Kincardine.—An Area comprising the farms of Tipperty, Bogburn, Denside, Honeybank, Mains of Glenfarquhar, Galloquhine, Drumelzie, Mains of Drumtochty, and Cosbauld (including the hill grazings attached to the said farms), in the parish of Fordoun, in the county of Kincardine.

Perth.—An Area in the county of Perth, comprising the parish of Killin, and such portions of the parishes of Fortingall, Dull, and Kenmore as lie within the following bound-

Ross and Cromarty.—An Area comprising the Island of Lewis, including the smaller islands adjacent thereto, in the county of Ross and Cromarty.

Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the local inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

Note.—The above prices are based on returns received from Inspectors during the week named. They represent on the whole the average prices ruling in the preceding week.
