Orders and to Regulations.

5.-Nothing in this Order or in any Order

relating to the landing or movement of animals brought from Ireland shall be deemed to authorise the movement of an animal in contravention of any other Order of the Minister or of a Regulation of a Local Authority.

Offences.

6.—(1) If any animal shall be removed in contravention of this Order or is not isolated as hereby required, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Landing Place, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the owner and person in charge of the animal which is not so isolated, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, before the expiration of the period of detention, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark on any animal affixed under this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the eighteenth day of April nineteen hundred and twenty-one.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) ORDER OF 1921 (No. 8).
